PARISH COUNCIL NOTES

A meeting of the Parish Council took place at 7.30pm on 2nd November 2022 at the Village Hall and was attended by Cllrs Sandi Turner (Chairman), Rodney Hobbs (Vice Chairman), Ray Cox, Maureen Nolan, Tom Lovell, District Councillor Bryn Williams and David Best, (Parish Clerk and Responsible Financial Officer). One member of the public attended the meeting.

Minutes of the last meeting: It was agreed that the minutes of the meeting held on 9th September 2022 were a true and accurate record (unanimous).

Allotments: The following points were given in the update:

- There are currently two spare allotments. Residents interested in taking on an allotment should contact the Clerk
- The allotment rent letters will be sent out in the first or second week of November.
- iii. The allotment water has been switched off for the winter and will be switched back on in May 2023 or earlier if it is dry in the Spring.

Parish Matters:

Royal British Legion Donation – It was agreed to donate £100 again this year to the Royal British Legion.

Christmas Lights – The wiring will be repaired by the Clerk, and they will be put in the tree on The Green on 20th November

Defibrillator – It was agreed to purchase a Zoll AED semi-automatic defibrillator with lock cabinet which will be installed at the Village Hall

District Councillor Report

as soon as possible.

The District Councillor report is displayed in the Parish Council noticeboard in Barford St Michael.

Woodland Trust supplied new hedging for the West Close boundary with Murreys Lane – This will be delivered in March 2023.

Vegetation by the bridge – This has been strimmed by the Clerk to improve the visibility.

Vegetation by the road bridge obscuring view – This has been reported to OCC Highways.

Bishops Close sign – The Clerk has trimmed vegetation away from the sign and will contact CDC to replace the posts, one of which is rotten.

Murreys Lane verge vegetation – The Clerk has strimmed the verges and will Thomas Fox to cut them when they cut the other verges next year.

20's Plenty signs for South Newington Road

 These are expected to be delivered early in November and will be fitted by the Clerk as soon as they arrive.

Dog Bin for Barford St John – This is expected to be delivered early in November and will be fitted by the noticeboard as soon as it arrives.

Footbridge on the footpath by The Mill in Barford St Michael – OCC haven't repaired this yet so the Clerk will repair it.

Payments - The Clerk gained approval for payments totalling £1,422.25. The combined bank balances are £12,633.88 after the payments that were approved.

2023-24 Budget – The draft budget, which had been circulated prior to the meeting was agreed and it was agreed that there would be no increase to the Precept for the following financial year.

The 200+ club is a fundraising scheme which supports the village hall. Tickets are bought annually and members may hold as many tickets as they wish. The tickets cost £8 each.



DEDDINGTON Bookworms - Our last book was 'Dear Mrs Bird' by AJ Pearce; a novel with Miss Emmeline Lake as the protagonist, whose ambitions of becoming a journalist appear to be thwarted when she inadvertently secures a job as an administration clerk with Mrs Bird, an agony aunt on a women's magazine problem page. The group enjoyed the book; some especially so and some to a lesser extent.


Universally, it was agreed that the language used by the author immediately transported the reader to London during World War 2 and the social norms of that time.

The reader hears about Emmeline's experiences of friendship, work, love and war including her rather rash decision to answer and publish problem letters on Mrs Bird's 'topics that will not be responded to' list. The letters highlight a multitude of social history issues especially the life of young women in 1941, including deference to parents and authority and what was seen as acceptable or not behaviourally and conversationally. The story also demonstrated how people coped with tremendous threats to life and tragedy with a stiff upper lip, resilience and squeezing enjoyment where-ever possible. Overall it was a hit. Our next book is A man called Ove by Fredrik Backman.

READING RECOMMENDATIONS




Act of Oblivion by Robert Harris is a novel constructed almost entirely from factual material. The words may be imagined, but the architecture of the plot and the identities of most of its characters are drawn from Harris's extensive research. The 1660 Act of Oblivion was the edict that pardoned all those who took up arms against the king, save those who had a direct hand in Charles I's execution. Many of these so-called regicides are already dead, Cromwell included. But one of the most prominent names on the decree that sealed Charles's fate is that of Colonel Edward Whalley who has fled to America with his son-in-law, another regicide, Colonel Will Goffe. The plot's only invented figure, Richard Nayler, is the warped and vengeful manhunter driven by motives both personal and political to track down Whalley and Goffe; he is part detective, part monster and will stop at nothing to track them down. *Paul Freeman*



Remainders of the Day: More Diaries from The Bookshop, Wigtown, by Shaun Bythell. Firstly this book has a terrific title. But it is also a delightful read. Just like its bestselling predecessor (**Diary of a Bookshop**, which was translated into 30 languages) it is a whimsical set of musings by the observant and often caustic owner of a second hand bookshop. Bythell writes beautifully and gives a hilarious and wry portrait of eccentric customers and odd incidents in his book emporium, located in the remote Scottish town of Wigtown. Owning a bookshop is many people's dream - and we read here about the struggles of keeping a small business going, the importance of community, as well as the frustration of dealing with a host of awkward customers. A pleasant diversion, especially on long winter nights. **Suzanne Franks**



Apricot Sky by Ruby Ferguson: happy books about lovable people are as rare as hen's teeth, and should be seized upon as a joyous antidote to gloom and doom. The story spans a summer in the life of the MacAlvey family, the date is 1948, the setting the sublime landscape of the Scottish Highlands. The days unfold, and they are made up of everything which makes life worth living: family, friends, laughter, food, the great outdoors. There is a wedding to prepare for, and the hazards of misunderstandings to negotiate. The book concludes, as it should, with an enchanting proposal of marriage. A set of footprints in the dew of early morning prove that it was not a dream. **Jenny Greeves**



Gilbert and Sullivan: a dual biography by Michael Ainger is a doughty doorstop in which rigorous research places fact above interpretation. Fortunately, both G and S were habitual letter writers, but as we slog through the meticulously-dated yearly round of comic opera writing, contracts with D'Oyly Carte, rehearsal, performance, and celebratory dinners, something is absent: conjecture. Ainger is forensic in locating the facts, but reluctant to say what they may suggest. Sullivan is lauded and knighted, but Gilbert's recognition is confined to the many complimentary *Times* reviews. Why - particularly as the words always come first, we learn? The most insightful passages of commentary are based on Sullivan's rehearsal notes where he itemises meticulously the

conduct of each stage persona he imagines. There are all too infrequent, brief accounts of how Sullivan worked from Gilbert's lyrics, starting with the rhythm of the words, the atmosphere and finally the characteristics of the singer and the character they portray. *Trevor Arrowsmith*

Can we do Zero-Waste Christmas?



Christmas can be a time of tremendous waste ... food thrown away, plastics dumped into landfill and gifts discarded unused. Can we have a happy and festive Christmas that doesn't cost the Earth? Here are some ways to make Christmas **as green as possible**, while saving money too. No apology for repeating several evergreen ideas from last year, many supplied by **Hazel Neal**.

Buy local: support local businesses, producers and craftspeople (for instance at our village market!) – then your money helps the local economy rather than the big retailers.

Avoid food waste: don't be tempted to over-buy! Make a plan that includes using or freezing leftovers.

Eat kindly: Instead of the traditional turkey or goose and pigs in blankets, try a festive plant-based Christmas dinner - cruelty-free as well as reducing carbon emissions. Great meat-free recipes can be found at **bbcgoodfood.com**, at **jamieoliver.com** and in many other places online.

Buy ethical: choose products that are organic, fair trade, sustainable and plastic-free. Buy from companies that pay their employees a living wage. Look for the **Leaping Bunny** symbol on cosmetics and toiletries to be sure they're cruelty-free.

Make or grow gifts instead of buying them. Have you discovered the Orinoco Scrapstore in Banbury (at the site of the old Post Office)? It sells recycled and donated craft materials such as beads, fabrics, pens and paints and much more. There are regular craft workshops for children and adults, and a café too! Other ideas: plant a pot with spring bulbs; make cakes, biscuits, jam or chutney; nit a hat, scarf or sweater.

Avoid cheap novelty gifts likely to end up in landfill!

Buy less! Do Secret Santa for grown-ups in the family or for work – or agree to donate to charities instead of buying presents. **Give experiences instead of things:** tickets to a film or concert, a day out, a course, membership of for instance the RSPB, National Trust or the Wildlife Trusts. **Find gifts that give twice:** support organisations like **Good Gifts, Oxfam** or **Choose Love** by ordering tools, seeds, equipment or clothes for people struggling to survive.

Be inventive with gift-wrap: Avoid glittery or foil wrap which can't be recycled. Re-use gift-bags, tins and boxes, plain paper from deliveries, odd bits of fabric. Plain paper can be decorated with stamped or freehand designs, and tied with coloured string or ribbon. Or make the wrap part of the gift: a tea-towel or scarf, in the Japanese tradition of Furoshiki.

Re-use Christmas cards by cutting them up to use as gift tags next year.



BARFORD GREEN GARDEN CLUB Notes from our Potting Shed – December

We enjoyed a great Talk during November entitled 'The A to Z of Gardening'. Here's Margaret Murdin's report:

'21 members and one guest spent an enjoyable evening in the company of Chris Day, Publicity Manager for Buckingham Garden Centre. Originally from Bury, he's worked all over the country, written extensively for Amateur Gardening Magazine and worked on a Gold Medal winning garden at Chelsea.

Chris' talk, 'The A to Z of Gardening' was meant to be about 'fool proof' ways to garden. I'd expected it to be about plants which start with a different letter of the alphabet but it was far more interesting than that. Chris brought with him a mixture of house plants, bulbs, garden varieties and much more.

He started with 'A' for anemone and showed a beautiful new variety called 'Frilly Knickers'. He explained how and when to take root cuttings. 'B' was for bees and butterflies and how to attract them into your garden and 'C' of course, for compost. We had an interesting discussion about the use of peat free compost and how the profession is having difficulty finding a replacement product that is as good. For those interested, Buckingham Garden Centre still has two products which contain peat.

'D' was for pruning! Then he explained. We have to cut away dead, diseased or damaged wood. Again, there were interesting questions and a debate about what to prune and when. And so, it went on.

'H' was for house plants, 'I' for innovation, and 'K' for kitchen garden. I liked 'L' for layering. Chris demonstrated how to layer bulbs. He brought the pot (made from recycled plastic), had the compost which he'd shown us earlier and produced several packets of bulbs which all flowered at different times. The layering took a few minutes, he made no mess and it all looked easy. He finished the pot off with attractive winter pansies. 'N' was for natives and 'Q' for quintessentially English. 'R' of course was for roses.



Members enjoyed perusing and buying top quality house and garden plants from our speaker, Chris Day, after our November Talk.

Chris brought a rose in a biodegradable bag. The whole thing goes straight into the ground so the roots aren't disturbed.

Chris' talk was everything a good talk should be - engaging, entertaining, informative and practical. He had tables full of very healthy-looking plants which were all for sale at the end. Members bought enthusiastically and I watched. So, if you happen to see Rodney, ask him how his frilly knickers are doing!'

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
