PARISH COUNCIL NOTES

A meeting of the Parish Council took place at 7.30pm on 7th June in Barford Village Hall and was attended by Cllrs Turner, Styles, Hobbs, Eden, Best, Charman, County Cllr Fatemian and District Cllr Williams and Mr Best (Parish Clerk & Responsible Financial Officer).

Minutes of the last meeting: The minutes of the Parish Council meeting on 3rd May 2017 were unanimously resolved as an accurate record of the meeting and signed by the Chairman.

County Councillor's Report from County Cllr Arash Fatemian:

Following the county council elections on the 4th May, no particular group had a majority (more than half) of elected councillors. The Conservative group has been joined by two independent councillors to form a Conservative Independent Alliance. Arash reported that he will be serving for another 4 years.

District Councillor's Report from District Cllr Bryn Williams:

Due to the General Election, CDC is in a state of Purdah to ensure that nothing is done or said that might give an advantage at the national level. Bryn did, however, advise the Parish Council of the new responsibilities of our 3 district councillors in the forthcoming year. They are:

Weeds by bridge – These are obscuring the view to traffic coming in the opposite direction. These will be cut down by the clerk on 8th June 2017.

HEDGEHOG MATTERS – JULY

The Our Barford hedgehog Facebook page is now up and running now at https://www.facebook.com/groups/145109997 8269355/ It is called Our Barford hedgehogs. This is a good way for people to post their sightings of hedgehogs, how many they've seen and how many white spots it had on its bottom, if any! Pictures of any new hedgehog holes for access or hedgehog houses made, wild areas created or whatever else you want to share is what the site is for. If you are putting sightings on why not put on the time of evening and your rough whereabouts on your road too so that we can begin to get a picture of where they are roaming. If you see a dead hedgehog on the road then that's useful though very sad to post too. The site has been set up in Tony Ecclestone's name. Using Facebook is a first for me and I will post through that for now. By having a separate site it keeps all things hedgehoggy in one place and won't detract from other useful news on the Barford general site.

Sarah from Robins close who works in the field has also very kindly done a map so that we can log holes and sightings for environmental records that I believe can be handed in for official statistics so thanks to her for that. Look out for this at a village market soon. I am also going to do a map for children to mark their sightings and holes on. Lack of time means that a hedgehog afternoon for children and possible box making session for anyone hasn't progressed far yet so watch this space or and notice boards. In the current weather, I doubt whether any hog would want to be in a box during the daytime anyway.

Consider shutting garage and shed doors before dusk and perhaps open and close them as you need them after that. There was a recent incident on Robins Close of a hedgehog being shut overnight in a garage and I have heard of previous incidents not in Barford where they have been trapped in garages and died from starvation or dehydration. Once hedgehogs are out after dusk they will explore all areas available for food and cosy nest sites including garages. As they normally only forage for food and drink at night, then if trapped soon after dusk they won't have access to food or drink during their waking hours. Their natural instinct then tells them to sleep during the day in sheltered places so you probably wouldn't even know if you had one in your garage unless you uncovered it by accident as was the case with this one. In this heat or indeed any weather it would probably only take a couple of days for a hedgehog to become very dehydrated and hungry.



Our three regular hedgehog visitors who could be seen together in the early evening in spring seem to have dispersed more to other areas of the

village and are visiting our patch at different times of the evening. There have been sightings behind the pub and regularly on Robins close. My own feeling is that they use the old largely untouched hedge line bordering the back of Church Street and Broad Close for hibernation and then disperse in the summer. They can change their daytime hangout sites regularly and one of these must be around Robins close as they are seen feeding regularly there after dusk. If young hedgehogs are to be seen it is round about now onwards so let's hope that one of them has found a mate and managed to mate successfully.

There was plenty of pre-mating activity going on a few weeks ago but we had thought that there were two females and one immature male. Hopefully we were wrong! I wouldn't normally handle a hedgehog unless there was a real need because they are wild animals but in order to help us monitor them I am in the process of marking them with nail varnish which is harmless and will come off eventually. White spots on their bottom will help us monitor how many there are and how far each one is roaming. We can't really do that properly because most of that will happen during the night but when we do see them if we record the sightings either on Facebook or on paper which you could give to me then we can get a better idea. "One spot" is last year's juvenile who emerges locally at dusk and has still been seen hanging around a few hours later so you may not see him because it is probably late by the time he ventures elsewhere. Wherever they are they will be very grateful for shallow bowls of water if they're passing. It's a bit of a lifesaver in this weather.

PLANT SWAP Our annual get together took place on Thursday 25th May. Once again Sarah Best very kindly agreed to host it at Street Farm, Barford St.John. The evening weather was good, apparently not so many plants as usual were brought, but everyone enjoyed the evening and certainly enjoyed Sarah's snacks.

FUTURE ACTIVITIES It would be good to do Nosey Gardens again this year and we have a few offers from members. Are there any more people willing to have their gardens viewed in an informal way by members only? These visits have been popular so far and it would be good to keep them going if we can.

A visit to Pettifers garden is currently being organised. It is in Lower Wardington just outside Banbury. - £8 for entry, guided tour and tea and biscuits - no minimum number. They have a lovely illustrated blog which is updated very frequently, well worth looking at. It is a garden of 1.5 acres and in 1984 it was created from a 'blank canvas'. They are not open at weekends but an early evening, maybe a Monday, in the next couple of months would be nice. We are waiting to hear from them and you will be informed of the date and time. They are soon to feature on Gardeners' World! That should help to get you interested. Another suggestion that has been made is to go again to Michael Heseltine's garden or Broughton Grange. No talks have been planned for the Autumn...any ideas gratefully received.

JOBS TO DO IN JULY Check clematis for signs of clematis wilt; organise care for houseplant while on holiday; Water tubs and new plants if dry, but be water-wise; Deadhead bedding plants and repeatflowering perennials, to ensure continuous flowering; Pick courgettes before they become marrows; Treat apple scab; Clear algae, blanket weeds and debris from ponds, and keep them topped up; Order catalogues for next year's springflowering bulbs (yes it is that time again); Give the lawn a quick-acting summer feed, especially if not given a spring feed; Harvest apricots, peaches and nectarines. All this information and much more can be found on the RHS website, with more detailed information on Ponds, Lawns,Trees and Shrubs etc.

From the Fire Station The crew were called out 17 times in the past month. Unlike most

other months nearly all the calls were to fires. The biggest fire was at Mondelez "formally General Foods" in Banbury. The fire started in one of the pump rooms and the fire quickly developed. When crews first arrived at the scene the flames were already coming through the roof. Ten fire engines and the hydraulic platform were quickly in attendance. Our crew was tasked with supplying the water for the incident. Mondelez has its own very large water main. Being able to supply very large amounts of water to the blaze quickly brought the fire under control. The hydraulic platform was used to apply large amounts of water through the roof whilst crews fought the fire from inside the building. Within three hours the fire was extinguished and the crews had managed to contain it with no fire spread to other parts of the building.

Another fire was to a house at Bicester. Our crew was already on route to a standby at Bicester fire station. The house had been struck by lightning and the fire quickly escalated. The fire destroyed the roof and the first floor of the property. In contrast, our crew was called to a fire in a street lamp in Steeple Aston and several other house fires. There was a computer that overheated, cooking being left unattended and a light fitting that overheated. None of these incidents escalated.

Deddington has attended more car fires than usual. One in particular could have easily been more serious. A camper van was parked quite near a house in Banbury when it set on fire. The crew manged to put the fire out before it reached the house but not before it had completely destroyed the van and a section of the nearby fence.

Deddington has been involved in two training days in the past month. One at the fire collage at Morton in Marsh. This was an Incident scenario day which involves Incident command and breathing apparatus wearing. The other being an RTC (road traffic collision) day. The two days are run exactly the same where incidents are set up to simulate real life events. Everyone that took part passed and the feedback from the instructors was very positive. An operational bulletin has been sent to us this week telling us that there is a nation recall on Beko tumble dryers. Our recommendations are that no matter what type of tumble dryer you have, you should check with the manufacturer that they are safe and not had any issues. I think that all appliances are potentially fire hazards and should never be left unattended. Unfortunately, Deddington has had several crew leave us over the past months. Colin Smith, Michael Kolinski and Graham Harding have left due to work commitments. Deddington has now gone from fifteen down to twelve crew. Generally, there is a waiting list of people that want to join us so we have new recruits starting to go through the recruitment process. Deddington is always looking for the right people to join our station. DEDDINGTON BOOKWORMS MONTHLY BOOK REVIEW

Bookworms recently read '**Suite Française**' by **Irène Némirovsky** which portrays life in France from the beginning of June 1940 until July 1941.

Némirovsky originally intended this would be an epic novel written in five sections. The group



noted that Suite Française did not seem to be completely edited but the true story behind this makes it all the more poignant. The author had intended to revise the first two sections

but was arrested and taken to Pithiviers internment camp, then to Auschwitz where she died in August 1942.

The first part of the book, 'Storm in June', focuses on the lives of a few people who represent the myriads of citizens fleeing Paris in widespread panic as German forces were about to invade. The selfish behaviour by some of the bourgeoisie is sharply detailed.

The second part, 'Dolce', is more of a narrative with a rural setting. The Germans stationed in the village are from a cavalry regiment and the humanity of the individual soldiers shines through as the inhabitants adapt to a different way of life. All agreed the book was a worthwhile read.

NEW CHURCH FOOTPATHS

There is a final bit of 'i' dotting and 't' crossing to be done, but it is hoped that we will have new paths through the old churchyard (from Chapel Cottages to the porch and from the porch to South Newington Road) by the end of August. Inevitably there will be a bit disruption when the existing paths are dug up and a concrete base put down. This will probably take place in the last week of July or first week of August. At the same time the path from Chapel Cottages down to the new cemetery path will be levelled out making it easier and safer for the pall bearers to take coffins down for burial.

At the end of August, a top coat of resin-bonded gravel will be added to the concrete paths and we should then have new attractive paths that should last a lifetime.

Down on the farm....

The shearing gang arrived, as they always do, full of old jokes and repartee. They left, as they always do, with less to say and looking as if the first couple of pints wouldn't even touch the sides. Contract shearing is a tough job. The sort of work that when you pull the first sheep onto the shearing platform it pays not to think about the five thousand or so that are to come!



The ewes always seem relieved to be free of their winter coats. But the lambs can appear confused for a time. I suppose it's like coming out of

school and seeing all the mums in their altogether and trying to figure out which is yours.

The next big job will be haymaking; always an anxious time given our catchy weather. I remember once going to the demonstration in Wiltshire of a prototype mobile hay drying machine. As I neared the location I noticed a huge pall of billowing black smoke rising into the sky. I suppose most inventors have their bad days; the machine never ventured from its prototype stage. There have been several attempts at artificially drying wilted grass into hay. Few have worked and those that have were hard to justify on a cost basis: much cheaper to make the wilted grass into silage.

We have made baled silage in the past, and still do so in a wet year, but we find baled hay better fitted to our feeding system.

I have an old photograph somewhere showing two tractors equipped with sweeps (long tined rakes) that literally swept the swaths of hay to an elevator feeding a hay stack. There are six men in the picture – two on the stack, two feeding the elevator and two tractor drivers. The wages bill today would be prohibitive! It would have taken a long day to clear 10 acres and, on top of that, the old timers would have had to turn around and thatch the ricks afterwards to keep the weather out.

Nowadays one man can bale the swaths into big bales and turn around and collect the result in a day; no sweating, grunting or constant reaching for the bottle of cold tea. The hardest physical work, if there was no barn handy, would be to throw a plastic sheet over the stack of bales. Old stagers like me now hang pictures like my photograph on the wall, if they are not too crippled with arthritis to reach that high, to remind themselves of those bucolic days when jobs like forking several tons of hay into an elevator in high summer was the norm.

It may have been hard work, but it had its fun working in a team with all the leg-pulling and wise-cracks. It can be a lonely job these highly mechanised days with just the dog or a radio for company.

PS: The fox has just devastated one of our batches of hens. Actually, I think it was a couple of grown cubs because they only ate three of their prey and left the other 19 corpses for me to clear up. It is a risk one takes with free range poultry.

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
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
