Parish Council Notes

THE MEETING TOOK PLACE at 7.30pm on 7th December 2011 at Barford Village Hall and was attended by Cllr R Hobbs (Chairman), Cllrs S Best, T Bullard, P Eden, L Styles, S Turner and R Woolgrove. Also attending were Mrs R Watts (Clerk) and for part of the meeting Mr S Porter, Mr B Jones, Mr S Jones, Mr C Murray and Mrs G Murray.

Apologies for absence received from District Cllr P O'Sullivan.

Stopping-up order Woodworms Hilton Mr S Porter, Solicitor to Mr B Jones the new owner of Woodworms Hilton, addressed the meeting and relayed the following information. The driveway and grassed area does not belong to the property. The top surface of the area in question became part of the adopted highway in 1949. The owner of the subsoil is unknown. The stopping-up order would divest responsibility for maintaining the top surface from the highways authority to Mr Jones. Mr Jones wants only to adopt the driveway and an additional 8-foot strip of land alongside it so that the drive can be widened. The latter would be bock-paved to match the existing one. Mr Jones is planning to submit an amended application to the Department for Transport. Mr Porter explained that if the Stopping-up order were granted, Mr Jones would effectively be a 'squatter' on the land. He would never own the land unless it was fenced off for a period of 12 years and for that, planning permission would be required from Cherwell District Council. Cllr Hobbs explained that the Parish Council could not comment or make any formal decision without first seeing details of the revised Stopping-up Order. The matter would be discussed at the January meeting if those details were to hand.

Public Participation: Mr & Mrs Murray sought clarification on whether the Stopping-up Order at Woodworms Hilton would mean that Mr Jones would then automatically own the land. Cllr Hobbs referred them to Mr Porter's assurance that the land would have to be fenced off for 12 years before Mr Jones could own the land. Until then he is a 'squatter'.

Parish Matters

Notice board Barford St John. Mr J Booth had given Cllr Hobbs a verbal quotation of £30 to repair the notice board. The cork is rotten and would probably need replacing every 2-3 years. It was agreed that repairs should go ahead.

Maintenance to River Swere. The Environment Agency had replied to the Clerk reference the River Swere needing attention. Subject to resources they can undertake selective maintenance works on watercourses designated as 'Main River'. The River Swere does not fall into that category and therefore it falls to relevant riparian landowners to

undertake any required maintenance. The Environment Agency will continue to monitor flows and subject to resources, remove any obstructions in periods of high flows to reduce the flood risk.

Maintenance of Street Furniture. Cllr Hobbs reported that the bench outside the Village Hall has been damaged. Cllr Eden will tape the bench off to prevent use until it can be repaired. It was agreed that the Parish Council would create a register of local carpenters/builders who might be interested in quoting for occasional ad hoc repairs during the coming year. The Clerk will put an advert in the Barford News.

Footpath - Lower Street to West Close. A villager had kindly cut down the brambles and weeds encroaching onto this pathway. It was agreed that the path would be included in the grass-cutting contract 2012 for regular maintenance.

Dog Fouling. The Clerk had reported concerns about dog fouling within the village to Cherwell District Council. They will increase patrols with a view to catching and fining owners who do not clear up after their dogs.

Grass Cutting Tender. The Clerk has prepared a Grass Cutting Tender document for 2012. It was unanimously agreed that the Clerk should go ahead with arranging for an advert to be placed in the Banbury Guardian for the second week in January. The advert will also appear in the Barford News. Interested parties need to return Tenders to the Clerk by 12 noon on 17th February. The new three-year contract will be approved at the Parish Council meeting on 7th March.

Allotment water rates. The Clerk has received a further invoice from Thames Water for the wrong meter. Thames Water has been contacted and been asked to rectify their error.

Precept / Budget 2012-13. Cllr Hobbs had circulated draft details of the proposed precept and budget before the meeting. Various issues were raised and agreed. The precept has been maintained at £7,000. The precept and budget were proposed by Cllr Bullard, seconded by Cllr Styles and unanimously approved and agreed.

Cllr Hobbs reported that he and Cllr Bullard had attended the Parish Liaison Meeting at Bodicote House on 9th November. The main topics were the Localism Bill and Parish Surveys.

Any Other Business

Cllr Turner commented on the possibility of the village lighting a beacon to celebrate the Queen's Diamond Jubilee. Cllr Turner also suggested that West Close be designated a Queen Elizabeth II playing field. Both of these matters will be Agenda items for the next meeting.

The next meeting is on 4th January 2012.

There being no other business, the meeting closed at 9.47pm.

THE PLANNING STAGE of the Windows Replacement project took rather longer than expected. Our application was registered with CDC on 23rd June and after various consultations and discussions full planning approval was received mid September.

The next stage was the Funding Agreement with Viridor which was signed on 20th October.

Agreement has now been reached with Fairmitre on the installation programme which will start early in the New Year to avoid disruption to Christmas bookings.

The Windows Appeal received such terrific support that we should have sufficient funds to be able to replace the main doors as well.

A full report on the project will be published in due course, however we would like to take this opportunity to thank all those who responded so generously to the appeal, without them this would not have been possible.



Tom Smith
20th Oct 1921 – 28th Nov 2011



Born in Hempton, Tom spent his childhood in Barford attending the village school and then cycling to school in Deddington.

He started work aged 14 as an apprentice stone mason for local builders Taylors. After a short spell in the home guard he was called up and joined the RAF transport section in 1942. Service overseas included the D Day Landings on Juno Beach and carrying vital rations and essential equipment through Holland and Belgium.

Following Demob in 1946 he delivered pre-fabricated houses all over the country to areas that had been badly bombed. It was on one of these journeys that he chanced to put up for the night at a pub near Newport and it was there he met his future wife Novello, whom he married in 1948, a marriage that lasted 63 years.

Later he worked for Keystone Buildings in Bloxham and then Compton Buildings at Fenny Compton. He finished his working life at Cheney manor Farm with the Alt family.

In his younger days he played both football and cricket for the Barford teams. He enjoyed shooting, walking, listening music and singing, and was a regular player at the whist drives.

Tom was a gentle, kind and warm hearted man, but also had his own opinions on most subjects and liked nothing better than putting the world to rights. He found the lack of discipline and general lack of respect of the modern world hard to understand.

Sadly, by his mid 80's he had developed Alzheimers, which slowly took his memory, although he was able to enjoy the family get-together we held to celebrate his 90th birthday.

Tom had a good life, which he enjoyed. He was a well known character in the Barfords and enjoyed a chat with the friends and neighbours that he met as he walked in the village. He is survived by his wife Novello, their three children, six grand children and six great-grand children, all of whom will have very fond memories of him.

Novello and the family would like to thank everyone for their kind messages and support.

There were over 400 Year 1&2, 3&4 and 5 &6 pupils representing over 14 of the North Partnerships Schools, and 60 Year 7-11



students from 3 secondary schools. The event was supported by 25 of our brilliant Sports Leaders from Year 10, many of whom have given up time to plan and train before the event and acted as hares for each race.

The penultimate week of term saw the return of our students in Year 11 last year to collect their GCSE certificates. Although I did not get to know them well before they left, it was lovely for all of us to catch up with them and share in their numerous successes. We are all very proud of them and every one of them is a reason why we should have a Sixth Form.

I would like to take this opportunity to wish a very happy and safe Christmas to all the students, parents, staff and members of our local community, and am very much looking forward to the New Year and new school term.

A FORMER thatcher who has used his loaf to create bread from traditional forms of grain grown in Oxfordshire.

John recently appeared with Michelin-starred chef Michel Roux Jr. on BBC TV's 'Great British Food Revival' John, an archaeological botanist, developed the grain in frustration at the modern types of wheat grown in the UK, which produce straw too short for use as roofing thatch. He believed using older varieties to get two products from the land was better for the environment.

Memories Of Spencers

Reveal Hidden History Of Underwear

BANBURY MUSEUM'S new exhibition 'Revealed: The Underwear Revolution', uncovers the history of underwear. It tells the hidden story of how underwear has evolved from the Anglo-Saxon linen smock to the modern memory foam bra.

The exhibition celebrates corset making in Banbury with original documents, photographs and corsets from Spencer (Banbury) Ltd.

Cherwell District Council's lead member for environment, Cllr James Macnamara, said;



"For many who worked at the Britannia Road site this exhibition will bring back memories. Visitors can hear accounts of life in the Spencer factory during and after the Second World War, recorded earlier this year at the museum's 'Times Gone By' reminiscence group.

Cllr Macnamara added: "The exhibition will appeal to Downton Abbey fans - it's a chance to find out what Lady Grantham might have worn!"

Also on show is a woven blue silk dress, made in 1750, that needed special underwear for support. Other exhibition highlights include a machine-made cage crinoline - a skirt-shaped structure, fashionable in the late nineteenth century. The contraption, which sports 19 spring steel wire hoops, was preserved by conservators before going on show. Children can try on a replica eighteenth century quilted petticoat or Tudor shirt as part of a dressing-up activity.

Sarah Morton, from Oxfordshire County Council, said: "Revealed focuses on how innovation and technology changed what we wore beneath our clothes. It tells a fascinating story and I think people may never think of underwear in the same way again."

Fellow conservator Sam van de Geer presented a behind-the-scenes view of the conservation and display of textiles last Wednesday evening as part of Banbury Museum's new Museum Plus programme. 

Book Reviews with a Cotswold Theme

'Tommy Glover's Sketch of Heaven'

by Jane Bailey Paperback £7.99

This is a charming Cotswold story, set during the war, by Cheltenham author, Jane Bailey.



Kitty, young, back-street London girl, is evacuated to a Cotswold village and her 'forthright'(!) manner soon causes upheaval as she acts as a catalyst for change. Seemingly a simple tale, it is packed with memorable characters and interweaving themes.

You cannot fail to be moved, yet laugh out loud, when you read of Kitty's first experience of a Cotswold cream cake. When Kitty, so used to the mean patches of London sky, has her first view of an open Cotswold field, with its seemingly vast horizons, you may well be as moved as she is. With a little of Goodnight Mr. Tom and a great deal of humour, Tommy Glover's Sketch of Heaven is a delight, from its culture clash beginning to its romantic ending, via an exposure of secrets that belie the idyllic beauty of the Cotswolds.


'Mad Joy'

by Jane Bailey Paperback £9.99

Jane Bailey's second Cotswold novel, 'Mad Joy', is the equal of her first, 'Tommy Glover's Sketch of Heaven.' They are both cleverly crafted with major and minor characters sympathetically created and both have charm and tension in equal measure.

Mad Joy, however, has a kernel of truth about it, for is partially based on an event in her own family history.

'Mad Joy' starts between the wars and in it, a little girl runs into a wood and, two years later, runs out again, into the house of spinster Gracie. Where does she come from and what became of her in those two years? Gracie has no wish to delve as the truth might take little Joy away from her. Joy, herself, may have her own, deeply buried reasons for not examining her past. Full of this author's trade-mark humour and containing some of her most memorable characters, this novel builds slowly to a climax, hint by hint, as the aptly named Joy approaches adulthood and the secret of those two years and of her earlier life comes to light.



NATURE NOTES 101

SEPTEMBER STARTED WELL with lovely early Autumn days, the wind at SW and temperatures rising to 24.5° (day) on the 2nd and 13° (night) on the 3rd. This SW wind was to hold sway for the whole month, but not with the same effects!

Buzzards were very active. Five soared over St. Michael in a column, from a great height down to roof top level on the 1st and, on the 2nd, a hollow, guttural croaking caused me to look up and see a Raven flying west toward Rignell.

A very nice record came in from Mr. Arthur Murrey, also on the 2nd, of two Kingfishers at Little Barford Mill.

It rained from the early hours until 10am on the 4th and the local pair of Ravens were livening things up on Steepness. They moved around croaking conversationally to each other for a while when the male flew off, still croaking, over Horn Hill. The female remained for some time and I did not see her going, but I'll bet it was to Rignell.

Half a dozen House Martins and a few Swallows lingered around the villages, probably with late broods.

The next six days were showery and day temperatures dropped a little to around 17°. The nights remained mild, they themselves rising to 17° on the 9th.

Throughout the week a Red Kite appeared, low over St. Michael and was seen by several people. A Raven continued to honk around Steepness, accompanied by occasional laughter from a Green Woodpecker. At this time there were plenty of fruits to be had and the quiet, plaintive little calls of the deceptively bright coloured Bullfinches could be heard from hedgerows everywhere – and village gardens!

On the 9th there was a 'mew' ing call, quite un-Buzzard-like, and repeated many times from Steepness. The calls were continuous in groups of three to six repeated. Quite unlike the 'Peewoo' of the Buzzard in pitch or duration, they were also very unlike the 'Kee-ee-ee' of the Kestrel. I thought they might have been Hen Harrier but without seeing the bird I could not be certain.

On the 11th I watched with interest as the local homing pigeons carried out their morning circuits. Suddenly, a large hen Sparrowhawk launched herself at the tail-enders from an Ash tree. The pigeons promptly bunched in tight formation and the hawk broke off her attack, sailing untidily away toward the R. Swere. I marvelled a little at the strategy the pigeons had worked out to absorb target stragglers. Throughout the same day the wind gradually increased from a stiff SW blow to a stormy near-gale with rain at night – the remains of



Hurricane Katrina! The blow continued through the 12th and 13th, leaving the colourful Comma, Peacock and Small Tortoiseshell butterflies to feed in the shelter of the Michaelmas Daisies. It died away leaving a cool (7°) night of clear moonlight.

The 14th was another lovely early Autumn day, but a clear night at 1.5° produced a touch of ground frost – the first of the Autumn.

On the 15th came the exciting news that two Hen Harriers were still active near the far west of the parish. 'There must be a good supply of young rabbits there' I wondered. 'How much longer would the birds stay around?' Then, on the 17th, another report came in that a female Hen Harrier had been seen on the ground with prey – a small rabbit.

The evening, however, brought violent hail and thunder storms with a sudden drop in temperature. I just caught sight of 'my' House Martin pair dashing in to roost in 'their' artificial nest.

Nights were now down to around 5° although days remained between 18° and 21°. An evening shower on the 18th produced a spectacularly huge and brilliant rainbow, just before sunset.

It was about now that Mrs. Brenda Twigg informed me that she had two House Martin nests on her house and each had produced two broods, one of them, possibly three broods. If one considers that each brood had fledged at least two youngsters, then a total of ten new birds would not be unreasonable – What a success!

The third week of the month continued in like mode, showery, breezy and mild. A small flock of a dozen Meadow Pipits appeared in the Swere water meadows, feeding on the numerous flying insects. Ravens called, Rooks, Jackdaws and Crows fed on newly turned fields. Green Woodpeckers called around the villages and Tawny Owls hooted from their different territories. On the 21st a sudden rush of wings, with small, darting, black and white bodies, marked the passage of a goodly flock of House Martins and Swallows over Hempton Hills. They were on their way south for the winter.

On the 26th the temperatures started to rise again, to around 20°. Buzzards seemed to call incessantly by day and the Tawny Owls were particularly noisy below Steepness at night. And, what appeared in the far west of the parish? Yes, a hunting Hen Harrier, This time a male. Superb!

The temperature continued to climb on the 28th and 29th, culminating on the 30th in a glorious exit for a largely pleasant September, with day-long hot sun and a temperature of 26°!

October dawned and, as a hazy, hot sun climbed above Hempton, a heavy heat mist formed. A Raven croaked from Steepness through the pearl-

drops of the morning. Through the afternoon there was much high thin cloud which produced quite dim sunlight, but by mid-afternoon a SW wind had begun to spring up which cleared any lingering mistiness and allowed me to see a Green Woodpecker as he went bounding and laughing across the airfield as I drove back from Bloxham. The temperature had reached 22.5° after mid-day, producing similar warmth to the last days of September and setting the trend for the first half of the new month. Night temperatures were more erratic however, that of the first night being 7.5° and, after a hot, humid and oppressive day, that of the 2nd was 13°.

In the ensuing days things Nature-wise were very quiet, with heat humidity and gusty SW winds. Everything seemed to be away out in the hedgerows and stubble, feeding and resting. The only creatures moving seemed to be Crows harrying Buzzards, a Raven harrying the Crows and Green Woodpeckers laughing at all of them!

On the 6th the wind went up to NW introducing chilly, boisterous conditions with showers. Temperatures dropped (7° night, 14° day) and at eventide that strange, rare phenomenon of clouds with a distinct greenish tinge appeared.

Temperatures went up again as the wind backed to SW on the 10th producing a lovely Autumn day on the 12th. They then dropped viciously at night-time (-3° 14th, -1.5° 15th, producing significant grass frosts) as the wind veered back to NW and then right round the compass to SW once more on the 15th.

It was not until the 13th, that I saw in the garden, my first (and only!) Small Copper butterfly of the year, a species that I regard as a main indicator of summer in my garden. They should have been around for the last six weeks! And still, apart from Swallows, Martins and a few finches and tits, the main actors were our resident Ravens and Buzzards.

On the 18th a cold wind got even colder as it veered to NW and then NNW on the 19th with nights hovering around freezing point, clear and brilliant with stars.

Now, around this time we frequently experience a spell of milder, settled weather. Yes, it's St. Luke's Little Summer! On the 20th the wind backed to SW where it stayed until after month's end. As well as the Crows, Ravens and Buzzards everything remained as it was. I did note a Dunlin (one of the occasionally seen waders) flying out of the Swere valley on the 20th and a Red Kite standing on the wind at Swere Villas on the 21st. There were reasonable flocks of Goldfinch, but other small birds remained inconspicuous. In response to St. Luke for his extended summer, I

noted the 22nd, 24th (which boasted a hen Sparrowhawk hunting over Townsend) and the 27th – 31st as beautiful, warm Autumn days. The 27th and 28th were windless; in fact I noted that the weather-vanes on Deddington Church pointed in all directions! There were showers, and the 26th brought almost unbroken gentle rain throughout the day. The 29th brought frequent movement of small numbers of Skylarks about the arable lands.

Perhaps aptly, the Green Woodpeckers of Steepness were once more noisy on a pleasantly autumnal 31st October, prior to its melting into November on a mild and showery night of 12°.



PATIENT SUMMARY CARE RECORD

What is the Summary Care Record (SCR)?

The SCR will store a specific set of information about people for every patient in England except those who have requested not to have one. This information will be extracted from information currently held by your GP. It is hoped that this will help by providing continuity of care between hospital and home. The information in the SCR will be any medication you are on and allergies. This information will only be available in an 'urgent care setting' such as casualty.

In Oxfordshire, the SCR project begins in March 2012. An information pack will be sent to everyone in Oxfordshire early in 2012 that explains the changes that are taking place and the choices you can make. If you are happy with the changes, then you don't need to do anything and your extra records will be created. If you're unhappy, then there's an opportunity to actively opt out by filling in a form in your pack.
