#### DOWN ON THE FARM

In July we celebrated my birthday by having a fire. Unfortunately, it was not intentional; the smoke house in which we smoke our bacon decided to self-combust and took out the adjacent workshop wall while it was about it.

Fortunately, we had recently had our fire extinguishers serviced and the use of these and fire engines from Deddington, Banbury and Chippy prevented what could have been catastrophic damage. The smoke house is now a small pile of ashes.

The fire chief said they had already been out to several combine harvester fires and there were earlier raging moorland fires in the north and in Wales.

For my money these were caused entirely by the minority patched pullover and sandals brigade who have lobbied equally inept DEFRA bureaucrats into destocking sheep numbers and reducing controlled burning of the heather on the grounds of ecology.

Both are practices that have been carried out for a century or more by people who know precisely what they are doing and who had repeatedly advised against the controls.

Their work had produced some of the finest moorland imaginable which has provided food and shelter for grouse and numerous other wildlife species and also given local sheep farmers some additional grazing.

De-stocking and reduced burning has resulted in overgrown heather which, in the tinder dry conditions this summer, has turned into the raging infernos that must have wiped out countless thousands of insects, rodents and other wildlife species.

It is quite simply a case of an ignorant minority with a huge chip on both shoulders about people who live in the country shooting themselves in both feet!

The drought that continued into August had serious consequences for arable farming with grain traders commenting on low yields and poor-quality samples. Our own wheat came off quite well although the sample was not the best

Straw prices too have reached unprecedented levels with already cash strapped livestock farmers in the south west needing to supplement sun scorched pastures with hay and straw as early as July; this plunder of winter feed will have serious consequences.

The best thing about this summer, on our small farm at least, is the huge increase in insect life, especially butterflies, which, in turn, has seen a rise in the small bird population. The three fields we fallowed obviously played a part in this.

We seem to have had bird's nests in every nook and cranny and the barn owls can be heard calling out their fledglings to teach them to hunt in the evenings. We also have the Roe deer with a pair of fawns that makes a regular trip to the orchard and a family of weasels in the garden which I hope to capture on film with my new birthday present, a motion detector camera!

There was also a nice brood of partridges in one of the fields but unfortunately the buzzards spotted them and at the last count only two were left. It is okay to protect predatory birds, but they should also be controlled to prevent their increasing numbers causing a decline in other species.



To mark our 25<sup>th</sup> Anniversary we will welcome two very special guests:

Sibylle Kreutzberger. Sibylle trained at Waterperry, and in 1959 was appointed by Vita Sackville-West as Head Gardener at Sissinghurst, together with her partner Pamela Schwerdt. After Vita died in 1962, they stayed on until 1990, managing Sissinghurst fot the National Trust and contributing to the development of this most prominent and influential British garden, Sibylle's achievements were recognised by the award of Fellowship of the Royal Horticultural Society. She will talk informally about her gardening career and will answer our questions. Don't miss this unique opportunity to gain insights into the development of Sissinghurst and a notable life in gardening.

Our other guest will be Anna Greenland who will talk about her Vegetable growing history, starting with a tiny greenhouse in Cornwall and ending up as Head Gardener with Raymond Blanc's veg. patch at Le Manoir aux Quat'Saisons.

Anna is at the heart of the organic growing movement. For over a decade, she has followed her passion, growing the highest quality organic food for star chefs Raymond Blanc, Tom Aikens and Jamie Oliver. As Head Gardener at Soho Farmhouse, Anna created the vegetable, fruit and herb gardens from scratch. She also designed the first vegetable garden at Kew Gardens in recent times. She shares her knowledge through classes, talks and collaborations. She recently won a Gold Medal at Hampton Court Flower Show. Anna made her show debut with a mini treasure trove for picklers and preservers in Herbs for Preserves. In only 3x3m, there was inspiration here for urban gardeners in this pretty outdoor larder with ingredients for pestos, vinegars, oxymels (medicinal vinegar and honey extractions) and quick pickles using coriander, basils, fennel and other herb plants. Anna also showed how you can make skincare salves with marigolds, medicinal spoonfuls of turmeric, ginger, garlic and rosemary for colds.(At the Dig In Cookery Theatre.) She will talk 'vegetables' and answer any questions.

There will be a lovely TEA to celebrate and wil include special Anniversary Cake.

#### **HEDGEHOG MATTERS**

As if to tease, no sooner had I sent last month's Barford news to the editor after writing about seeing no hedgehogs for a long time, wondering if they were alive than I walked into the garden and nearly stood on one that had curled up suddenly in the middle of the path when it heard my footsteps!

Since writing about reporting hedgehog sightings last month, someone has reported sadly seeing one dead small to medium sized one on Mill Lane recently, and another dead one (or at least its "shell") at the far end of Conker Alley around the corner on South Newington Road. The latter could have been the work of badgers or maybe roadkill and then eaten by badgers. South Newington road can be quite busy at times and is more commonly being used as a short cut.

Ridiculous as going to look for dead hedgehogs might sound to some, I went to look on Mill Lane but could find nothing then. It's always interesting to see their size, state of health and whether juvenile or adult. I have even taken some to the vets for a microchip scan because those that have come from Wildlife Rehab centres are usually chipped for monitoring purposes. Reports back to them help them to know how successful their treatments and what they are doing and how long those hedgehogs then survive in the wild. We have since seen one several times, late at night in the hedge line behind us and two together on one occasion. Even with at least two local hedgehog deaths, at least two remain and there is no easy way of knowing how many more are around. Thanks for telling of your sightings and please do, if you spot any. Perhaps their presence in our hedge again indicates the start of a change in the seasons and coming back to a familiar place before the autumn where food is always present and there are good safe places to hibernate later on. Maybe the continually dry weather has bought them back too, knowing that there is a reliable food source here. Whatever the reason, it does follow the pattern of the last three years. Unless, of course, these are different hedgehogs.

Now that we've have had some rain and things are growing again, many people will be thinking of strimming and mowing to tidy up at the end of summer. Remember when strimming that we do have hedgehogs in the village and if there is access into your garden, you may have them in your long grass and edges whether you know it or not! They are good at hiding and hard to spot.

They will not move off if they hear a strimmer but curl up into a ball for self-defence. Many are taken to Wildlife Hospitals every year with horrific injuries. Some are treatable though nasty and painful but other hedgehogs are put to sleep. These are just the ones that people have found but how many others come to a nasty painful death in the undergrowth that nobody sees or knows about? It may be time consuming but consider checking long grass with your hands (gloved!) first, or if it is a large area perhaps feel first with a soft brush or maybe something similar.

Last year I asked the council if they would consider changing the contract with Thomas Fox who cut the grass and the verges in the villages, to leave a margin of long grass at the edges. They did consider but decided against it on the basis that a lot of residents cut back the verges outside their own houses anyway and that this was probably the generally preferred option. A number of people were keen for verges to be left longer and expressed their disappointment at this decision. Opinion in the village may be divided on this and perhaps it is something to consider again in the near future. Perhaps it is something that the village could be consulted on? Some Hedgehog Rescue centres have been working with councils, contractors and housing trusts around the UK to help raise awareness of the damage caused by large scale strimming equipment used to maintain large expanses of hedgerow and verges. As well as providing refuge and a wildlife corridor for hedgehogs and other small mammals, in time it produces an abundance of wild flowers and in turn an increase in butterflies and a wide range of invertebrates for birds and other wildlife to feed on. It also softens the edges. Having watched Thomas Fox cut close into some of the hedge edges, especially near the end of Nether Worton Road which looks perfect for hogs, any hedgehog resting in the daytime in those verges wouldn't stand a chance!



The WI go back to the sixties! Well – as you can see the Barford ladies really got into the spirit of things for the WI Sixties Tea Party! The outfits were hilarious, especially as we remembered that people actually wore this sort of get-up to go about their normal lives. Oddly, we never did identify Ozzy Osbourne look-a-like on the front row in the pink trousers......

We drank Snowballs (advocaat and lemonade) or Dry Martini with lemonade, Mateus Rose or German Riesling and non-drinkers had Dandelion and Burdock or elderflower cordial.

We ate cheese and pineapple in a 'hedgehog', prawn cocktail, cucumber and mint sandwiches, and celery with squeezy cheese from a tube. After a 'palate cleanser' of Angel Delight we were ready for the butterfly cakes and the Black Forest Gateau. Comments on the catering ranged from 'Ugh – I took a big mouthful of that by mistake can I have a real drink now?' to 'Actually that wasn't as awful as I remember' to 'That was absolutely fabulous, why don't we have it all the time?'

Mick Pearson kindly came along to play us some sixties music and lots of us took to the floor to see if we could still do the moves (definitely!). Nostalgia for those who could remember the sixties and a history lesson for those who were too young or those people who 'weren't really there'!



#### VILLAGE HALL WORKS

We have received comments from several residents and hall users suggesting that removal of the stage would provide much more usable space for the type of events that are now hosted in the hall - charity dinners, quiz nights, village markets etc.

Several of our neighbouring villages have removed staging, increasing the floorspace available and have opted for temporary staging which has proved very effective. These

include our two primary schools, Bloxham Ex-Servicemen's hall, Deddington Parish Church, Enstone, Gt. Tew to name but a few.

Our village has grown hugely since the hall was built, and at times it is now a very tight squeeze to fit everyone in! It's a while since the stage was actually used, as in recent years musicians have opted to set up at floor level rather than using the stage. However, if staging should be required there is modular, temporary staging available in Deddington which we could borrow.

One particular benefit following the removal of the stage would be that, in time, given planning permission, double doors could be constructed opening out onto the garden, thus providing easy access for BBQ's, Children's parties etc.



# ROWING SUCCESSES THIS SUMMER

Danielle Semple, student at University of Exeter studying geography has had a very hectic rowing summer schedule with her partner Susannah Duncan also from Exeter.

This started with them winning the Haslam trophy for lightweight double sculls in a new course record at Women's Henley at the end of June, giving them an automatic seeded qualification for Royal Henley scheduled for two weeks later. This was an open weight division with the girls meeting World champions in the finals. They had a very impressive start, but the advantage of age, experience at championship levels, weight and height were to be just that bit too much along with the very high temperatures. But as the commentators said these are rowers of the future for GB and the challenge from junior to world championships was set for Danielle. She has in fact just come back from Poland where she has been competing at the U23 World Championships in the women's lightweight double.

The racing took part over 4 days and Danielle and her partner, Susannah managed to secure a place in the A final after winning their heat and semis. The day of the final came along and with the conditions being in their favour, they knew they could really perform to their best. They were leading the pack up to the halfway point until the Italians and Germans made a big push that meant they didn't have the legs to fight their fast sprint finish, resulting in an impressive 3rd place, coming home with a bronze medal. They couldn't have had a better race, and result as this is the only Olympic event for lightweight women, meaning countries load their best athletes into this boat class and the Italians ending up getting a world record

Danielle is keen to carry on the training into next season to see if next year she can change the bronze for a gold?!

# recipe for BANBURY CAKES.....

The Banbury cake is a pastry with a wonderful

and rather exotic history. Gervase Markham published the recipe for a version of the Banbury cake in 1615, but it is thought by many to date from the Crusades, when those few who survived the fighting and, far more dangerous, the disease, returned with new culinary treasures, one of which was the forerunner of the Banbury cake.

#### **Ingredients**

- 50g unsalted butter, softened
- 1 tbsp English honey
- 1/2 tsp freshly grated nutmeg
- ½ tsp ground cinnamon
- 100g currants
- 50g candied orange peel
- plain flour, for dusting
- 500g pack all-butter puff pastry
- 1 egg white, beaten
- 1-2 tbsp nibbed (coarse) sugar

#### **Method**

- 1. Cream the butter and honey together with the spices. Add the currants and the candied peel and mix well. On a lightly floured surface roll out the pastry to the thickness of a £1 coin and cut out 10 x 10cm circles, re-rolling any trimmings. Divide the filling between the circles.
- 2. Bring up the edges of the pastry to enclose the filling and crimp the edges of the pastry together to look like little purses. Turn the parcels over, with the folds underneath. Roll each parcel out gently to an oval shape, taking care not to expose the filling.
- 3. Heat the oven to 180C/160C fan/gas 4. Place the cakes on a baking sheet lined with non-stick paper. Brush with the egg white and sprinkle with sugar. Cook for 25-30 mins until cooked and crispy. Turn the oven down if the tops brown too quickly.
- 4. When cooked, transfer to a wire rack and allow to cool a little before eating. When cold, they're excellent spread with a little salted butter.

#### DEDDINGTON BOOKWORMS SUMMER BOOK REVIEWS

The Elegance of the Hedgehog by Muriel Barbery is

set in a wealthy apartment block in Paris. It follows events in the life of the concierge, Renée Michel, and Paloma Jesse – younger daughter of an upper-class family who live in one of the apartments.

To all outward appearances, Renée is a dowdy, slow-witted concierge. Secretly, however, she listens to Mahler, reads such authors as Tolstoy and follows Japanese cinema. Paloma also has an interest in Japan. When a cultured Japanese businessman moves into the apartments, he and Paloma both recognise Renée's intelligence and make an effort to know her. Themes relating to philosophy, class consciousness and personal conflict run through the book. Some members of the group struggled to become engaged or complete the book which proved to be the anticipated challenge but everyone agreed it was worth finishing this clever, moving novel.

We also read **Elizabeth is missing** by **Emma Healey,** which is a thought provoking and sensitive debut novel.

Maud is slowly losing her memory and her grip on everyday life much to the frustration of her daughter and others around her. She believes her best friend Elizabeth is missing and in terrible danger and is continually trying to find her. As time progresses Maud's investigations actually start to trigger memories of a tragedy that occurred more fifty years ago – the disappearance of her sister.

The group agreed that the difficult subject of a loved one succumbing to dementia is very well written. The author has got into the mind of Maud with great effect, some of her behavioural traits make the reader smile and some are heartbreaking. A degree of frustration was felt by some as Maud's dementia was ignored by those around her and not acknowledged until very late in the story but all agreed this book is well worth a read

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
