### **Parish Council Notes**

he meeting took place on 3<sup>rd</sup> November at Barford Village Hall and was attended by Cllrs Hobbs (Chairman), Best, Bullard, Eden, Styles, Turner, and Woolgrove. Also attending were Mrs R Watts (Clerk), Miss C Peacock, Mrs G Treen and (for part of the meeting) Mr P Leney.

### **Declarations of Interest:**

Cllr Styles confirmed her interest in Planning Application 10/01508/F; Cllr Hobbs confirmed his interest in Planning Application 10/01557/F.

### **Clerks Report:**

In the absence of a reply from the owners (Mr and Mrs Purton) of The Manor House, Barford St John, the Clerk had reported the overgrown hedge to the Highways Department on 22<sup>nd</sup> October. Mrs Purton left a message for the Clerk on 1<sup>st</sup> November explaining that they were actively looking into the matter; in particular the trees, which they felt were more problematical than the hedgerow. Agreed that the report to Highways should remain active.

Oxfordshire County Council had explained that cutting back the shrubbery on The Rock would necessitate road closure. Works would be carried out when other road works were taking place.

Mr Jonathan Watts had written informing that Barford Church Governors for Deddington Primary School are Barbara Allen and Thelma Moore.

The Clerk had written to Cherwell District Council regarding Review of Members' Allowance to confirm that the Barford St John & St Michael Parish Cllrs had already resolved not to claim allowances.

Mr C Potter, Chairman of Banbury NAG; had written to request £300 towards the purchase of a covert speed recording device for use in Oxfordshire. It was unanimously resolved not to contribute towards this particular scheme.

### Parish Matters

A new nameplate for Lower Street is at Bodicote House and will be fitted by Cherwell District Council as soon as possible.

Works wills be carried out by Oxfordshire County Council to the access to West Close via Murrey's Lane by the end of November.

Cllr Eden reported that a goal post for West Close is being dealt with.

Written quotations are being sought for a Parish Council Notice board.

The Parish Council is anxious to pursue the matter of Rural Exception Sites / Affordable Housing but resolved not to carry out another survey of residents at this time as it would serve no purpose, there being no new sites identified.

### A WEEE bit more help

nother 14 collection banks have been delivered across Cherwell meaning it is now even easier to recycle small electrical items.

Cherwell District Council launched its WEEE (waste electrical and electronic equipment) scheme in February. And since then it has installed the bright pink banks, which can take small broken or unwanted items such as kettles and toasters, at 30 locations.



Cllr George Reynolds, said: "Our new collection banks for small electrical items have proven extremely popular so far. "A total of 18 tonnes has already been diverted from landfill which has saved £1,350 and recycling these items has earned £1,200 which will help us towards our aspiration of having no council tax rise next year. "With Christmas just around the corner there will be a large number of items being replaced and if they're of no interest to charity shops then we can find a use for them." The electrical goods collected are broken down into their constituent parts which can be used to create components for new items.

Larger items such as televisions, computer monitors, fridges and washing machines can be disposed of at Oxfordshire County Council's waste and recycling centres. A bulky waste collection can also be organised at a cost of £20 for up to four large items by calling 01295 221940.

### News from The Warriner School

HIS TIME OF YEAR is both one of my favourite and one of my least liked periods in school. It is a time when; we are starting to



re-adjust to the longer nights and shorter days; the weather prevents students from properly playing at break and lunchtime, releasing their pent up energies; Year 11 start to feel the pressure as their Mock Examinations commence and suddenly the next stage of their life draws into sharper focus; and we all start looking forward to Christmas and the celebrations this brings, both in school, family and in the community.

The "busyness" of the last week is, for me, one of the highlights of the year. We have a particularly busy last week here this time with the usual School Concert and Carol Service, at St Mary's, plus the formal opening of our new farm buildings; 'The Warriner Centre for Rural Education'. This latter development was the brain child of John Hirons many years ago; one that has finally come to fruition. This will provide a bespoke education base on the farm one that will welcome many thousands of school children to the site for many years to come. On average we have over 2500 primary children visit each year!

In our recent staff meeting Peter Hogben, who will be acting Head after Christmas, shared his vision for the school going forward. We are convinced with the measures now in place and with real self-belief there will see a step change improvement in our students' results over the next two years. I will be sorry to leave The Warriner School next month, I have thoroughly enjoyed my time here and as the headline in the recent Banbury Guardian said [it is] "The best job I have ever had". I would like to thank all of you who have supported the school in whatever way during my tenure and wish you all the very best for Christmas and the New Year.

### Barford Green Garden Club Visit to Batsford Arboretum

N THE BRIGHT AFTERNOON of Thursday October 21st seven members of the Garden Club and two guests enjoyed a visit to Batsford Arboretum. Although we had been advised by the Arboretum staff to go in the last two weeks of October, the autumn colours were perhaps not fully at their best – everything this year seeming to be a little later than usual - but nevertheless the arboretum is well worth a visit at any time of the year. It was not until consulting the leaflet based on the trees on the Golden Mile that some of us realised that the smell of candy floss which was unmistakeable in one part of the Arboretum was in fact coming from the Katsura tree which exudes this smell in September and October! Among the most beautiful of the trees was

the Acer in all its many varieties. Past the Great Redwoods and the Cathedral Lime can be found the Hermit's Cave, the bronze statue of the Buddha and the Japanese Rest House which all add to the peaceful atmosphere of the Arboretum.



It was interesting to view Batsford House, home in their early years to the Mitford sisters – one of whom, Pamela, had links with Barford – set in the lovely Cotswold countryside and to look into church with Mitford and Redesdale memorials.



It seems that most of the nine of us were so taken with exploring the arboretum that we did not in the end have time for tea, but at the excellent talk by Sue Burn in September we were told that work is now in progress to build new tea rooms so perhaps time will be made for that at our next visit!

### **NATURE NOTES 92**

The comparison with earlier summer days, the settled conditions of late August, produced by the large high pressure system centred over the British Isles, persisted into September. The first four days were beautiful late summer days of very light NE winds, veering to SE on the 4th. Hazy sunrise and clear, sunlit afternoons were the order of the day, although the 3rd started with chill, thick fog, more dense on the hills, lifting into heavy cloud before the morning sun burned it off. Daytime temperatures held steady at 22° whilst the nights rose gently from 4° on 1st to 10° on 4th.

On the 5th the wind backed to E with a cooler, lumpy overcast and showers, as the weather adopted a more unsettled pattern. The high pressure system, moving away, allowed once more the endless procession of low and high pressure troughs and ridges to roll in from the Atlantic.

The 6th was a day of broken, troubled skies with prolonged showers and periods of heavy overnight rain which came on a high SE wind that veered to SW. There it remained until the 21st, except for a little 'blip' on 17 – 18th when it veered up to NW. Meanwhile, the 7th, 8th, 10th and 13th produced showery rain; that on the 8th, precipitating from a cloudless sky. With awesome violence, a vicious, slashing cloudburst produced torrents of coffee coloured run-off water and shingle in the roadways on the 14th.

In contrast, the 9th, 11th and 12th were beautiful, warm sunny days with temps. holding up at 19° – 22° but nights falling from 10° to 6° on 14th.

The 15th – 19th were cloudier and the winds were cooler, producing a chill factor that belied the thermometer reading of  $16^{\circ} - 18^{\circ}$ . Night temps. became erratic, for instance  $3^{\circ}$  on 17th up to  $12^{\circ}$  on 19th

Slowly brightening, hazy and pleasant late summer days were the 20th-22nd, with the 21st managing to reach  $23^{\circ}$ .

As the wind changed from SW to NE (with savage overnight rainstorms) on the 23rd, the weather entered an erratically unsettled period. The wind adopted a northerly direction until it veered through SE on the 28th to SW on the 30th. The 29th was Vagnerian! Steady rain all day finally cleared after 7.00pm with a furious, furnace-red sunset reflected from the underside of crumpled pillow clouds; and all this above a ribbon of clear, tranquil azure blue across the western horizon.

Anyway, enough of this weather talk – let's see what the bugs, beasties and plants were up to!

On the vapour-trail covered morning of the 1st, I drew the curtains to see three Coal Tits foraging the spent flower heads of *Buddleia*, for small insects



and especially, I imagine, the myriad minute *Lyniphiid* spiders that were now covering the fields with gossamer (which, by the way is our contraction of the old 'Goose Summer' – also known as 'Indian Summer' – the fattening time for geese, in quiet weather, ready for the Michaelmas Fairs).

Big Red- and Buff-tailed Bumblebee queens (*B. lapidarius* and *terrestris*) were greedily drinking nectar to lay down pre-hibernation fat reserves and sinister looking caterpillar-parasitic *Tachinid* flies were lurking on the Michaelmas Daisy flowers. As related in August *N. Notes* this was the afternoon upon which 'my' aged female Common Blue butterfly finally disappeared. About mid afternoon I was surprised by a very large, slow flying 'wasp' droning, with a rustle of wings, across my wild garden. This was another of Bas. Butler's Great Horntails (*Uroceros gigas* – see *N. Notes* for mid-July ) only this one was a male, without the huge egg-laving, 'sting' apparatus at the rear end.

Buzzards were constantly soaring around Steepness and Hempton over these first four days, and Green Woodpeckers were similarly active. Great Spotted Woodpeckers also put in an appearance below Steepness and in the Churchyard. Tawny Owls were also noisy below Steepness and in the vicinity of Lower Street.

A further interesting visitor to the Michaelmas Daisy flowers was one of the larger, robust, white-tailed, dark winged cuckoo Bumblebees, *Psythirus bohemicus*. These lay their eggs in the nest of the ordinary white-tailed bumblebee *Bombus lucorum*.

As the weather became more unsettled on 5th, 'my' two young House Martins decided to fly their artificial nest, that morning. They returned quite frequently to rest and roosted in there at late afternoon. This was indeed an unsettled period from 6th to 15th and little revealed itself for comment, but on the few halcyon days, Buzzards and both species of Woodpecker made the most of it. The Green Woodpeckers especially were still visiting gardens early, and one or two Kestrels started to reappear from their 'shy' period.

A particularly late flying butterfly locally is the Small Copper (and, I think, a Barfords speciality!). It has those glistening, metallic copper forewings which contrast so well with blue Michaelmas Daisies. It lays its eggs, and the caterpillar feeds on, *Rumex* sp. – Docks and Sorrel – in wet meadows. It hibernates as a little caterpillar!

On clear mid-nights, the three prominent stars of Sir Patrick Moore's 'Summer Triangle' were slipping westward and away from overhead. The lead stars of Orion were rising bright in the east, at the start of his winter journey across the heavens. And here of course, I have, with red face, to admit my awful blunder in naming, far too easterly Jupiter, as Venus! (Howls of derision!). Yes, Jupiter, has been prominent high in our night sky for many weeks, as he appears to proceed, then backtrack, and proceed again across the sky, as his year is so much longer than ours. Confession over, I'll move hastily on to other things . . . .

On 17th and 18th my House Martins were still roosting in their artificial nest and Mrs Brenda Twigg informed me that a late youngster was being fed in one of her nests! She also said that her nests had produced six broods – how great is that? Meanwhile, Basil reported a cock Sparrowhawk 'stooging' over St Michael, then racing in to the attack on something near the Church. Mrs Sylvia Butler reported Tawny Owls actively calling from around The Green and Lower Street and they were also calling around Townsend at 9 pm.

Under a warm breezy sun on 20th, I saw a big vellow and mahogany Hornet cruising various flowers in my garden for prey. Then on 21st, a warm hazy sun after heavy mist, revealed no less than five Small Copper butterflies on my Michaelmas Daisies, But, the highlight of the day was a brand new - and unlikely - species for my garden! It had a lucky escape to start with – it was basking on my footscraper! About to clean my boots I spotted this motionless, fairly large, grasshopper-like insect on the scraper. It was quite colourful, rich dark browns and buffs, with a bright vellow outline to its near black pronotum, like a saddle. There was also a bright yellow patch on each side of the thorax and below the wing bases. It also had long, sweeping antennae and an impressive curved ovipositor. I rushed for my handbook – needn't have bothered – the insect was auite unperturbed.

It was a female Roesel's Bush Cricket, *Metrioptera roeselii*, one of the *Tettigoniidae* and closely allied to the *Acrididae*, the grasshoppers. According to my handbook the Barfords seem to satisfy all its habitat requirements – except for one thing, which is – it is restricted to coastal habitats! – which is where I had seen it, only once, before on the Fleet shore behind Chesil Beach in Dorset.

How or why this one got to Barford I don't know, but the last I saw of it was near the roof where it had climbed the stonework to catch the evening sun.

On the 22nd, a Hornet was once more cruising the flowers for prey. Mrs. Twigg reported her House Martins were now gone, as indeed were mine from their roost in the artificial nest.

By the 25th the wind was hovering in the north and the weather was decidedly autumnal. There was beautiful mellow sun and the drift of small, lightly distributed, fair-weather clouds against the tranquil blue of early Autumn skies. From my car, I spotted a Raven soaring over Adderbury Bridge at the bottom of Deddington Hill, a male Kestrel hovering about two metres off the ground, between Chestnuts at Hempton, and finally, a female Sparrowhawk flying low over me as she hunted Steepness, then dashing across my front as I turned into Fernhill!

A Green Woodpecker laughed on and off along Horn Hill through the 26th and a Tawny Owl 'kewick'ed below Steepness at midnight.

The 28th was misty, mild and very still. I noted good numbers of pre-hibernating 7-spot Ladybirds in my conifer hedge. A Buzzard, noisy and rather aimlessly, flew low about Steepness, and I noted that small songbirds were starting to gather and become more active in our gardens.

Following that profligate sunset of the previous night, a clear sunrise on the 30th became hazy through the morning. Cloud, building in the afternoon became complete by sunset with the lightest of SW airs, only to turn from tranquility to bluster as heavy rain and wind washed us into October.

An exciting reminder! You may see a small flock of birds, Starling like but slightly smaller, feeding on BERRIES. They will be milk coffee coloured, have a bulky crest and black mask, Their wings will be inticately marked in black and white with a yellow edge. The tail is deep red-brown underneath, grey on top with a yellow tip. They will be Waxwings, from the far north of Europe. They like do Pyracantha, they are quite tame – and they have been seen locally – so watch out!

I would like to say sorry to my readers for not having caught up to date with the last *Nature Notes* of 2010, but hope to do so for the first edition of 2011! Until then, Happy Christmas and good Nature-watching.
