HAIRMAN RODNEY HOBBS opened the meeting by welcoming the assembled company and outlining the programme for the evening.

He introduced the current Parish Council and apologised for the Parish Clerk's absence. The Parish Council is elected every 4 years. This year 2 Councillors are standing down and are being replaced by Lisa Styles and Sarah Best. Rodney thanked John Langlands for his contribution to Parish Liaison over the past 4 years, and thanked Bernard Lane for his work as Chairman for many years and, in addition to his work on the Parish Council, Bernard has written the council notes for the Barford News every month and sat on very many other committees on behalf of the Council. He also thanked Tracev for her work with the Neighbourhood Actions Group and Ray Jelf and Paul O'Sullivan for their efforts on our behalf with Oxfordshire County Council and Cherwell District Council respectively.

The new council will take over on 10 May and the first meeting will be on Wednesday 19 May, thereafter reverting to the first Wednesday in the month.

Rodney had taken over as Chairman from Bernard a year ago and since then a new Clerk had been appointed. Ro Watts works at Cherwell District Council and is proving to be an excellent Clerk. The Parish Council had held 11 meetings during the year, with a special meeting to discuss a specific Planning Application which had caused a lot of public comment. There is a 10 minute slot for Public Participation each month and the council welcomes comments from members of the public. Rodney added that, several times over the last year, valuable points have been made in these sessions.

Planning: From minor tree pruning to large house extensions, each application is considered carefully. Safety in the village is very important and Bernard, Ray Jelf and some of the village parents had recently met 2 people from Highways to discuss the safety of the Broad Close/Nether Worton Road junction. Steve Wood will be setting up another speed monitoring exercise through The Rock shortly.

Housing: We have been trying to get Exception Housing, but CDC were felt to be unreasonably obstructive until our Council representative spoke up at a meeting on the subject, after which they became more amenable. At present we require 4 houses, and CDC have recommended that we do a housing survey every 4 years. However, nothing has happened since the last one (or the one before that).

Schooling: Deddington and Bloxham Primary Schools are very close to capacity. The Parish Council has been concerned that, if they become full, our children will be sent elsewhere. There is an on-going strategic review of school needs by the county council and we were assured that this would not happen. With regard to the Warriner, we have been given absolute assurances that there will be enough places for our children.

Finance: The precept for the village was held at last year's rate of £7,000.00. Parish Councillors do not claim expenses. Two items of expenditure required more explanation: the Parish Clerk and Grass Cutting. It was necessary to pay the Clerk a reasonable rate, plus her expenses, as there was an increasing amount of time spent on queries and form filling. The budget for grass cutting was £2,500 this year. This is always a difficult topic, but it was felt by the Council that cutting West Close more frequently this year would encourage more use of it by villagers (16 cuts at £85 per cut).

Other items: We looked at school buses using The Park ("Conker Alley"). Dog fouling is still a problem and it is disappointing that people are dumping plastic bags in the hedges. Potholes are a big problem and fly tipping on the Bloxham Road is becoming more frequent.

The pleasant appearance of the village is frequently commented on by visitors and the Parish Council would again like to thank Mick Cook for his wonderful displays of daffodils in the Spring, and Bernard Lane for continuing to mow the village green to such a high standard.

George Parker then gave a short summary of the two village charities, the Shepherds & Bakehouse Trust and the Hall & Fernhill Trust.

The Shepherds & Bakehouse had supported 15 students under the age of 25 who had lived in the parish for 3 years or more at a cost for 2009 of £3,000. Income was £2,864 and was invested in the Charities' Investments Fund. Unfortunately, very little interest was being earned at present.

The Hall & Fernhill Trust had made 26 Christmas gifts of £20 to households in the parish and supported the Deddington Health Centre Minibus scheme. Rent from the Fernhill field was £550 pa, with increases set every 3 years.

Royal British Legion Awards: Rodney made 4 awards to parishioners of the Barfords for their sterling work in supporting the annual Poppy Appeal. The team of 7 volunteers goes round each year, and over the past 15 years they have collected around £4,000. The 4 volunteers who were given awards have between them raised £2,400. Static collection boxes are also stationed at The George and the Village Shop. An RBL Poppy Brooch was awarded to Helen Honour, Ann Budd and Verna

Lane, whilst Bernard Lane, the collection coordinator, was awarded a medallion lapel badge.

Open Forum: It was asked if the Council would consider putting a dog bin on the corner of Mill Lane as waste is being put into the green bin at the Village Hall. This was agreed to be put on the next Agenda.

Repairs to the winter's damage to the roads; cyclists in particular were in danger. Bernard said that some of the pot-holes in Lower Street had been pointed out to Highways at the time of their recent visit and this would be taken further.

The Road Safety Group: it was asked who would be the point of contact on the new council now that Bernard was retiring? This would be the Parish Clerk or the Chairman.

West Close: was it possible to flatten the slope any more to enable a larger football-playing space? This will also be added to a future Agenda.

Road-side verges in Barford St John were being eroded away. It was agreed that the Council would request Highways to have a look at this. It was also agreed to request the owner of the hedges by the roadside to cut these back so that vehicles can pass each other safely.

If speed monitoring is being done in St Michael, why is it not being done in St John at the bottom of the hill? Tracey offered to take this up with the police at the next NAG meeting.

It was asked what power does the Parish Council have over planning decisions by the CDC? The Parish Council has 21 days from the application date to make comments and these are always sent back in time. The Planning Committee is supposed to take our comments into consideration. However, minor amendments to applications are not sent back to the Parish Council. The Parish Council is supposed to be informed if the decision goes against our recommendations. The Planning Committee will take on board any comments it receives from parishioners, however it does have to stick to planning guidelines. It was agreed to discuss this as an Agenda item.

Robin Woolgrove spoke about the Site of Scientific Interest which has been established between Deddington and South Newington, where otter, snipe, lapwing, woodcock and other species are being encouraged and monitored by Defra and the Council for Rural England. The RSPB have said that we have one of the most diverse bird populations in our valley of anywhere in the Midlands. We also have 4 different species of deer. He asked dog owners to be particularly careful of letting their dogs interfere with nesting birds during the season, as we need to keep encouraging these diverse species to make their homes here.

Rupert Moulton gave a vote of thanks to the outgoing Parish Council for their hard work and

this was endorsed with a round of applause from the audience.

Birdies, bunkers and barkies


VER WANTED TO try out golf?

Concessionary Travel: Changes in Eligibility

HE NATIONAL RULES have changed on the age of eligibility for concessionary travel. It means that the qualifying age for a travel pass or travel tokens throughout the country will now rise gradually, from 60 to 65 over the next ten years.

The change will affect anyone applying for any type of concessionary travel whose 60th birthday falls on or after 6 April 2010. The age of eligibility will rise in stages, between 2010 and 2020. The earliest age for men and women to get bus passes will therefore rise from 60 on 5 April 2010 to 65 on 6 April 2020.

Anyone who already has either a bus pass or transport tokens or is already 60, will not be affected.

Cherwell District Council's portfolio holder for planning and housing, Cllr Michael Gibbard, said: "As the changes are being introduced in stages, the date of eligibility for concessionary travel will depend on the month people were born. For example, those born after 5 April 1955, will be eligible for a travel pass or travel tokens from the age of 65."

Deddington Fire Service News

N THE LAST MONTH we have received 23 firecalls of various tyes. These have included two aircraft crashes, three chimney fires, a grass fire, two electrical fires, a wood shredder/chipper, two car fires and a road traffic collision along a few standby's to other stations.

The two aircraft incidents were at the Skimmingdish Lane airfield at Bicester, where the first light aircraft crashed into a crop field adjacent to the airfield, and the second one, a glider crashed into a garden and hedge adjacent to the A4221. Luckily, no one was seriously injured in either of these incidents.

The chimney fires were at North Aston, where a beam in a chimney caught alight at the White Lion pub in Steeple Aston, and the Red Lion at Stratton Audley, which also had a thatched roof. We were sent to back up the Bicester crews who were working hard to prevent the fire spreading to the thatch itself. We also required the use of the hydraulic platform to inspect the thatch and ensure that there were no hotspots left.

The grass fire - well, not much to say about that one. It was a fire, and it involved some grass! The electrical fires were both caused by light fittings. One was in the Castle Quay Centre in Banbury, and the other at an industrial unit on Overthorpe Industrial estate. In both incidents, nobody was injured, and damage was limited to smoke logging.

At Bainton, we attended a wood chipping machine used for crushing wooden pallets, which had caught fire, and then set light to the chipped wood which was piled next to it. We attended as the second pump, assisting a Bicester pump who worked quickly to setup a water supply and bring the machine fire under control. Our job was to tackle the tons of wooden chips that had caught alight and prevent the fire spreading any further.

Luckily, the landowner had a large pond where we could take water from, otherwise we may have needed more pumps to establish a water relay as the nearest hydrant was some distance away from the incident.

There were two car fires in one night at the Upper Heyford base, within an hour or so of each other, and this is suspected as being arson. Oxfordshire Fire and Rescue Service routinely works in partnership with Thames Valley Police in cases of arson and has been successful in bringing offenders to court in other parts of the county.

The road traffic collision happened just after midnight south of Deddington, where a male driver was trapped in his burning car. He was bravely freed by members of the public who attempted to extinguish the car; sadly, we understand that the guy has since lost the use of his legs below the knee.

On a lighter note, at the station itself we can congratulate Sharon Wilson on passing her Breathing Apparatus course and she had her first operational wear at the car fires mentioned previously. We are also preparing Richard Day for his 'fitness to ride' test before we let him loose on the appliance, and we are all keen to get him up to standard and "on the run" as soon as possible as his basic course was cancelled in January due to the heavy snows.

Martin Freeman has passed his emergency response driving test again and I suppose I ought to mention that I passed a Vector assessment which may allow me to go out in charge of the pump at sometime in the future. I'm told that Watch Manager Fenemore can't wait for this to happen so that he can book some time off knowing that the pump will still remain available in the daytime, whilst he tends to his harvest crops.

In terms of other news, we believe that we may have secured another recruit who has passed most of the selection process, and we hope to see him on his basic course by the end of the year. We will also be saying goodbye to our whole-time Station Manager, Paul Debling who will be leaving us in September as he retires from the service after many years. I know that I speak for the whole crew in saying that he will be sadly missed. He has had a positive influence on the station and crew and hopes to leave us in good shape, with good crew numbers, good skill competence and some fond memories of us hopefully.

As summer approaches, we hope to meet some of you at the local school and village fetes. As usual, the requests to come to these great activities are many, and we are trying to get to as many as we can, firecalls permitting of course!

The way things are going to date, I think we are going to have a very busy year. We have already had 100 firecalls by mid May, which is our normal half yearly figure.

At Deddington station, our average mobilisation time (from when our alerters go off, to when we are driving out of the station) is a mere 4.8 minutes.

Considering that not only do we have crew responding from Deddington but also from Barford, Adderbury, Hempton, and Clifton, I think that that is not a slow response time by any means, we can soon be in attendance at any local incident, so please remember that if you need us, the sooner you call us the sooner we will be there, five minutes may seem a long if you are waiting, but I bet it's taken you that long to read this article! (If the editor has not cut it)

Garden Club Visit To Abbey House Gardens Malmesbury

WENTY MEMBERS of the Garden Club visited Abbey House Gardens. Home of the 'naked gardeners' Ian and Barbara Pollard on Sunday 25 April. They are known as the naked gardeners because - you guessed it - they do not wear clothes when they are working in the garden on their own and very little when visitors are there. In 1994 when they bought Abbey House, the house and gardens were in a state of neglect so the couple set about the mammoth task of creating an incredible home and gardens which now attract people from all over the world. To keep the gardens looking at their best one full time gardener and three part time gardeners are employed. The garden has over 10,000 different plants including 2,000 roses. When we visited it was a bit overcast but the fantastic show of over 100,000 tulips in full flower brightened things up.

Not far from the main beds of Tulips is the old Mulberry Tree which is over two hundred years old. It is showing its age a bit and needs support, but all things considered it is doing very well and will probably last a lot longer than all of us.

Not only were we treated to a fantastic show of flowers, around every corner there were some marvellous pieces of art, like a huge fish catching a man, a statue of a monk in contemplation and various pieces of a more abstract nature. The topiary was excellent with Yews and Box trimmed superbly and a fantastic bush shaped into a human face.

The herb garden is surrounded by an almost circular walk way covered in fruit cordons, roses and clematis. In the middle is a pond with a fountain and Carp swimming around. A much larger pond with some huge and colourful Carp was near the refreshment area. It was here that Ann and Janet caught up with Ian doing a bit of weeding, fortunately he was wearing quite a long shirt and knee pads!

Jane and Erika took time out in front of the house for refreshments looking towards the topiary. On the North side of the house the garden drops away down a hillside and you can meander down through woodland plants to the River Avon. It is a tranquil area which is a fantastic haven for birds.

This really is a beautiful garden which is well worth a visit.

HERE COMES A TIME in a lot of mens' lives when they have a little more time, a little bit of money and more energy than is required for the DIY, gardening and other home based activities.



CHURCH WARDEN REPORT TO THE PAROCHIAL CHURCH COUNCIL ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING 2010

Tuesday 29 Apr 2010

BARFORD ST MICHAEL

- 1. **The Log book Terrier and Inventory.** The Log book Terrier and Inventory for Barford St Michael and St John are all up to date and available for inspection.
- 2. **New Aquisitions**. There are no new acquisitions.
- The Church Yard. The churchyard at Barford St Michael continues to be maintained with regular mowing and tidying by the usual gang. One big clean up day was undertaken by Peter Bird and helpers, when quantities of wood and Ivy were removed opening the vista of the church. Thanks to all concerned.
- 4. The Church Building. A Maintenance Inspection was carried out on 12 Feb 10 under the supervision of the architect John Perryman, some small flaking was found in the lower rendering and some of the foot holds up the tower had become loose. A second inspection was made on 15 Apr 10 and these defects were all rectified. John Perryman was satisfied with the repairs and the final certificate releasing the retention, in the sum of £5058.42 was made. This is due for payment as soon as the VAT advice is received from the builder. There is still a final invoice to be received from John Perryman. Other maintenance items eg gutter cleaning have been carried out so that the maintenance plan, which has to be submitted to English Heritage for the next 10 years, can be completed. Now that all works in St Michael's church have been completed, it is time to have the organ tuned. It was not deemed a good idea while the work was in progress.

BARFORD ST JOHN

- 5. **The Church Yard** The Willis's continue to cut the grass and keep the church yard tidy. Our thanks to them.
- 6. **The Church Building.** The gutters have been cleaned out. The West window has further deteriorated and an estimate of £7802 + VAT has been received from Davidson Masonry Ltd, the firm which restored the West window so beautifully and also did the masonry work on St Michael's Tower. The VAT would be recoverable. It is hoped that we will be able to obtain a grant towards the cost. No further progress has been made towards the re-ordering of the church.

MISCELLANEOUS

- 7. The fire extinguishers have received their annual inspection and no replacements are required. St Michaels is open during daylight hours from March the clocks go back in October. It remains closed during the winter but the key is always available.
- 8. Finally, a personal thank you to Cubby Brett who has so valiantly and without complaint undertaken all the Churchwardens duties during the past few months while I have had to be away.

TREASURERS REPORT TO THE PAROCHIAL CHURCH COUNCIL

ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING 2010

The accounts presented are in draft form awaiting the Gift Aid calculation to be added.

THE TOWER

As mentioned in the Church Warden's Report, the final Maintenance Inspection was carried out on 15 Apr 10 under the supervision of the architect John Perryman, this was the second inspection. The first on 12 Feb 10 brought to notice some flaking in the lower rendering and some of the foot holds up the tower had become loose. These having been satisfactorily repaired, the final certificate was issued by John Perryman on 22 Apr 10 releasing the retention, in the sum of £5058.42. This is due within fourteen days of receiving the VAT details from the builder. There will also be John Perryman final invoice to pay when received. The estimated shortfall of £5,000 was probably under estimated and £6,000 was probably more accurate. We have already used up all that was in the Barford St Michael fabric fund. The VAT will be recoverable in due course.

The Tower is now looking superb and all the efforts have paid off, however the story does not end there. We have to maintain the church for the next ten years and submit a report to English Heritage showing that the church is being maintained to the required standard otherwise the grant is in jeopardy of being recalled.

DEDICATED COLLECTIONS

The dedicated collections on the fifty Sundays during the year were down again largely due to the reduced congregations. However £107.76 is awaiting to go to Ghana, with the next people who visit. Donations were also made to the British Legion and the Children's Society. Donations have been received from Whist Drives, Bingo Evenings and the Parish Council towards the upkeep of the churchyard. Also funds were received from the Open Gardens and car parking for weddings funerals and baptisms.

Two deliveries were made to Polly Preedy during the year in the form of goods and money from a regular fisherman who donated £5 on each of his visits. Unfortunately the amount of goods sent this year has been considerably less than previous years.

The Diocesan Quota of £9.566 was fully paid on time and we shall receive a bonus. The Deanery share of £350 and the Benefice Secretarial Share of 1/5 remains on average £50 per month are all up to date. The 1/5 calculation of the total Benefice Quota for 2010 will be £9,987 an increase of £421 over last year.

Unfortunately our income has gone down due to the death of some generous donors, the loss of income from Joan's wonderful Sales and now the Bingo has stopped, so there will be no more from that source. During this year we have received no donations from the Barford Market. However the Book Table at the Market run by Caroline Bird and her helpers generates about £40 - £50 of sales per market. There is a great deal of work involved in this and thanks to Caroline and her helpers for their dedication, it is greatly appreciated.

The Summer Concerts were successful and enjoyed by those who attended, but more local support would have been appreciated, as it was they were run at a loss. Fortunately the sum was underwritten by a generous donor, but the result was somewhat disappointing considering the amount of time and effort that was put in. There is a separate sheet showing the breakdown of income and expenditure. The Ghanaian evening was a huge success, well attended and enjoyed by all. Some members were dressed in Ghanaian costume and slides were shown by the Vicar and David Wheeler. Everyone enjoyed the delicious food that had been especially prepared. The amount raised for the Ghanaian school was £252.91.

Our present financial state is just about holding its own, but we are now scraping the bottom of the barrel. As we are at the moment, we need £20,000 guaranteed each year just to run the church. By July we shall have the Curate in place and we shall be faced with his rent and expenses of approx £250 per month. Unless more income is forthcoming we shall be in the position where we may not be able to meet our outgoing expenses.

Many more people are needed to join the enveloped stewardship, or make direct monthly donations straight to the bank. All it takes, for example, is one less packet of cigarettes or one less bottle of wine per household per week. A small price to pay to keep our beautiful church maintained and running.

Thanks are expressed to those few dedicated to cleaning the churches and arranging the flowers and those who are willing to be on the Readers List. But they are too few and more people are needed to join them – too much is undertaken by too few.

We do not want to be faced, once again, with the possibility of church closure which is something that may rear its head again if more funds do not become available quickly. It's over to you all to respond.

Protecting and improving Cherwell's natural environment

Wildlife in north Oxfordshire will continue to receive vital support from Cherwell District Council. The council has just finished work on a new biodiversity action plan which sets out how it intends to protect and improve wildlife throughout its services. The plan aims to protect and improve habitats and species on property the council owns or has some influence The latest example is a new set of swift boxes which are to be installed at Bodicote House to increase the number of nesting swifts at the site. These add to the council's efforts which also include swift bricks and bat boxes integrated into construction of the new Spiceball Park sports centre. Such action is felt to be vital as these species are rapidly losing places to live and breed. Their new accommodation will give them the opportunity to thrive.

Cherwell's head of safer communities, urban and rural services, Chris Rothwell, said: "These are excellent examples of how support for wildlife can be integrated into council owned buildings. "We also support wildlife through partnerships with a number of conservation organisations. "The Farming and Wildlife Advisory Group helps to protect, create and restore important habitats on farms and the RSPB provides specialist advice to local landowners on management for important species of birds.

"New legislation and planning rules mean all local authorities must carefully consider the impact of development on the natural environment." The new action plan is a significant document in making sure all those involved with the planning process are aware of priority sites, habitats and species. It will also help meet requirements of the government's Natural Environment and Rural Communities Act 2006 and other legislation. Cherwell supports the Thames Valley


Environmental Records Centre to collate and provide wildlife data for use in the planning process.

Oxfordshire records centre manager, Gavin Bird, said: "We're involved in two ways, one is to provide information to the council about important sites, habitats and species and the other is to help the recording groups understand how their work fits in at a district level."

The Cherwell swifts conservation project is a successful community initiative that involves local people recording swift nest sites in their area. Cherwell's Biodiversity and Countryside Officer, Sue Marchand, said: "Over two years, more than 50 parishes have contributed to the project, recording more than 100 nest sites.

"The swifts are due to arrive again soon so I would encourage as many people as possible to get involved."
