Parish Council Notes

HE MEETING TOOK PLACE at 7.30pm on 5th February 2014 at Barford Village Hall and was attended by Cllr Hobbs, Cllr Best, Cllr Bullard, Cllr Eden, Cllr Styles, Cllr Turner, Mrs R Watts (Parish Clerk), County Cllr Fatemian and one member of the public.

Apologies for absence: District Cllr O'Sullivan

Defibrillator: Cllr Hobbs welcomed Dick Tracev from the Ambulance Service. Mr Tracey gave a defibrillator demonstration, emphasising that the machine will not operate if a heartbeat can be detected. The cost of a unit is £1,295 + VAT (reduced to £840 + VAT if ordered through the Ambulance Service). A security box will cost £550 + VAT and this must have a power supply to ensure that the defibrillator battery remains frost free. Batteries last for 4 years or more or after 220 'shock' treatments; a replacement battery costs £150. Disposable electrode pads cost £16. Councillors thanked Mr Tracey demonstration.

Cllr Hobbs proposed that the Parish Council initially buy one unit. This was seconded by Cllr Styles and agreed by all Councillors other than by Cllr Turner, who abstained. Cllr Hobbs will formally ask the Management Committee of the Village Hall if the box can be fitted to the outside wall of the hall. The Parish Council will pay the £30 annual running costs (electricity supply to box). First Aid Courses: Cllr Hobbs has spoken to training officer Kirsty Hawkins and will obtain a cost per delegate. County Cllr Fatemian provisionally agreed a grant of £600 from the 'Big Society Fund' towards the cost.

Parish Council Website: Cllr Hobbs welcomed Emma Best to the meeting. Emma demonstrated the website she had designed for the Parish Council, answering questions as they arose. Cllr Hobbs proposed that Emma be given permission to make the site live. This was seconded by Cllr Styles and unanimously agreed. Councillors thanked Emma for the work she had carried out so far.

The Rock – **Road Closure:** Oxfordshire County Council Highways has approved an application to close The Rock to allow essential work to be carried out to the rock face of Traherne House,

home of Mr & Mrs Greeves. The road will be closed from 24th March for up to 4 weeks. Warning signs will be put in place 2 weeks beforehand.

Coombe Farm, Deddington: Someone continues to remove public footpath signs from Coombe Farm, Deddington. Oxfordshire County Council is dealing with the matter.

State of Village Roads: Mr B Lane had written to the Chairman about the state of the road in Lower Street. County Cllr Fatemian will pass the details on to Oxfordshire County Council Highways Department for consideration. Concerns have been raised by another villager about the road surface up The Rock.

Turnstile House: Cllr Hobbs had received correspondence from Mr Jonathan Hindle expressing concern that the Parish Council had not received detailed drawings of applications 13/01407/F and 13/01408/LB for Turnstile House, even though he had submitted them to Cherwell District Council. Mr Hindle also asked for it to be noted that Cherwell District Council had confirmed that outside lighting and a flagpole comply with the law and constitute no nuisance. The Chairman had responded to Mr Hindle's letters.

Appeal by Miller Homes – development in Tadmarton Road, Bloxham (60 houses).

Reports from Meetings: Cllr Styles attended a joint meeting of Parish Councils on 20th January with Oxfordshire County Council representatives Martin Tugwell (Deputy Director for Strategy & Infrastructure Planning), Tom Flanagan (Services Manager for Planning, Environment & Transport Policy and Lisa Michelson (Locality Manager). The main subjects under discussion were planning, infrastructure and the future availability of school places. Oxfordshire County Council responses to questions were disappointing. County Cllr Fatemian felt that future meetings would open up a better dialogue between the parties.

Any Other Business: Inconsiderate dog walkers/owners are asked to note that dog faeces are dangerous to the health of children and farm animals, especially lambs. They are asked to clear up after their dogs and dispose of the excrement in the dog bins provided or in their own wheelie bins. Failure to do so can lead to prosecution.

A resident had asked Cllr Bullard what criteria there is for grants being given by the Parish Council. Cllr Hobbs said that any local body or charity could apply in writing for a grant from the Parish Council stating the reason for the request. Each grant application would be considered on merit and in accordance with S137 regulations.

The Spirit of '45 is a 2013 documentary film by British director Ken Loach, focused on and celebrating the radical changes in postwar Britain under the Labour government of Clement Attlee, which came to power in 1945. Relying primarily on archive footage and interviews, and without a narrative voiceover, the film recounts the endemic poverty in prewar Britain, the sense of optimism that followed victory in World War 2 and the subsequent expansion of the welfare state, founding of the National Health Service and nationalisation of significant parts of the UK's economy. The film documents the extent to which these achievements, as Loach sees them, have since been subject to attack in the decades that followed, particularly under the Conservative governments of Margaret Thatcher in the 1980s. Loach said that the model for the film was "oral history, with pictures".

Parochial Church Meeting on 28th April (do come: 7.30pm in St Michael's) Cubby Brett is intending to step down as

Church Warden - or perhaps I mean 'is hoping to be able' to step down! Cubby has been hugely efficient in a demanding role and will be a hard act to follow. In fact, I'm not sure we should ask any one person to take on all that Cubby currently does; my sense of things is that the time has come to think about sharing out the duties of Church Warden so that no one is burdened unduly - sharing jobs out is, anyway, in principle a good idea.

A lot of people already do a lot of different things for the churches, looking after the churchyards, clearing gutters, disposing of dead pigeons in towers, cleaning the churches, arranging flowers, opening and closing St Michael's in summertime, raising money and so forth - and thanks to all of you. Running the churches is already very much a co-operative enterprise. If, though, anyone feels they might be able to help with communicating with builders and the diocese about repairs and filling in application forms for grants and the permissions that are sometimes required to undertake work in the churches (part of Cubby's brief at the moment), do please be in touch.

Maybe the most important thing, however, is to establish a group of people who would be willing to share the responsibility of making sure the services happen as they should - which would mean individual members of the group committing to being at certain services (in accordance with a rota) and doing the

necessary. If we could create a team of half a dozen, say, who would be up for sharing this essential task, we would have taken a big step forward.

So that's one ask. Another will be found in the letter you'll get with this issue of BN. Yes, more begging, I'm afraid. Again, if the load is shared it won't be too onerous for anyone. £1 a week more from each household in the Barfords would transform church finances. And do please think about a standing order and a Gift Aid declaration- such a declaration needs only be filled in once and covers all your giving to the Barford Churches.

And now the good news. David Benskin, the Deddington Children's and Youth Worker has started work in Barford. He is involved in the Family Services on the second Sunday of the month but is hoping to be able to start an activity with the young people of the village in addition to this. If you have any thoughts on what you would like to see happening in the village for younger Barfordians, please let us know.

Please note the Ash Wednesday Service in St John's (March 5th, 7.30pm) and that on Mothering Sunday we shall be having a 10.30 am service in St Michael's instead of the usual 5th Sunday 4.00pm Communion service in St John's.

If you'd like to join a Lent discussion group in Deddington, please let me know. Lent, austere as it is, is good news too and worth keeping in whatever way seems appropriate (fasting? praying? giving?). If you are fasting though, note that Sundays aren't in Lent. Every Sunday is a remembrance of Jesus' resurrection, the best news of all and fasting on

Sundays is therefore just not on!



regulations regarding memorials in the churchyard. If you go to the Oxford Diocese website at



http://www.oxford.anglican.org/ and look for Parish Administration/Revised Churchyard Regulations, you will find the regulations set out clearly as to the type of stone to be used, the size and shape of the memorial and other relevant information. The regulations also set out what can be left at the grave with regard to toys, animals, plastic flowers, etc. These should only be left at the grave for a period of 12 months and silk flowers should be changed seasonally. Also the restrictions on the type of flowers or bulbs that can be planted on the grave are set out.

Everyone will agree that the churchyard should be a place of dignity and beauty, and if those who are thinking of putting a memorial in place could read the regulations it would be appreciated to save embarrassment at an emotional time, and care and consideration should be taken before ordering a stone.



From The Fire Station

IRE AND FLOODS! Being a firefighter at Deddington is starting to feel like a full time job, as we are being called out day and night for long periods of time. We have had more than our normal share of

chimney fires and the flooding has started to stretch our resources to the limit. We went to a chimney fire at a very large manor house that was three storeys high. We were faced with the downstairs of the house filling up with smoke and I had to deploy two of the crew in breathing apparatus to start extinguishing the fire. What made matters worse was that smoke was seeping through the chimney into other rooms in the house. I quickly realised that this incident was going to need more resources and called for another crew which came from Charlbury. We decided to tackle the chimney using a two pronged attack. My crew gained access to the roof and worked from the top down and Charlbury worked using chimney rods and a stirrup pump to extinguish it from the bottom up. Finally after five long hours we managed to put it out. When we investigated hot spots in some of the rooms we found that there was charring on timber plugs that had been banged into the wall to fix the skirting boards onto. With an incident like this you have to be sure that the fire is completely out before you can send a message to conclude it. Even so you still have to leave it open to go back four hours later to re-inspect. We finally got back to the fire station at 1 a.m. but then had to go back at 5 a.m. to reinspect. I can never sleep if we have a reinspection. Please can you get your chimneys swept because chimney fires can quite easily turn into house fires. Your chimney should be swept at least once a year or twice if used extensively.

We have just come back after being out all night supporting the high volume pump at Abingdon Road Oxford, pumping water to keep the area from flooding and at this moment we are succeeding. As the rain keeps falling the main problem doesn't seem to be whether or not we can pump the water! It's where we can pump it to, so that we don't displace it to cause a problem elsewhere. That's where the high volume pumps come into play, because we can pump water miles away. We have also spent time pumping water from properties in Adderbury and Deddington and again we would like to thank the public for their help and community spirit which makes this such a great place to live and work.

We have now completed our fire behavioural training, honing our skills in real fires that we create in huge shipping containers. We build a fire in the container and get the temperature up to where it can flashover and then using very limited

water we cool the gasses to stop the flashover. As we are in the container we can't afford to use more than a few litres of water because at 500 degrees centigrade steam expands 3400 times in volume which can pressure cook you. With our modern equipment and training methods we can drop the temperatures from 700 degrees down to 200 using very little water.

Congratulations to FF Lewis Mahoney who has just successfully completed his basic Breathing Apparatus training meaning that we have now got twelve out of our thirteen crew that can wear B.A. leaving just FF Colin Smith who is booked on his course in June. I would also like to congratulate Crew Manager Graham Harding for passing his I.C.S. assessment (Incident Command System). All the managers are tested every two years to make sure that they have kept up with all the training and are competent to manage incidents.

On a final note I would like to tell you about the Four Farms Challenge which is a 5k and 10k run around the Deddington Parish farms. We are organising this event on Sunday 18th May in conjunction with the P.F.S.U. and the P.T.A. Down On The Farm

VAGUELY RECALL my college notes telling me that one inch of rainfall equates to 100 tonnes of water per acre. On that basis our top fields, which add up to around 45 acres, off-load in the region of 4500 tonnes of wetness for every inch of rain that falls onto already saturated land. Small wonder our drive, which stands in the way of it flowing to our lower fields, has been partly washed away!

For those of you who have visited the farm or the Meat Joint in recent weeks I can only apologise for the state of the drive and say that it will be repaired - but not, unfortunately, until the rain has decided to fall elsewhere.

Frankly a fractured driveway is a small price to pay compared with the devastation in other areas. The misery caused to homeowners, farmers and businesses in those areas is beyond calculation. We, like many others, have offered help through the National Farmers' Union since we do have some surplus straw we could spare but such is the swell of offers that we are 'on file' against a worsening situation.

Main job this month is to get the breeding ewes into the big barn which is now full of strawed pens. We have left them out for as long as they seem happy (not easy to tell with sheep) but they now need to come in for extra food which dictates a round up fairly soon. The problem is that, ideally, they need to come in dry and finding dry days at present is a bit like finding an egg in a cockerel's pen; however we only need one (dry day that is) and the forecast suggests we shall get one or two shortly.

The malting barley seed is due to arrive any day but it will have to stay in its bags until we can get to plough the land. I had hoped to get it planted early to give it a good start but am now resigned to the fact that we must wait until field conditions are suitable.

The pigs meanwhile lie contentedly in their strawed pens heedless of what goes on outside. Incidentally don't ever share a bed with a pig - not that you would even contemplate doing so. I walked past one of the yards last night on my way to shut the chickens up and the racket was unbelievable; twenty or so pigs snoring in deafening unison! On my way back I was delighted to see a pair of barn owls fly out of the implement shed; we have not had barn owls here for two years since our last pair vanished and hopefully these newcomers will find the place to their liking and stay on.

NATURE NOTES 125

HAT A WINTER! Not a winter of cold (so far) but a winter of water. Despite my old weather-saw prophecies and a few chilly spells, this has been a very mild



winter -just rain - and what rain! One cannot escape the premise that there is something uniquely significant about this winter's presentation.

According to many climate experts, the origin of the present conditions originates in Malaysia and Indonesia with long term extremely high temperatures. This has disrupted the normal weather patterns of the northern hemisphere by introducing large bends in the Jet Stream which have allowed warm air northward consistently over areas that would normally experience colder conditions. The deep southward bends in the Jet Stream have permitted more extreme incursions of arctic air, such as those which have recurred down the Americas. We, in the UK, are north of one of these steep southward loops of the Jet Stream, but the proximity of the Atlantic ocean (with, of course, the Gulf Stream) means we have been buffeted by constant 'warm' SW winds. Because of their warmth, these winds carry vast quantities of evaporated oceanic water, and when they are pushed up over land they cool, lose their capacity to support evaporated water and deposit it on us, as rain.

To this end, I have analysed the rainfall since October and annotate below the days of each month on which it has rained - and most of it has been of significant quantity.

Last month, I minimalised my notes on the weather to avoid boring repetition, but I hope you will agree that, given the last six or so week's conditions, especially for those poor souls in heavily flooded areas, some concentration on the subject is appropriate.

And so to what is happening amidst our wildlife.

Mid January, despite conditions, produced Green Woodpeckers making considerable noise below Steepness, Indeed, some Blackbirds and Songthrushes were in full song on brighter days. The 19th was one such day and this also brought a Buzzard soaring, and Rooks nest building on Steepness. As I drove home around midnight there seemed to be foxes, several in pairs, watching from the verges of the roads almost everywhere.

I have added the letters H (heavy) S (storm) and F (flood). The latter indicate <u>only</u> the day of rain which caused flooding at Barford Bridge, not its persistence.

Rain causing road to flood heavily on 8 occasions.

I do hope that you agree that current conditions warrant the importance I have given them here.

Arriving home, there was a Tawny Owl hooting its beak off on Hempton Hills.

The Green Woodpeckers seem water and cold proof, being frequently noisy right into February. The Buzzard had another spell of soaring on Steepness on the morning of 25th January, but the dreadful afternoon storm put an end to all that.

In the evening many villagers enjoyed themselves at a quiz in the village hall; The warmth and noise, together with the delicious smell of food being served, brought a fine Peacock butterfly out of hibernation, to the delight of us villagers. The insect dived and swooped over the tables (I wondered if it was anticipating a share of the spicy dishes) for some time before finally disappearing. Where it went I don't know, but hopefully it found a cool, dark spot to continue its slumbers until proper spring arrives.

Finally, a very soggy, totally waterlogged January washed away and into February.

There was now very deep flooding again in the Rivers Swere and Cherwell Valleys, the road between St. John and St. Michael being closed to all traffic.

The floods between the two villages provided a wonderful spectacle of Gulls and other birds from the roadside footpath and along Blackingrove.

- I checked them over and came up with the following results:-
- 2 Great Black-backed Gulls (quite unmistakable, these were present near the Milton gated road on our early January bird count).
 - 75+ Lesser Black-backed Gulls.
- 50+ Common Gulls, which very unusually outnumbered the ever present Black Headed Gulls, of which there were about 30.

There were two Buzzards in beautiful condition, showing great interest in the edges of the flood waters, probably looking for distressed or dead animals such as Voles and Moles. The female Buzzard was a large bird with a pale breast, the male was noticeably smaller, plumaged in deep rich browns. There was a smart male Kestrel further along Blackingrove and on the surrounding dry (just!) areas there was a flock of about 120 Fieldfare (no Redwings) and 120 Starlings.

Next day was Candlemas Day

If Candlemas Day dawns bright and clear, We get two winters in one year.

Well, of course we do, if you think about it, but it was always held to mean we would get a snap of hard weather in February or March, so watch out think of the Arctic ice storms down eastern America - if that 'blip' translates across the Atlantic, we could get a dose! But Candlemas Day or not, that old Green Woodpecker was laughing below Steepness again! In the afternoon I was driving up over the lip of Irondown when, just in front of me, a rough looking Buzzard crossed over the road, no more than 300-450mm above the tarmac. He glided out of a gate from a ploughed field, through a gap on the other side of the road and out over Grove Ash. Another few yards and I would, sadly, have hit him.

People had started remarking on the Hazel catkins appearing on the hedge rows and even the Pussy Willow, here and there. There were not only Snowdrops, but Crocus, Daffodil buds and Aconites in their gardens, if that's what you could call the slurry that used to be soil!

On a heatless 3rd, 5th and 6th, Nature had crept back under cover (except you-know-who, laughing below Steepness). On a bitterly cold, but sunny 7th, I watched two Ravens soaring, then suddenly diving out of sight over The Daedings in Deddington.

There was now heavy flooding again at Barford Bridge and really harsh storms with roaring gales. By the 12th, all the Rook and Jackdaw nests had been destroyed and blown out by the winds on Steepness. Huge rainfall had produced run-off from fields such that normally unaffected roads were flooded, even on high ground such as near the airfield approaching Bloxham.

Again there were huge deluges, driven horizontally on crashing gales through the 14th. Now, as I write these notes on the 15th, there are rushing squalls and the floods are high again at the Bridge.

It is a little milder however, and that perpetual SW wind has veered toward NW. The Met. Office is telling us over the television that there will be some relief from severe weather over the coming days. I think we are all for that, whilst still keeping a weather eye open on the snowstorms that have just occurred in America. Please can we have some more seasonal weather, but not that!
