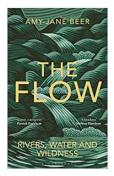

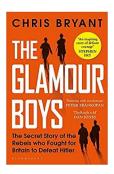

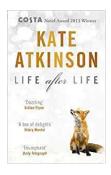
READING RECOMMENDATIONS



The Flow by Amy-Jane Beer is both a personal pilgrimage and a wide-ranging investigation. A keen and apparently very brave kayaker, Beer was shocked into writing this book by the accidental death of a close friend. Mostly alone, but sometimes in the company of experts, she explores (by walking, swimming and snorkelling, boating, sometimes just sitting still and observing) rivers, chalk streams, bogs and rivers in various parts of the British Isles and in all weathers, and writes with a deep love and knowledge of the natural world. At first I'd thought I might just dip in (ha!) but was soon compelled by the range of insights and the immediacy of the writing. *Guardian* readers may know Amy-Jane Beer as a regular contributor to *Country Diary*; she's a wise and likeable companion on this watery tour. *Linda Newbery*



The Glamour Boys by Chris Bryant: the author, MP for Rhondda and Chair of the Committee on Standards and Privileges, who is himself openly gay, writes about a group of young British MPs, whose homosexuality was necessarily hidden, who, having visited Berlin in the early 1930s to experience its sexual liberalism, witnessed at first hand the danger when Hitler won power. Their queer and Jewish friends were arrested, interned and murdered. They were among the first to warn Britain and repeatedly to speak out openly and bravely against Chamberlain's policy of appeasement, only to have their phones tapped and to be threatened with exposure. Their bravery in peace was matched in war - they all enlisted and four died in action. Well researched and brilliantly told. *Christopher Murray*



Life After Life by Kate Atkinson centres around Ursula Todd who is born one snowy night in 1910 and dies strangled on her umbilical cord. On that same night in 1910, Ursula is born and lives. As Ursula grows, she also repeatedly dies in a variety of ways as the century marches on through the Great War, the influenza pandemic and the London Blitz during World War II (which takes her several attempts to live through). Lots of stories in one story. Ursula has lived so many similar lives and in each life she is nagged by a strong sense of déjà vu. The novel has all the drama of wartime England combined with a soft, often quiet story about family life and just... people. I personally would not have picked this book to read but it was lent to me and I thoroughly enjoyed it. *Ish Freeman*



The Fall of Boris Johnson: The Full Story by Sebastian Payne. Heraclitus some 2500 years ago pronounced that "character is destiny" and so it proved with the man universally known as Boris, a short-term Prime Minister and a long-term classics scholar. He put to the test almost to destruction the "good chap" theory of Government. To assess his personality at a distance is difficult, and in any event probably in the realms of a psychologist rather than a mere lawyer like myself. Sebastian Payne covers the extraordinary fall of Johnson in 263 pages of breathless prose. He looks at the 3Ps, Paterson, Partygate and Pincher and shows how character flaws brought down a man who managed to gain a 80-seat majority. He signed off with "hasta la vista baby". Will there

SAVE OUR SWIFTS! Summer wouldn't be summer without these iconic birds – their soaring flight and exhilarating shrieks. We're lucky to have swift roosts in the Barfords, but swifts everywhere are in drastic decline, partly because nesting sites are being destroyed. Oxfordshire campaigner Hannah Bourne-Taylor has started a petition, supported by the RSPB, asking for 'swift bricks' to be included in all new housing: this would benefit not just swifts but also house martins, starlings and sparrows. You may have seen Hannah's bold protest recently when she marched through London almost naked apart from feathery body paint, gave #TheFeatherSpeech, an impassioned plea to protect swifts, and delivered her petition request to 10 Downing Street. VEGANUARY awareness grows of meat-based diets.

is here - and attracts more supporters each year, as awareness grows of the environmental and climate impacts of meat-based diets.

Can you commit to eating only plant-based food for the month of January? Maybe you feel this would be a step too far, but there can be little doubt left that we must collectively reduce our dependence on meat and dairy products to have any hope of meeting climate targets.

The UN estimates that animal agriculture accounts for 14.5% of human-produced carbon emissions and is a driving cause of habitat loss including rainforest destruction (because cleared land is used to grow animal feed). Reducing or eliminating meat from your diet is described by an Oxford University study as the single biggest change you can make to reduce your personal carbon footprint. The National Food Strategy, led by Henry Dimbleby, concluded that a 30% reduction in meat consumption is needed to ensure food security for the future, while the EAT / Lancet Planetary Health Diet states that a sustainable diet should be predominantly plant-based, with only small additions of meat and dairy produce – i.e. meat shouldn't be seen as a staple ingredient.



There are health benefits to reducing meat, too. Did you know that the World Health Organisation categorises bacon and other processed meats as Class 1 carcinogens? Or that other red meat is classed as 2A: 'probably carcinogenic to humans'? Surely it's time to end our addiction to dietary habits that are bad for the planet, bad for animals and bad for us.

Also you can eat far more cheaply if your meals are predominantly plant-based, especially if you cook from ingredients. It's estimated that a plant-based diet can cost two-thirds less than a meat-based one – another important consideration in this current cost of living crisis.

Find out more, including recipes, at www.veganuary.com. Or, if Veganuary isn't for you, you could:

- adopt Meat-Free Mondays or reduce meat in other ways.
- be aware of which foods have the highest carbon footprint and which have the lowest. There's plenty of information on this, for example from Our World in Data.
- if you do eat meat, choose local and high welfare avoid buying meat from intensive farming systems.
- Widen your range of plant-based meals to cook for yourself and your family find new delicious standbys.
- if eating out, choose meat-free dishes when they're available Veganuary sees many restaurants and cafés making an extra effort.

We urgently have to make the connection between what's on our plates and the climate emergency. Happy plant-based eating!

A Happy New Year to our members, their families and all those in the Barfords. We hope you thoroughly enjoyed the Christmas break with your friends and families.

Club News

Due to the vagaries of the freezing and icy weather conditions last month, we felt we had to cancel our Christmas Social/Quiz planned for 12th December. This will, however, be re-arranged shortly - watch this space for further information.

We're planning a busy itinerary for 2023 to include speakers, trips, our popular 'Nosey Gardens' event and our annual Plant Swap.

Annual General Meeting

This will be held on Monday 6th February 2023 at the village Hall at 7.30pm. We hope as many members as possible will attend this important event. We'll keep it short, friendly and hopefully, informative. We'll present a brief summary of our past year and inform members of our future plans.

One important aspect is to encourage a couple of members to join our Committee. If you would like to join us, you will be very welcome. It only takes up a few hours a month but is very rewarding and we have a great group of committed people on board. To find out more, please contact Trevor, our Chair. (See details at the end of this Report).

Some jobs for January:

January is often the coldest month but as the days lengthen, the garden starts to grow. Now is a great time to plan for the coming gardening year and to order seeds and plants. Enjoy the fresh air on dry sunny days and check winter protection, stakes,

ties and supports are still working after any severe weather.

Put out food for birds and leave some garden areas uncut, a little longer, to provide shelter for wildlife in your garden.

Recycle your Christmas tree by shredding it for mulch or contact Katharine House Hospice and they will collect it in exchange for a donation – see below. Clean pots and greenhouses ready for spring: Dig over any vacant plots that have not been dug already. Disperse worm casts in lawns, inspect stored tubers of dahlia, begonia and canna for rots or drying out.

Prune apple and pear trees and plan your vegetable crop rotations for the coming season. Sow seeds of begonia, lobelia, salvia and pelargonium in a heated greenhouse or propagator to provide early plants. Sweet peas can be sown this month. Sweet peas sown earlier in the autumn can now be potted on, taking care not to disturb the roots too much. Place them on a sunny windowsill or on a high shelf in the greenhouse that gets plenty of light. This is the last chance to sow seeds that need frost in order to germinate (such as native tree and shrub seeds, and alpine plants).

Plant lily bulbs in pots and in borders during mild spells. Summer bulbs, seed potatoes and onion sets will be available to buy from the middle of the month. Cut off old leaves of hellebores that produce flowers from ground level to expose the flowers.

Happy January gardening - maybe from your armchair and keep warm.

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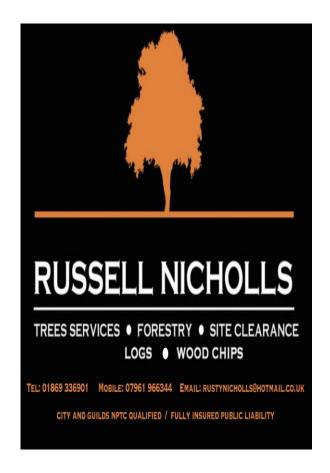
