Parish Council notes

A meeting of the Parish Council took place at 7.30pm on 3 June 2015 in Barford Village Hall and was attended by Cllrs Hobbs, Styles, Eden, Best, Hanmer, Campbell, Turner, Mrs Watts (Parish Clerk and Responsible Financial Officer) and District Cllr Williams (part). Apologies were received from County Cllr Fatemian.

Minutes of the last meeting: The minutes of the Annual Parish Council Meeting on 6 May were unanimously resolved as a true record of the meeting and signed by the Chairman.

Dog bin for Bloodybones Lane: a dog bin has been purchased for Bloodybones Lane and will be installed as soon as possible.

Debris in the stream in Mill Lane: The Parish Clerk had reported the matter to the Environment Agency. They advised her that the riparian owners of the land either side of the stream were responsible for keeping the stream free of debris. However, in this instance they would consider dealing with the matter as they were already in the area.

Proposed wooden play equipment for West Close: The Parish Council has been given documentation that indicates that Cherwell District Council has been incorrect in informing the Parish Council that planning permission would not be required for a scheme. The pre-application advice enquiry with CDC has been reopened in order to clarify the position. Competition winners: seven children entered the competition and councillors judged the entries. The winner was Jack (aged 6). Ellie (aged 8) and Hattie (aged 7) were runners up. Each will receive a small prize.

Internal audit - end of year accounts (2014-2015): the accounts for 2014/15 have been approved by the internal auditor, with no matters arising.

Noticeboard in Townsend: Cllr Hanmer has made a metal grill for the noticeboard in Townsend to prevent notices being blown away by the wind.

Weed killing: At the request of residents, the Parish Council arranged for weed killing to be carried out in certain areas of the village by certified specialist contractors. Residents may be assured that the herbicide used is nontoxic to humans, animals or other wildlife, even before it has dried.

Get working on those entries and gentlemen – Have a go at the cake recipe below

Cherry and almond cake

Village Show Class 24 (Men Only) Ingredients

200 grams natural-coloured glace cherries

250 grams Self Raising flour

225 grams butter (softened)

175 grams caster sugar

3 large eggs (beaten)

2 - 3 drops almond essence100 grams ground almonds6 tablespoons milk

Loaf tin (23 x 13 x 7cm / 9 x 5 x 3 inches)

Preheat the oven to 170°C/gas mark 3/325°F. Halve the cherries, wash them in a colander under cold water, then pat them dry, toss them in some flour and shake well to get rid of excess. Cream the butter and sugar until light and fluffy. Gradually add the beaten eggs and almond essence, then gently fold in the flour and ground almonds. Fold in the cherries and then the milk and spoon the thick mixture into a lined and buttered loaf tin (23 x 13 x 7cm / 9 x 5 x 3 inches) and bake for ¾-1 hour, or until a cake-tester comes out clean. Leave in the tin on a wire rack until completely cooled.

From the Fire Station

Road traffic crashes are up this month with a particularly bad one on the M40 involving a lorry and a van where sadly someone lost their life.

It is a real reminder that keeping a good distance from the vehicle in front is the way to stay safe. Today there was a call to a motorcyclist that had come off his bike just outside Hempton. He was ok but we quickly realised that the road was very slippery and had to call out the environment agency to deal with it.

Since we have gone regional with our control room, false alarms to properties with smoke alarms are down. I would like to mention a chimney fire that was caused by a birds nest.

With the weather still getting quite cold at night just remember jackdaws, especially love to nest in chimneys so make sure your pot is covered with a cowl.

Half of the crew had a training day honing our skills on water rescue. All the crew are trained to level two water rescue, which means that they are able to enter the water coarse to rescue people. The fire engine is equipped with dry suits and throw-lines and wading poles to enable us to do this whatever the time of the year.

The training day was different from any other that had been run before. Fire crews are already trained in water so they wanted to see how we would deal with real incidents and gave us many different scenarios. The day was a real success and such an improvement on other courses that tend to favour using power point slides.

The crew have also been busy using our new BA (breathing apparatus) compartment searching procedures and have spent the last few weeks doing scenario drills at a vacant building at the Horton Hospital. All the crew are now totally up to speed with the procedure.

Firefighter Lewis Mahony and Firefighter Nikki Isted are doing their BA team leaders' assessment this month.

This is one of the toughest assessments you can do as a fire fighter. It is a level up from being able to look after yourself in a burning building to leading a team and looking after their welfare. They were supposed to be doing it with Firefighter Tom Hall but sadly Tom has ruptured his Achilles tendon and will be off for several months. All the crew miss him on station and we wish him a full and speedy recovery.

Maggie's 50 ride



George Williams writes:

Maggie's 50 is a circular fifty mile bike ride from Barford St Michael out to Boycott Farm Shop on the outskirts of Stowe School Estate near Buckingham where we stop for refreshments and then ride back via a different route. This is the fourth year the ride has taken place.

The purpose of the ride is to assist in raising funds for the Maggie Harvey Trust, which has already raised over £100,000 which is channelled into brain tumour research via

Just Giving. Maggie's daughter Ruth and her best friend Nicky travelled from London and Porthcawl to be present. Sadly Ruth was nearly moved to tears on several occasions during the day.

We still had 56 paid entries with 53 opting to ride, which was slightly less than last year but a really good turn out on the day despite the weather.

We had five support vehicles and drivers; Julia Streeter, Pat Evans, Stewart Crichton, and Ray Potts who doubled up as marshals at the main junctions (in the rain), and Simon Williams who drove the rescue vehicle. The marshalling schedule, the risk assessment, the route hazards, and insurance were all compiled with a lot of expertise and hard work by Tony Shrimpton.

We set the riders off in small groups for safety reasons, and unfortunately some missed the group photo at the start. Rachel Reeves, Mick Pearson, Jess Latham-Ward, Tom Bradley, Paul Evans and his two friends were among the first time participants who completed the course in good time.

We were also joined by a group calling themselves the 'Valley Girls' from Somerton and North Aston and the chairman of 'Banbury Stars Cycling Club', and a few of their cyclists The Route was again extremely well marked out with direction arrows put up by David Sewell and Mathew Pride.



Because of the weather forecast the riders were advised to bring a change of clothes which were taken over to Boycott Farm by one of the support vehicles. The rain just seemed to have targeted the day. The conditions were wet as it drizzled and rained continuously but it was not unpleasant until restart after Boycott Farm. Helen Amanda and Helen's son Owen again looked after us at Boycott Farm Shop where we had the use of the marquee and were provided a discounted menu. Some including myself opted not to change our clothes at Boycott Farm because it felt

quite comfortable while taking refreshments inside. However when stepping out to remount the bikes the wet padding on the cycling shorts turned ice cold! (Quite a shock and not a pleasant experience!). So I promptly reversed my decision.

Two had punctures: Jim Templer (twice) and me! Poor Jim opted to be transported back from Boycott Farm Shop after his second puncture. I had my puncture about two miles out from Boycott Farm on the return leg. I was very tempted to join Jim on the rescue vehicle back home, but Richard Hefferan appeared on the scene so I rode back with him. (Damn It!) Despite the route being well signed Richard Hefferan had previously missed the turn at Somerton and did an extra six miles (shame!) but still completed the ride at pace using the GPS on his mobile.



We were again looked after at the George by Martin the landlord who had put up his gazebo for shelter for the people manning the BBQ. The BBQ was manned by Tony Lowe, Tony and Stephanie Collier (from Iron Down Farm) and Stewart Crichton's wife Joyce. Emma Bradley and my darling wife Sally (I have to say that!) made the salad to accompany the BBQ food. All appeared to enjoy the food but there was a problem with the paper plates which had a tendency to fold spilling the contents. ('The Pound Shop' is being struck off our list of approved suppliers!)

The ride has never been promoted as a race. The achievement is to complete it, but again some opted to ride at pace, and there were some amazing performances. Gwen Fowler was the fastest lady completing the ride in 3 hours 18 minutes. Pete Wheeler was awarded the prize as the most improved cyclist finishing in 2 hours 58 minutes.

Steven Rooney was awarded the Golden Brick because he had appeared to falsify his start and finish times, but we later found the poor chap had been set up. Incredibly Jered Allcock completed the course in 2 hours 6 minutes breaking his record of 2 hours 15 minutes set last year. (An average of 25 mph - amazing!) He was awarded the green T-shirt.

To-date we estimate we have raised around £1200 to be donated to the Maggie Harvey Trust but we won't know the exact amount until we have received all the sponsorship money. We have again received some generous donations from friends in Barford. A big thank you' to all who participated, assisted, supported the BBQ, and donated to the ride.

Update by Sgt Becky Fishwick

Unfortunately this month we have seen a spate of crime in Twyford and Horley. On 10 May, in the early hours of the morning, in Twyford there was a burglary to a property where an Audi was stolen from the driveway. On the same evening a motorcycle was stolen and there was a theft of number plates from a car. CID officers at Banbury are currently investigating.

Overnight on the 2 May in Horley, ten properties had sheds and outbuildings broken into and items stolen. We are still trying to identify those responsible.

Anti-Social Behaviour (ASB)

We have seen a slight increase in ASB over the last month with damage in a number of parks. We are working with residents and parish councils to deal this. I appeal to any parents who allow children out later at night that they know where they are, who they are with and what they are doing.

We continue to get reports of children under 18 drinking in parks, being involved in ASB and committing criminal damage.

This will not be tolerated. In the past play equipment has been damaged in Bloxham preventing its use and this is unacceptable. If you are found to have committed criminal damage you can expect a visit from the neighbourhood team.

I would like to make myself very clear on a few points. If you are found to be buying alcohol for persons under 18 you will be prosecuted. If you are under 18 and found in possession of alcohol in a public place, it will be taken from you disposed of and your parents will be informed. If you get caught on three occasions within 12 months you risk being arrested. This may sound like we are taking a hard line but we want to make sure that the children in our villages are safe and not putting themselves at risk.

News from Cherwell District Council

The results of an 18-month examination into Cherwell District Council's submitted Local Plan have concluded the document is sound with modifications and can proceed towards adoption.

The council has published the findings of Government-appointed Planning Inspector Nigel Payne's examination of the draft Local Plan, which will guide the delivery of 22,840 homes and 200 hectares of employment land between 2011 and 2031.

In his report Mr Payne concluded the council had complied with all of the necessary legal requirements in preparing the plan and had allocated suitable sites to meet the district's future growth.

Cllr Michael Gibbard, Cherwell's lead member for planning, said: "Mr Payne supported all of the sites allocated for housing and employment with some modifications and did not propose any additional sites for development.

His report is the penultimate stage of a ten year process to get a new Local Plan adopted and having received the report, the final stage is for councillors to accept the Inspector's recommendations. If they do, the Local Plan will be implemented with immediate effect.

"The adoption of the Local Plan and the fact we now have a five year land supply will discourage inappropriate and speculative applications as we will have a legally sound document which clearly defines our approved sites for development. "Cherwell will no longer be held to ransom by opportunistic developers and will once again be in charge of its own destiny."

The Local Plan was first submitted to the Government for consideration in January 2014 and was followed by an examination in public in June the same year. However the examination was suspended until December to allow Cherwell to revise its housing figures in line with Oxfordshire's recently published Strategic Housing Market Assessment (SHMA).

Following a three week hearing at the end of last year involving more than 150 interested parties, Mr Payne retired to consider his recommendations and offer any amendments. Although he has made no changes to the location of sites for housing or the quantity allocated, Mr Payne has reduced the amount of employment land in Banbury bordering south Northamptonshire by 36 hectares. This site had been allocated for mixed employment uses but Mr Payne concluded that a smaller site would be more appropriate.

The other significant change was the removal of the council's proposal for allocated 'green buffers' of land between urban and rural areas to protect their separate identity. This was removed as Mr Payne considered it to be unnecessary as other policies and the adoption of the plan itself would offer the same protection.

Subsequently, the document proposes 7,319 homes for Banbury; 10,129 homes in Bicester and 5,392 homes elsewhere including a total of about 2,361 at Former RAF Upper Heyford. To support economic growth, the plan delivers 61 hectares of employment land in Banbury and 138.5 hectares in Bicester.

The Inspector's report and the Local Plan will now be put before a full council meeting on 20 July and if members agree to adopt the plan, it will be implemented with immediate effect and used to guide all future planning applications.

Golden oldies - caring for elderly

pets: vet Sophie Hanmer writes:

The age at which a pet becomes 'senior' is not the same for all animals. A six year old St. Bernard may be elderly, but cats and smaller breeds of dog, may only show signs of ageing over the age of ten.

Certain diseases are more common in ageing pets. Changes such as drinking and urinating more, weight loss, a ravenous or decreased appetite, vomiting, and diarrhoea, can all be indicators of illness. As cats get older they become more likely to develop kidney disease, high blood pressure, and an overactive thyroid gland. In dogs arthritis is common, especially in larger breeds. Different forms of cancer are also much more prevalent in older pets and symptoms can vary including weight loss, a swollen tummy, or lumps and bumps in the skin. And as pets age it is not uncommon for their eyesight and hearing to deteriorate, they can also suffer with senility and incontinence. It is a good idea to take your senior pet for routine check-ups with your vet.

More attention should be given to their coat, teeth, and nails. Cats are very clean creatures but with age a combination of arthritis, dental disease and senility can mean they no longer look after their coat properly. If they are not groomed regularly they may develop matted fur which can be painful. Dental disease is common in older dogs and cats. Symptoms include bad breath and a reluctance to eat hard food. Eyes and ears may need cleaning, and nails clipping, on a regular basis.

Food formulated especially for senior pets may be more suitable as activity levels decline and energy requirements change. Some diseases which occur in old age such as kidney and heart disease may mean a prescription diet, available from your vet, may be more appropriate.

Making a few adjustments in the way we look after elderly pets can help them live out their senior years as comfortable as possible.
