#### **Parish Council Notes**

HE MEETING TOOK PLACE at 7.35pm on 2<sup>nd</sup> May at Barford Village Hall and was attended by Cllr R Hobbs, Cllr S Best, Cllr P Eden, Cllr L Styles and Cllr S Turner. Also attending Mrs R Watts (Clerk), and, for part of the meeting, District Cllr P O'Sullivan.

Apologies for absence were received from Cllr R Woolgrove, Cllr T Bullard, County Cllr R Jelf

Election of Parish Council Chairman - The Clerk asked for nominations and Cllr Turner proposed that Cllr Hobbs, who had indicated his willingness to stand, be asked to be Chairman for the coming year. This was seconded by Cllr Styles and, there being no other nominations, was passed unanimously. Cllr Hobbs took the Chair and thanked members for their confidence in him.

Election of Parish Council Vice Chairman - Cllr Bullard had indicated her willingness to stand as Vice-Chairman. Cllr Eden proposed that Cllr Bullard be asked to be Vice-Chairman for the coming year. This was seconded by Cllr Turner and, there being no other nominations, was passed unanimously.

# Appointment of Responsible Financial Officer - Cllr Best proposed that the Parish Clerk be asked to

stand again as Responsible Financial Officer for the coming year. This was seconded by Cllr Styles and passed unanimously.

#### Correspondence

**Thames Water -** The Clerk has written to Thames Water about tankers emptying effluent into the sewage works in Barford St Michael over the period of about one week at the end of March. Thames Water had asked for more information, which Cllr Styles had provided.

The Clerk has received an email from Thames Water stating that last year they wrongly identified the meter belonging to the allotments and that the £500 refunded to the PC had been made in error. However, they did not intend to seek repayment. The correct meter will be re-read on 3 May. If Thames Water is unable to resolve this problem satisfactorily it was unanimously agreed that Cllr Hobbs would report the matter to the Consumer Council for Water.

## Proposal to build new houses on the Barford Road in Bloxham

The Clerk had received a telephone call from Mrs Janice Johnson and Cllr Hobbs a letter regarding this matter in which she expressed her concern over the potential for increased traffic through the Barfords and the lack of primary school places in Bloxham. It was unanimously agreed that the Parish Council would discuss the matter again if the proposals go to the Planning stage.

**Village Furniture -** Cllr Eden reported that the new seat had arrived. He had removed the

damaged VE/VJ Day seat and would put the new seat in place when the weather improves. It was agreed that a plaque commemorating VE/VJ Day and the Diamond Jubilee would be placed on the new seat. This will be an agenda item for the June meeting.

**Jubilee Beacon** - Cllr Best reported that Mr & Mrs Collier have given their consent to have a Jubilee beacon on their land. Cllr Best has applied to the Queen's Diamond Jubilee Beacons organisers to have Barford St John & St Michael included in the national celebration and expected to receive the time for lighting the beacon within the next few days.

#### From the Vicar:

IRST OF ALL, CONGRATULATIONS to all those who have worked so hard on the Jubilee celebrations. It's going to be a great party! We hope to see you in church at 11.30am on Sunday June 3. I'll do what I can about the weather for the weekend.

And as we go into the celebrations things are appropriately upbeat in the Barford churches. After a rather gloomy Annual Parochial Church Meeting (APCM) at which we contemplated the parlous state of our Church finances in Barford, we had an altogether happier Parochial Church Council (PCC) meeting. That might seem surprising given that our Treasurer projects us going broke in the next two or three years, if nothing changes. You can't keep running £3.000+ deficits year-on-year. The good news is that things have already started to change, which is why the PCC meeting was pretty sunny, and I hope that things will have changed further following the open meeting on May 29<sup>th</sup>.

The St John's problem looks as if it has been solved for the next few years. We pay around £1.000 a year on insurance, maintenance and electricity for St John's. A group wishing to use the church as a centre for prayer and pilgrimage is prepared to take on these costs for a period of five years in the first instance. The PCC is happy with this arrangement, though it still needs to be officially cleared with the diocese. This is not redundancy: the church will remain available for parish worship and for baptisms, weddings and funerals and burials and interments of ashes will still take place in the churchyard.

There has also, following the APCM, been some increased giving from regular church attenders and we are hoping that those who attend less frequently will want to increase their contribution to the running of the churches. It is perhaps not widely realised that there is no state or central church funding to support the day-to-day maintenance of church buildings and the ministry and mission of parish churches. We are going to bring into being a 'Friends of Barford Churches' organisation as a way of encouraging regular giving from those who want to see St Michael's properly maintained. There will also be an option for Friends to give towards the maintenance of church life, which costs us most of what we pay out - clergy are relatively cheap but don't come entirely free!

We have set up a fund raising committee and hope that Barfordians will support whatever events are organised to complement the Church Fete.

We feel we cannot ask parishioners to be generous towards their churches without ourselves being generous to others – indeed, generosity is an essential feature of the Christian life. So the PCC has stated an aspiration to give some money away

to charity at the end of this year, if our financial circumstances permit it. But we also want to do more within and for the village. We have one or two ideas about this (see next issue) but we'd be delighted to receive suggestions from individuals and organisations in the Barfords about where the church might get involved. We want in one way and another to be more outward- looking. Our financial difficulties have inhibited us in that aim hitherto but those difficulties are diminishing and can be expected to diminish further as we enhance the contribution we already make to the community.

#### George Wins First Prize Despite Sight Handicap



eorge Nicholson of High Street, pictured with the note he designed to raise money for an electronic braille note-taker. When little George Nicholson started to lose his sight, he became withdrawn and lost a lot of his confidence. But through his love of art and music, the 12-yearold is now living life to the full and embracing his artistic talents.

Last month he was named a winner in the Young Art Oxford competition - despite the judges knowing nothing about his condition, which has left him with less than 10 degrees of central vision. (Most people have 120 degrees). The Barford schoolboy said: "I didn't really think I'd win so when I was told, it was really exciting.

"I was about seven when they told me about my condition. I can't see around me, I can only see right in front of me. But I've got used to it." George suffers with retinitis pigmentosa, a genetic eye condition which degenerates over time. Many of his pictures portray people in shadows, demonstrating the way in which he views the He said: "I really like art, I like using world. pastels. If you'd met him a few years ago, he was withdrawn and had lost his confidence. through his art and the support of Bruen Abbey School, he is so much more confident. He is a very strong boy."

George is now hoping to raise money for an electronic braille note-taker for his school, which will come in handy as his condition worsens. George is already starting to learn braille

He has designed a £30 note which can be sold for a £30 donation to the cause. A note-taker costs around £3,000.

Any additional funds will go towards research in retinitis pigmentosa and helping other children with the condition.

#### DIAMOND JUBILEE BEACON

We now have our own **OFFICIAL BEACON** to celebrate the Diamond Jubilee. This BEACON has been organised by the Parish Council, with kind permission of Tony and Stephanie Collier, of Iron Down Farm.

#### 'TIP OF THE MONTH'

There are lots of perennial cornflowers (Centaurea Montana) in the village. If you cut them right back after flowering in May they should flower again at the end of the summer.

It is time for the Chelsea Chop. Cut back perennials such as hardy geraniums, anthemis and Echinops by a third to half – this will extend the growing season. Cutting out growing tips will encourage the plants to bush out and be compact rather than leggy.

#### Free, Gratis And For Nothing

HERWELL RESIDENTS might now be able to take advantage of a free energy-saving scheme which could save them a small fortune.

Cherwell District Council's partner, the

United Sustainable Energy Agency, has managed to access grants to provide free cavity wall and loft insulation through its Cocoon scheme.

Anyone seeking to get the work done independently could expect to pay a combined cost of £700 for the work which will likely save them more than £300 in fuel per year.

Councillor Debbie Pickford, Cherwell's lead member for housing, said: "I can't see how anyone can afford not to have this work done.

"They will be able to choose between several council-approved local installers who will carry out a free survey to see if the work is needed.

"If so, it will be carried out at no charge and once complete, householders will notice an immediate difference."

Installing double glazing can cut heat loss by around a tenth but having cavity wall and loft insulation installed can almost halve it.

Insulation also helps keep homes cool in the summer as it prevents heat penetration in both directions.

All Cherwell homeowners can now get cavity wall insulation free while loft insulation will be free for homes with less than 60mm of insulation at the moment.

"Those who could afford to have work carried out under the previous deal will have already seen the benefit in their bills," added Councillor Pickford.

"Now even more people can take advantage, regardless of their circumstances, and I would urge everyone to book a survey."

The free insulation offer starts today (Monday, 14 May) and is expected to be available until the end of September this year. Installation should take place within eight weeks with the council's accredited firms.

Readers may remember that last summer - on 20<sup>th</sup> July - *The Boat Project* 'moored' up at The George; over the course of the day and into the evening


over 30 village residents came to give their donations of wooden objects to the project.

If you suffer from hayfever, then –unfortunately- we are coming up to the time of year when you symptoms might start to get worse. You may well have



medication that helps you deal with the symptoms of Hayfever. This is a reminder that if you have had hayfever medication prescribed for you last year at this surgery, then you don't need a doctor's appointment to get some more of this medication. Put in a request for what you had in the past to our Dispensary, and the staff will be able to get the GP to approve the repeat prescription. This only applies to Hayfever medication that has already been prescribed before.
