Parish Council Notes

HE MEETING TOOK PLACE on 5th January at Barford Village Hall and was attended by Cllrs Hobbs (Chairman), Best, Bullard and Eden. Also attending was Mrs R Watts (Clerk).

Apologies for absence: Cllrs Woolgrove; Styles and Turner. Lisa and Derek Styles were congratulated on the birth of their son, Adam on 31st December.

Matters arising not elsewhere on the agenda:

Cllr Hobbs had written to John Hoad at Cherwell District Council to voice the Parish Council's concerns about the proposed e-consultation process for future planning applications.

A large pothole has appeared on the main road in Barford St John. The Clerk will report this.

Footpath re-surfacing works in Broad Close are complete.

Clerks Report and Correspondence:

The trees along the highway at The Manor House, Barford St John still need cutting back. The Clerk wrote to Mr & Mrs Purton on 9th December regarding this issue. There has been no reply to date. It was observed that any works must be carried out before the birds start nesting.

The Clerk ordered further salt supplies for the salt bin on 14th December. Oxfordshire County Council's Snow Guide can be found at www.oxfordshire.gov.uk – N.B. salt provided by Oxfordshire County Council in salt bins is for highway use only and not for use on private property or land.

Atkins Contractors now carry out highway works for Oxfordshire County Council.

The stile south of St Michael's churchyard is to be replaced with a wooden pedestrian gate. The stone wall and slab will remain. The gate will be slightly offset into the boundary field at an angle.

Mr Bunce raised concerns about the boundary wall, which had collapsed at Mill Corner. Cllr Eden said that the wall, on private land, would be repaired in due course

Parish Matters

Works to the steps giving access to West Close via Murrey's Lane have been started.

A quotation of £480 plus VAT from Fairmitre Windows and Joinery for a replacement Parish Council Notice board was accepted unanimously.

The Precept 2011/2012 will remain at £7,000.00. Budget papers as amended and agreed at the meeting on 1st December 2010 will be presented to the Parish Council meeting on 2nd February for final approval.

Any Other Business

Cllr Bullard reported that a parishioner had raised concerns that Deddington Library may be closing. The Clerk was asked to write to County Cllr R Jelf in support of the library remaining open.

Cllr Hobbs reported that he had had requests for more salt bins in the village. The Clerk reported that Oxfordshire County Council has the final say as to if and where salt bins are situated. The cost of each to the Parish Council is in excess of £150 plus VAT. Oxfordshire County Council would keep salt bins stocked as far as resources and supplies allow. They emphasise that salt in these bins is for use on the highway only. The Parish Council will discuss the matter again before next winter.

The Barford Village Hall Trustee Meeting will be held on 2nd March 2011 at 8.30pm in the Village Hall.

The Annual Parish Meeting will be held on 20th April 2011 at 7.30pm in the Village Hall.

There being no other business, the meeting closed at 8.27pm.

The next meeting is on 2nd February 2011.



Upton House & Gardens

A Servant's Life for Me!

HIS WINTER we're exploring what it was like to be a servant at Upton House and Gardens in the 1930s when Upton



was the weekend country home of Lord and Lady Bearsted. Lord Bearsted was the Chairman of Shell from 1927-1943 and was the son of the founder of that company. He and his wife hosted house parties at Upton for their wealthy friends. "A Servant's Life for Me!" offers a fascinating insight into 1930s country house life.

Upton House was very much part of the local community and was a large employer in the area – as well as the house and gardens, the Upton estate also consisted of stables and a farm. We've interviewed people who used to work and live at Upton in the 1930s. Their stories and photographs are displayed in our new exhibition which is a rich source of local history and lets you into a few secrets about what went on behind the scenes!

The House Staff included: a Butler; Lord Bearsted's Valets; Lady Bearsted's Maids; Housemaids; and Cooks. The Outdoor Staff consisted of: Chauffeurs who chauffeured Lord Bearsted's Rolls-Royce Phantom III; Farm Managers; Grooms; and a Blacksmith who lived in Hornton and walked to and from Upton House every day. Many gardeners were also employed.

Although the main house is closed for winter conservation work, the service areas in the basement of the house are open. The newly restored rooms opened for the first time in November 2010. You can experience life below stairs as you explore rooms such as the Laundry, Estate Office and the bedrooms of the male servants.

The attics are open for guided tours and they also opened for the first time in November 2010. The maids' bedrooms were here at the top of the house, located as far away as possible from the male servants in the basement. The tour guides will tell you some intriguing stories. Did you know, for example, that Upton House has approximately 130 windows? Each one had to be cleaned inside and outside by the maids – what a laborious job!

HANKS TO THOSE OF YOU who returned questionnaires about the Church. The last issue of the BN published a summary of views expressed and the PCC has now had a chance to consider these. It is clear that to have 4.00pm services every week suits rather few people. There were also several requests for a larger number of family-friendly services. In the light of this the PCC has decided on the following arrangements for our regular pattern of Sunday services, which will come into operation in April.

1st Sunday of the month. 10.30 am,Eucharist (Common Worship)

2nd.Sunday, 10.30 am,Family Service

3rd Sunday 10.30 am, Family Service

4th Sunday 4.00 pm Evensong (Book of

Common Prayer)

5th Sunday 4.00 pm Holy Communion (Book of Common Prayer)

Generally, all these services will take place at <u>St Michael's</u> with the exception of the <u>5th Sunday</u> service which will take place at <u>St John's</u>. There will be some variations to the pattern above and in respect of the venues to accommodate special events in the Church calendar.

Touching Art Touching You

OUCHING ART TOUCHING YOU, a fresh concept in the visual arts, comes to Banbury Museum on 5 February. The exhibition breaks traditional barriers by encouraging visitors to experience and explore the art on display through touch and other senses. The experience challenges the notion that sight is essential for creating and enjoying exceptional art.

The inclusive exhibition includes paintings, sculptures and installations drawn from the BlindArt Permanent Collection. BlindArt has gained worldwide recognition for promoting contemporary works by visually impaired and sighted artists, showcasing them side by side and challenging visitors to tell the difference. The collection has been exhibited around the UK and in New York.

Banbury the Oxfordshire Museum and Association for the Blind are working in partnership to encourage people across our region, including visually impaired people, to experience this unusual art first hand. Cherwell District Council's portfolio holder for environment, recreation and health, Cllr George Reynolds, said: "Cherwell prides itself on being a district of opportunity and this exhibition certainly proves that. It's an opportunity for local people to experience art in a completely new and thought provoking way. Deddington and District History Society

PETER LENEY of BSM, and Chair of the T E Lawrence Society (with some 600 members world-wide) spoke to the January meeting on T E Lawrence (1888-1935).

Stories of his WWI exploits as 'Lawrence of Arabia' did not really emerge until after the war, but since his death not a year has gone by without a book being published about him.

He was the son of an Eton-educated Irish baronet and it seems his wife's disposition gave him every reason to avoid her and 'carry on' with the nanny

and TEL was one of the results, Lawrence being the name they adopted. His early life was peripatetic as they moved in short order to Scotland, the Isle of Man, Jersey and France during his childhood and later to 2 Polstead Road in Oxford where there is now a blue plaque. TE, went to Oxford High, and then on to University (Jesus) and the OTC, but perhaps, oddly, he hated sport.

It was at the age of 17 that he discovered his illegitimacy, ran away and joined the army, but his father followed him to Falmouth and bought him out.

It seems that there is no firm evidence for his supposed homosexuality; indeed Janet Laurie said he proposed to her in 1910, they had known each other since he was six, but she was more interested in his brother Will.

In 1909 he had been introduced to the Keeper of the Ashmolean who was to shape his career in archaeology. He was interested in the Crusades, and visited the Holy Lands; Beirut was his first contact with the Arab world, and resulted in a thesis and a First.

He decided against academia and returned to Beirut in 1910 as an archaeologist, with trips from then till 1914, and got on well with the Arabs, in an area still occupied by the Turks. Dahoum (Ahmed) became a close friend and nursed him through illness, and the dedication of *The seven pillars of wisdom* (about the Arab revolt) was probably to him. He was involved in fighting in the war, and in the peace settlement, and afterwards joined the general staff as a civilian.

In 1916 there was an Arab revolt in Mecca and around the Red Sea which lasted until 1918. Faisal Bin Al Hussein and TE formed a strong mutual bond, and it was the former's influence that kept TE in the field, rather than being returned to Cairo, but he was not so well liked on the British side. He devised the strategy for the Arab revolt and guerilla warfare against the Turks, mainly used against the railway; he was well aware of the propaganda

effect of such enterprises. When Allenby was sent out as commander they formed a mutual admiration society. In 1917 he led the Arabs attack on Aqaba which fell to them, and the allies launched attacks on the Turkish lines and finally entered Damascus.

The Sykes-Picot agreement carved up the area between the British and the French before the infamous Versailles Treaty of 1919 and the lesser-known Treaty of Sèvres the following year. After the war France wanted rigid enforcement of the Sykes-Picot agreement, supported by the Indian lobby in London; Lawrence was an advisor at the

Versailles conference. It was during this period that he started to write the *The seven pillars of wisdom*. TE thought the idea of Arab unity was a chimera. In the end we got Palestine and the French got Syria.

Churchill was Colonial Secretary and wanted Faisal to run Mesopotamia, he was King of Iraq, from 1921 until 1933, while his brother Abdullah ran Trans-Jordan. The French had increasing difficulties in Syria until in 1936 they signed, but did not ratify a treaty of independence, so it became part of Vichy France in 1940 until


it was again invaded by British and Free French forces, from which Syria forlornly declared independence in 1941.

TE then decided to join the RAF as an aircraftman, and wrote to Hugh Trenchard for help - his motives seem and seemed confused: he said he wanted to write a book about the RAF, but his need for comradeship may have played a part. He at first failed the medical, but did then succeed. His desire for publicity led to his dismissal, he was too well known as an army Colonel to serve in the ranks. Nonetheless he then re-joined the army, in the ranks again. He was turned down again for the RAF, he hated the army, having turned down an offer to write its official history. He threatened to commit suicide and influence got him back in as an RAF clerk, at Cranwell, and then in Karachi, where he did not once leave the camp until posted to Waziristan.

On his return to England he was posted to Plymouth and took to high-speed boating and influenced their adoption for air-sea rescue. In 1933 he bought himself out, immediately regretting it and he was taken back into the Air Ministry, he finally left in 1935 and cycled from East Anglia to Bridlington! In 1934 he died in a motorcycle accident avoiding some children.

The middle East can hardly be said to be more tranquil now than then and if all this seems complicated it is a hugely simplified account both of the life of TEL, and of the Levant!

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

Banbury Rural Neighbourhood Monthly Update Team News

The team have contiued to conduct regular speed operations using both the Laser device and the Speed Indication Device, focused at specific sites in North Newington and Cropredy..

PCSO Angie Alford has been developing the 'Community SpeedWatch' scheme throughout the neighbourhood. She has run very successful sessions in Swalcliffe and Shenington and will soon be running the scheme in the **Barfords**.

Community SpeedWatch is partly about enforcement, but also (and perhaps more importantly) about education. Using a piece of equipment known as a Speed Indication Device (SID), the volunteers and a member of the Policing Team will record details of vehicles exceeding the speed limits throughout the village.

The only way that this scheme can work is if residents of this village really get involved and be available for operations when needed. Giving up an hour of your day could really make a difference. If you would like to be part of your village's Community SpeedWatch scheme, please contact PCSO Angie Alford on 0845 8 505 505.

PCSO Nikki Dale has returned from Maternity leave and is developing links with Primary Schools within the Rural Community. She would like to hear from any schools or parents who would like educational police visits. This can range from 'Stranger Danger sessions', 'Drug Awareness' to specific problem targeted inputs regarding bullying and anti social behaviour. Anti-social Behaviour

The Team continue to proactively patrol the priority areas for Anti-Social behaviour established by the Neighbourhood Action Group. These locations are currently Adderbury, Twyford, Cropredy and Bloxham. There have been just 9 reports of antisocial behaviour reported covering 38 villages. These have ranged from inappropriate vehicle use to drugs intelligence.

Whilst on routine foot patrol of Cropredy, Sgt Riddell caught three young males throwing snowballs at Church windows. Sgt Riddell arranged for the males to attend the church the following week to apologise and participate in the village bell ringing.

PC Miller has identified four males responsible for a series of criminal damages caused at the Warriner School campus during the summer holidays. All four males have made full admissions of guilt and have been dealt with by way of Youth Restorative Justice. The males have been orders to repay the school, complete a community disposal and write letters of apology to the head teacher.

We appreciate the effort taken by members of the public in reporting these matters and will continue to work with Cherwell District Council's Anti-Social Behaviour team and Parish Councils to address the issue.

Crime News

There have been criminal damages to vehicles and buildings reported in Adderbury and Bloxham. These incidents have occurred during darkness hours. and have been un-witnessed but the team are working to establish the culprits.

If you see anyone acting suspiciously, please do not hesitate to contact the police on 0845 8 505 505. If the persons are driving a vehicle, make a note of the registration number and pass this to police. Checks can be made discretely and easily.

Good News Stories

The Neighbourhood Team will be working closely with the 'Youth Activators' team from Cherwell District Council. We aim to assist them in delivering sport to young people between the ages of 11 and 16. In line with the Neighbourhood Action Group priorities the team aim to establish sport for youths in Bloxham and Cropredy where the NAG have identified anti-social behaviour priorities. 
