Parish Council Notes

Following their well deserved rest in August the Parish Council met on 1st September with 5 Councillors in attendance and the Parish Clerk, Ro Watts. Apologies for absence were received from Councillor Styles and County Councillor Jelf.

Minutes of the meetings of 7th June were approved and signed off by the Chairman.

In matters arising from the minutes Councillor Woolgrove reported that the willow tree belonging to Mr and Mrs Rees was now leaning on the bridge. The clerk will investigate.

Dispensation has been granted to all of our Parish Councillors by the Standards Committee enabling them to participate in meetings of the Parish Council when matters relating to Barford St Michael Village Hall are considered despite having personal and prejudicial interests.

Even though the council had not met in August the Clerk had not been idle and she reported the following:-

She had attended OALC training on 8th July covering 'Freedom of Information and Data Protection'.

Letters had been sent to:-

- 1) Mr & Mrs Taylor of Cornerways, The Rock, regarding trimming back of fir trees.
- 2) Mr and Mrs Purton of the Manor House, Barford St John regarding trimming back of hedge.

Oxfordshire County Council had been requested

- 1)To cut back the trees on Nether Worton Road to Great Marsh Gate. Works are to be carried out in the next 4-6 weeks.
- 2)To cut back vegetation up The Rock. They confirmed this will be investigated and if works are needed a road closure may be required due to the location. If a closure is necessary it may be an appropriate time to carry out other necessary works.

Letters sent to Cherwell District Council on 2nd July and 4th August questioning the decision making process regarding tree work in the conservation area had not received replies. This will be pursued

as our views have not been taken into consideration recently.

Tom McCulloch has asked to speak to the Parish Council at the next Parish Council meeting on 6th October regarding affordable housing/rural exception site. Fiona Brown will also attend.

Letters from St. Michael's Church, Barford News and Warriner School Farm had been received acknowledging the grants from the Parish Council.

A National Census will take place on 27th March 2011.

County Councillor Keith Mitchell had asked that it be known that an open meeting will take place at the Town Hall, Banbury on 29th September at 7.30pm regarding reduced spending and entitled "The Oxfordshire Big Debate".

Speed Checks were carried out both ways 50 metres north of the Manor House, Barford St John and at Summer Ley, Barford St Michael from 6th – 14th July. The check showed that there was a problem with speeding in Barford St John but no problem at Summery Ley. The Parish Council thanked Steve Wood for carrying out the survey.

A request to Oxfordshire County Council requesting road marking safety improvements as per Bernard Lane's report dated 27th April has resulted in the white line in Barford St John being removed. Other items are outstanding.

Reference play equipment on West Close. The clerk reported that the Planning Inspectorate's Appeal Decision date 26.07.2005 stipulated that "No play equipment be installed, erected or placed on the public recreation area without prior consent of the Local Planning Authority". The Clerk has spoken to Cherwell District Council Planning Department who had confirmed that under Part 12 of the Local Authorities Permitted Development Regs, planning permission was not required for the erection of goal post(s) on the Site. Councillors Bullard and Eden confirmed that the Playground Committee would fund the purchase of goalposts. Councillors have catalogues to look at and consider equipment

Councillor Hobbs reported that the footpath from the bottom of West Close to Lower Street is clear of vegetation.

Councillor Bullard reported that residents had complained about the condition of the Parish

Council Noticeboard, especially the fact that notices cannot be seen properly. The Parish Council agreed that repair was not an option and asked the Clerk to obtain furniture catalogues for consideration.

Cherwell District Council is developing a Parish Portal which enables Parishes to have their own website without incurring any costs. The embryonic site features Barford St John and St Michael and CDC is anxious to complete the building of the site or to move on to another parish. Councillor Hobbs assured the meeting the website would be in addition to any other publications, newsletters etc already in circulation and was not meant to replace them. Rebecca Dyson from Robins Close has offered to run the website. It was resolved to ask Cherwell District Council to complete the build of the website.


Any Other Business

Start of another school year.

T THE START OF a new school year there are two issues in particular that focus my mind. The first is making sure we start the year strongly, developing the right habits from the off. Developing effective routines and study patterns can are habit forming and we need to do what we can to make

forming and we need to do what we can to make sure the "right" habits are nurtured in lieu of those less helpful patterns of behaviour.

The second issue on my agenda is a focus on the latest examination results; examining what we have done well and those areas where we need to direct our attention to seek further improvement.

On many occasions I have stated that we are not an exam factory simply churning out young people with good GCSEs; young people with no awareness of the society in which they live, incapable of playing a constructive part in their communities and unable to live independently. However, to suggest that this is an irreconcilable dichotomy is too simplistic.

We have a duty to equip students not only with the necessary skills for life but also the necessary evidence of their knowledge and subject based skills to allow them to take their next steps once their time here is over.

This year two students left us without any qualifications; neither student was present in school for months prior to the exams and did not attend an examination. In the past four years we have maintained this pattern. We do not give up on challenging youngsters; we give them life chances. Of the 228 who left us in June 225 were able to follow their plans and aspirations to the next stage of their education or employment.

This year, while our headline examination figures dipped slightly (64%-63% 5A*-C including English and Maths) the proportion of students who achieved or exceeded their potential rose markedly.

Schools are busy places with a wide variety of activities and characters. This variety brings a huge diversity and richness to their culture and makes them wonderful places to work.....most of the time.

Personally I am very fortunate to be a part of the group that will be visiting our partner school in SW Uganda in February. This will be my third visit but this time three colleagues and I will be taking nineteen 15 and 16 year old Year 11 students; we hope that this will become an annual trip for our students. In 2011 and 2012 we have secured British Council funding for this partnership, funding that will allow a number of Ugandan students to accompany their staff to the UK when they return here in June each year. If you would like to know about this please more visit http://www.inspirebored.org/.

At the end of this first week back the number of Year 7 students who we find wandering lost about the site, not being able to find the right classroom has fallen to single figures each day. They have come in and settled very quickly and we look forward to working with them over the coming years.

In early October the Governors will be voting on our proposal to become a Trust School. Many of you will have seen the recent, not entirely accurate, article in the Banbury Guardian about this development. I am delighted that in addition to the original four Trust partners (Kraft Foods, RM Education, Franklin Covey and Oxford and Cherwell Valley College) we have now linked with Prodrive. In essence the purpose of this for the school is to enhance students' opportunities and experiences. To find out more about this please visit our website.

The new farm building is coming on well and is currently 3 days behind schedule. It is due for completion in early November when those who study on the Warriner Farm will be able to have access to purpose built, modern, educational facilities on site.

By the time you read this the outcome of the government's Comprehensive Spending Review may be known. We, along with most secondary schools in Oxfordshire are hoping that there will be a restitution of the planned school capital building programme that has been on hold since June. Should this be the case then we can again look forward to welcoming students into our own Sixth Form.

tasting meeting in July and had a go at carpet bowls in August, but now the first meeting of the Autumn brought out a good number of members. President Betty ran through the business at a brisk pace, mentioning the Skittles Evening on 18th November, the OFWI excursion to the Bath Christmas Market on 30th November and Mariann's recent victory in the form of the WI Cup at our own Village Show.

Our speaker was Vicky Russ, accompanied by her husband, Bob, who are both trainers of many years experience with the St John Ambulance. This was a participation evening and we were divided into teams and given tasks! It was a 'match the correct description with the minor illness' game, with symptoms, presentation, action and outcome for each complaint. The teams generally arrived at the correct solutions, although some had second thoughts about putting butter on a burn (definitely not) and which way to lean someone's head when they are having a nosebleed (forwards). Apart from these minor lapses, we found that, as Vicky had said at the beginning, we already knew the answers and she was just reminding us.

The evening was both entertaining informative and anecdotes were told by Vicky (usually against her husband) which the ladies all found hugely enjoyable. The Flower of the Month was won by Helen with a stunning dahlia, and Pat and Mariann won the raffle.

Deddington & District History Society Deborah Hayter on the seventeenthcentury village

Visit by this well-known historian many members having taken her courses on this fascinating period at the start of 'modern times', when villages began to take on their present look and for which more sources become available and even accessible without palaeographic skills.

Her talk was well illustrated with images redolent of the period, starting with the Tichborne (Hants) Dole of 1670, showing the dependants waiting for their due from the Lord of the Manor, the main economic unit.

Freemen often paid only a nominal rent (only the King really owned land, but modern forms of ownership and tenancy were starting to appear even within the Manorial Court system. The courts did not apply national law, but ensured that local custom was perpetuated by the jury of local, and often aged, men: they stated what the custom was and

literally laid down the law. 'Local' means varied and according to a seventeenth-century treatise for manorial stewards 'the customs of this nation are so various and differing in themselves as that a man might almost say that there are as many several customs as manors or lordships in a country, yea, and almost as many as there are townships or hamlets in a manor'.

In some areas the system was breaking down as the manors were subdivided (Deddington had three manors) and if there was no benefit to be had from a court it would just cease to meet, though in some other places it might still met every three weeks or so.

She showed a fascinating copy of a document from the National Archive detailing how land in Deddington was held, from which this is a brief extract:

'The wife of anie tenaunt diinge in possession shall enjoy the landes and tenements customarie wherof her seyd [husband] dyed possessed duringe her widowe estate living chaste'. The document goes on to list the jurors, how the land is held, the boundaries of the parish, a list of shops and freeholders (who paid a nominal rent) and a statement that there were 'two rows of shops decayed'.

The Tudors set up parishes as the manor declined - ecclesiastical parishes as the modern local government parishes did not come until the late nineteenth century. Parishes kept law and order through the parish constable - the monarch never felt that secure on the throne. The church wardens were responsible for the destruction of rooks and vermin in the whole parish in Charlton even of Woodpeckers. More importantly they set beggars at work once the monasteries were no longer looking after them - as well as looking after widows and orphans. Next came highways and general poor relief. Once the manor no longer appointed the constable he was elected by the parish. Membership of the vestry


included the minister, the wardens and principle locals - a tradition that continues today. All were 'volunteers' and it was not a popular task to be a parish constable or surveyor of the highway as, though expenses could be claimed, there was no compensation for loss of earnings. Apprehending vagabonds could take up a lot of time!

The most onerous duty on the parish became looking after the poor - a tax had to be raised on almost everyone, enough to set the poor on work and relieve those who could not work; the 'old' Poor Law lasted till 1834, on the basis that the poor were actually entitled to relief as a Christian duty. Initially the overseers looked for voluntary contributions until 1597 when it became compulsory. In the end poor relief absorbed 95% of all parish receipts and it was a very personal business as it was as likely as not to be administered by a near neighbour, thought there was an appeal to the local JP; it is worth remembering that is was the 'middling sort' that administered the poor law, indeed an overseer might well have been in receipt as a child.

Church wardens were responsible for the main church fabric (though the Rector was always responsible for the Chancel) and for all records of births marriages and deaths. Also that everyone attended church and for reporting any naughtiness that went on, not to mention Catholics and non-conformists and many other duties any breaches of which had to be reported to the arch-deacon.

Deddington Fire Service News

HIS MONTH HAS BEEN almost as busy as the rest of the year. We have received twenty firecalls in total including a housefire in Hempton, an animal rescue, two caravan fires, a field fire, a road traffic collision, a car fire, and

three false alarms along with a handful of standby's to Bicester and Banbury (as normal) but also three calls in as many days, to standby at Chipping Norton

Alerted by neighbours, we attended a housefire in Hempton which was caused by a pile of DVDs and some blankets that had fallen onto an electrical heater, which was plugged into a 2-in-1 adapter, which was itself plugged into an extension lead, which in turn, was plugged into an unswitched socket. I believe that the heater had an overtemperature sensor which cut out once the heater got too hot, but then reset itself once it had cooled and then allowed the heater to operate again. Eventually the heat melted the DVDs and set the blanket smouldering.

We found that the first floor to the property was heavily smoke logged but no visible flames. After locating and rescuing the owner's dog, we searched the first floor using our hands, and a thermal imaging camera.

After ventilating the property, we were able to make it safe, and remove the damaged equipment. Luckily, the owner was out at the time of the incident, but did return whilst we were in attendance. The brigade was able to offer some additional assistance by calling upon our Red Cross Response Unit who looked after the owner and his immediate welfare needs.

We were also called to rescue a lamb that got stuck in the canal at Somerton, and Watch Manager Fenemore's local farming experience proved invaluable in getting the appliance as close to the incident as was possible, and he even recognised the lamb as one belonging to one of his neighbouring farmers.

One caravan fire was outside the highway's depot near Deddington and the other was in Banbury, near the Hennef Way Waterworks. In both incidents, nobody was hurt or injured.

The road traffic collision occurred outside Hempton, and appeared to be a head-on collision, involving two cars. Both drivers were taken to hospital with some injuries. Luckily, both cars were fitted with airbags which almost certainly saved the drivers from more serious facial injuries..

In Deddington, we attended a car which was reported as having a burning smell in its engine bay. We located the remains of a small fire, believed to have started in the air conditioning compressor, due to an electrical fault.

An officer was sent to Caulcott to investigate

what we term a "late call", where a householder thought that there had been a small electrical fire in his/her heating system, but had self extinguished. The officer was sent as a precaution to check this out. Sometimes Control will send an officer rather than commit us, so that it keeps us available for other incidents. So if you have had a fire that has extinguished naturally, or you have dealt with it yourself, still call it in – play it safe!

This month, we also say a fond farewell to our station manager Paul Debling, who is retiring after some thirty plus years in the fire service. We wish him and his wife all the best and are truly going to miss him. Also, we say farewell to Watch Manager Anne Waters, who after fourteen years in the service has decided to pursue a different direction in life. Anne has had such a positive influence in the brigade by supporting women in the fire service and has been chair of the networking for women group. We'll be having a leaving bash for both Paul and Anne in the near future. At the same time, we also wish to welcome our new station manager Gary Mattingley, who takes over at the end of September.

Gary has served both at Rewley Road and The Slade, in Oxford, before transferring to the Fire Service College at Moreton-in-Marsh.


