#### **PARISH COUNCIL NOTES**

A meeting of the Parish Council took place at 7.30pm on 1st September 2021 at the Village Hall and was attended by Cllrs Turner (Chairman), Hobbs (vice Chairman), Best, Charman, Cosgrove, Cox, Eden, and District Cllr Bryn Williams and Mr Best, (Parish Clerk and Responsible Financial Officer). No members of the public attended the meeting.

**Minutes of the last meeting:** It was agreed that the minutes of the meeting held on 7<sup>th</sup> July 2021 were a true and accurate record (unanimous).

Report from County Councillor Arash Fatemian: None

#### Report from District Councillor Bryn Williams:

**Staffing Levels at CDC** – A lot have staff have left CDC, especially in the Planning department. This is likely to lead to delays until they can be replaced.

Civil Parking Enforcement – Under the introduction of civil parking enforcement powers (CPE) later this year, parking enforcement in Cherwell, South Oxon and Vale of White Horse will be taken over from the Police by Oxfordshire County Council. This will result in increased, more consistent enforcement of waiting and loading restrictions across the Districts.

Neighbour Consult planning application letters — CDC were planning to discontinue sending these out but due to pressure from parish Councils have decided to continue notifying neighbours of new applications

**Diversion of footpath at Barford Mill** – District Cllr Bryn Williams has received complaints that the footpath has been blocked but Councillors advised that it has been rerouted with signs to safeguard walkers whilst the Mill is being renovated.

Public Participation: None.

#### Allotments:

Allotment agreements will be sent out later this month. An allotment has become available, and this has been offered to a resident on the waiting list.

#### Parish Matters:

Playground Annual Inspection — The reports detail some recommended repairs. It was agreed that the reports should be sent to the playground committee, which manages the playgrounds, to ask them to carry out the repairs. The Clerk attended a course on playground maintenance run by the Oxfordshire Playing Fields Association (OPFA). It is a requirement to carry out weekly checks on play equipment. It was agreed to pass the information to the Playground Committee to ask them to carry out the inspections.

Cherwell Governance Review – The responses to the questions raised by CDC to all parish Councils were agreed and will be returned to CDC.

No Mow May – The trial was assessed and discussed, and it was agreed that for safety reasons the verges will be mowed next year as normal. The contractors leave sections of verges that have daffodils until they have died back. It was agreed that the area in the Northeast of West Close Playing field will be left unmown again although no volunteers have come forward yet to rake the cuttings up when the area is mown.

Stile on West Close – OCC has advised that they have no objection to the stile being removed from the footpath going out of the Northeast corner of West Close. It was agreed that the Clerk would contact the owners of the nearest house to confirm that they are in agreement with it being removed

**Tree by the bridge hindering visibility** – This has been cut down by the Clerk to improve visibility.

**Bridge Petition** — Approximately 100 signatures have been obtained to put pressure on OCC to repair the bridge as quickly as possible. It was agreed that the Clerk would discuss next steps with County Councillor Arash Fatemian.

Salt Bins — The Clerk has advised OCC of the current level of salt in the bins. It was agreed that the Clerk would check with the Village Hall Committee if there is room next to the new shed to store a pallet of salt bags for emergency use by the village.

**Mowing Status** — All the verge cuts have been completed, 10 Of 12 West Close cuts have been completed and 7 of 10 Churchyard cuts have been completed.

**Finance:** Payments - The Clerk gained approval for payments totalling £2,717.02. The combined bank balances are £10,423.59 after the receipts and payments.



He even managed to visit Vindolanda Roman Fort despite his injured knee and joined us for the final yards of the walk so we could all finish the challenge together.

- Days when waterproofs were needed 2



Are we going to do something like this again? Maybe after we've taken our boots off and recovered a little we might be ready for our next adventure.



#### Reading recommendations from **BARFORD BOOKCHAT**



*Erebus - The Story of a Ship* by Michael Palin. In September 2014 the wreck of a sailing vessel was discovered at the bottom of the sea, in the frozen wastes of the Canadian arctic. It was covered in an opaque coat of underwater vegetation and its whereabouts had been a mystery for over a century and a half. Its name was HMS *Erebus*.

Palin's diligent research uncovers the extraordinary biography of this elusive ship, bringing it back to life by exploring the intertwined careers of the men who shared its journeys: the dashing James Clark Ross who successfully charted much of Antarctic's Great Southern Barrier; and the troubled John Franklin, who at the age of sixty and after a chequered career, commanded the ship on its final, disastrous Arctic expedition to discover the elusive Northwest Passage. An evocative

account of intrepid maritime adventures, reimagined by a seasoned globetrotter. Paul Freeman




A Farewell to Arms by Ernest Hemingway is a tragic novel in five acts, informed by Hemingway's experience as a lieutenant in the ambulance corps during the Italian campaign of World War I. His concise, direct, unelaborate style sustains this moving account of war action and the romance between nurse Catherine Barkley and lieutenant Frederic Henry. Events speak for themselves; where other writers would elaborate on the emotional impact of a mortar attack or escape from prison camp, Hemingway leaves the resonance to be largely inferred by the reader. Early laconic exchanges between the lovers during their escape to Switzerland present Catherine as something of a cypher, or typical movie heroine, but in the climactic finale the simple language and short phrases carry an intense emotional charge. Hemingway was a craftsman: he made 47 versions of the final page of the novel only to return to an early version to complete his

memorable narrative. Trevor Arrowsmith



The High House by Jessie Greengrass. Until recently, fiction concerning the climate emergency has tended to be sidelined as science fiction or fantasy, but it's increasingly obvious that this is the world we live in now. The High House isn't fantasy, nor is it set in some vague future – it could be the day after tomorrow. Its domestic setting centres on two young women, Sally and Caro, Caro's young half-brother Pauly and the remote house on the Suffolk coast prepared as an ark by Caro's stepmother, a climate activist. As the network of support systems fail, they're increasingly isolated; self-sufficient, but for how long, and at what cost to others who struggle to survive? "You think you have time," Sally's grandfather says, "and then, all at once, you don't." A gripping and urgent novel for our time. Linda Newbery



Will Carling: My Autobiography. Even after reading this, I still can't decide whether I like Will Carling. He was a great player. His captaincy of the England rugby union team divides opinion, including among former team-mates, but they had considerable success - surely the only relevant metric. This memoir reveals a man at once thoughtful and boorish, with an analytical but second-rate brain, an apparent cold fish who feels deeply. Any rugby fan will be intrigued, especially as Carling was involved in ending the egregiously unfair system that forced amateurism on world-class players. His friendship with Princess Diana is also diverting. Carling scores extremely highly for his candour. Refusing to airbrush one's faults in an autobiography takes rare courage. I'd like him if he hadn't refused me an autograph when I was 15. Tom Greeves

To join or learn more, contact John O'Brien: john@lcmb.co.ukf **Thoughts Around Positive Change:** Although we assume that we can only have one of two reactions to any emergency situation – fight or flight – we often forget about a third option; freeze. This may be the most natural response to climate change and a whole host of overwhelming bad news stories, particularly when it feels as if our own small efforts are in vain.

We talk about little wins and successes, and the role the individual can play in being more environmentally friendly, knowing full well there are other (bigger) targets that are responsible for a much larger proportion of global emissions, and that ultimately they are the ones who must make significant changes. But, if we all stopped lobbying, demanding better or collectively stopped making all of our own positive changes, then where would we be? It is very human to focus on the most negative aspect of any story, and certainly works well for all of those bad news headlines. But what about the positive impact of the changes that people have been making for the last few decades?

HAPPY CONEWS

If you're sick of hearing negative stories about the climate in the news, and know that you'll be personally more motivated to join in with a bit of positive reinforcement, why not have a look at Happy Eco News? (https://happyeconews.com/).

For example, did you know that Helsinki aims to fully decarbonise its heating systems by 2030 by growing a tropical rainforest? Or that giant pandas have been removed from the endangered species list? Or that Lego has been developing bricks that can be made from recycled plastic bottles?

As individuals, we are by no means perfect (or, at least, I'm not!) but all of those little changes, efforts and thoughts are adding up to something. So continue to recycle, to buy second-hand or more environmentally-friendly brands and to refill your bottles. The hard work and decision-making that you've been putting in hasn't been for nothing. Over 30 ringers from the local area as well as Southend, Bath, London, Birmingham and Leighton Buzzard rang in St Michael's.

## WILD FLOWERS IN THE BARFORDS By Janet Payne & Margaret Murdin

#### WILD ARUM - ARUM MACULATUM

If you have recently noticed a small, very striking column of bright orange berries in the hedge bottom, they are the fruiting

bodies of the wild arum.



This miniature arum lily, which usually flowers from April to May, has many names across the country. These include cuckoo pint, lords and ladies, jack in the pulpit and ruder ones


('willy lily'; sorry, Barford News) because of the erect purple of yellow spadix in a white sheath.



The leaves are shiny and pointed, among the first to appear on the road side in the year. The flower is a sort of fly trap acting as a lure to attract insects under hairs to the male

flowers which are deep within the sheath. The insects then are released and carry pollen to other flowers to cross pollinate them. The roots of the plant used to be used for domestic starch.

The orange berries currently visible are highly toxic to people and animals but not birds. The plant's sap will cause burns and blisters, so is probably best left well alone. There is a purple garden escapee which smells unattractively of rotting meat called 'dragon arum'.

#### OUR VILLAGE SHOW - TO CONTINUE? OR NOT? IT'S UP TO YOU!!



The desert Christians were healers rather than teachers, their wisdom touched the soul. Their counsel came in pithy sayings to individuals which can help us in these autumn days which share the colours and the cold of the desert, though not the heat.

When we talk about desert experiences, we mean times where the landscape of our lives has changed. This year has thrust us into new, difficult and uncertain territory. We are aware of its challenges, losses and even gifts such as the remembered beauty of spring, but now another season has come upon us and the territory is as bleak and uncertain as ever. In the desert a person is very conscious that if attention isn't paid to the surroundings and to the state of body and mind survival may be very short. The need is to find shelter, ration water, not panic.

Paying attention is a theme of desert wisdom. Noticing the impact of the world outside on us and the inner landscape within us teaches us humility, trust and compassion, not least on ourselves, but we need to give time to paying attention.


