### **PARISH COUNCIL NOTES**

A meeting of the Parish Council took place at 7.30pm on 1<sup>st</sup> November in Barford Village Hall and was attended by ClIrs Turner, Styles, Hobbs, Eden, Best, District ClIr Williams. and Mr Best (Parish Clerk & Responsible Financial Officer).

**Minutes of the last meeting:** The minutes of the Parish Council meeting on 4<sup>th</sup> October 2017 were unanimously resolved as an accurate record of the meeting and signed by the Chairman.

County Councillor's Report from County Cllr Arash Fatemian: None

District Councillor's Report from District Cllr Bryn Williams:

**Waste Charges and Fly Tipping** – Following the introduction of a charge at council tips for non-household waste by Oxfordshire County Council there has not been an increase in fly tipping so far.

**Boundary Review** – There is a proposal for the formation of a new parish of Upper Heyford, Heyford Park and part of Somerton. 97% or Somerton residents are opposed to this.

**Phone Boxes** – CDC are looking at the condition of phone boxes and removal of the ones that aren't used much. The phone box in Barford St Michael has already been removed.

**Anti-Holocaust Definition** – CDC has agreed to adopt the anti-holocaust definition.

#### **Parish Matters:**

**Play Equipment on West Close** – The working group presented the 3 quotes that have been received. They are for wooden structures that will blend in to the environment. It is aimed at covering a wide range of ages. Children were surveyed on requirements. The next steps are to finalise the design, call a village meeting, go to pre-planning, commence fund raising and apply for grants. The Parish Council and the Play Area Committee responsible for the play equipment at the Village Hall intend to make donations.

**Gate to footpath from Graveyard** – This has been left open and sheep have escaped. This has been adjusted so that it shuts more easily. Parishioners using this footpath are requested to take care to check that the gate is shut properly.

Handrail to bridge for footpath over River Swere – This has now been mended.

**Gulley emptying** – The clerk has received complaints about road flooding due to gulleys not being cleaned. Oxfordshire County Council Highways has been requested to investigate and rectify. **Request for an Allotment** – A request has been received from a Parishioner for an allotment. This has been passed to Jeff Elliot who co-ordinates the allotments.

**Cherwell DC Focus Group** - the Parish Council has been invited to a Focus Group meeting to give feedback on the services that Cherwell District Council provides. The clerk will attend this meeting.

**Parish Liaison meeting** – Cherwell District Council has invited the Parish Council to the Parish Liaison Meeting. Cllr R Hobbs, Cllr L Styles and D Best will attend this.



### BYGONE BARFORDS Taken from November 1975, No. 8 Editor: Mrs M Hunt of Swere Villa, Lower Street

"The last issue of the Village News Sheet appeared in April 1974 and since that time several changes have taken place in the village. Perhaps the most noticeable are the grassing of the Village Green and completion of the Village Hall renovations.

The Village has seen the (temporary?) loss of its cricket team – apparently for the first time in over 30 years. As it is International Women's Year perhaps the ladies could have sported a side, as has been suggested by several villagersI The Barford Drama Club has also ceased to operate.

The Hempton Ladies Circle disbanded in July owing to lack of support. It originated in July 1964 in Mrs Riley's lounge and flourished for eleven years – having coffee mornings, speakers on subjects such as acupuncture, drama etc., and outings, whist drives and carol singing.

The Women's Institute and Babysitting Group continue to flourish and also the Country Dancing.

The Brownie Guides is now well established, as is the Chapel Sunday School and a Pre-School Playgroup is due to start next April. It is good to know that so much is being done in the village for children of all ages.

The Village Bus is still only a once a week affair despite the large increase in population recently. If you feel this is not sufficient, perhaps you could let the Editor know, as several people have expressed the need for a daily bus service, as we used to have about five years ago.




Thank you very much to everyone who bought a pumpkin or squash from outside my house leading up to Halloween.

### Down on the farm

I am often asked how it was I became a farmer considering that my parents were not in farming. All I know is that it was a passion from a very early age.

Actually, my mother was the daughter of a farmer and almost all her relatives farmed in Yorkshire. When I was a small boy my father was in the army, mostly overseas, and mother took various jobs to eek out the family funds. As a result, being something of an encumbrance, I was often parked out with various of her farming friends and relations.

Thinking back, I am always struck by the sheer hard graft the farm women endured. There was little for them in the way of 'mod cons' on most farms. Water would be pumped from a well, toilet facilities were invariably in a shed at the end of the garden path and, as daylight dwindled paraffin lamps would be lit. Only one uncle who farmed in a village had electricity and I was fascinated by being able to flick a switch when the whole room would light up – just like magic!

While farming men would work from dawn until past dusk their womenfolk put in even longer days, often not sitting down to sew, or darn socks, until late in the evening. As a result, I was usually left to my own devices and spent my days wandering around looking for birds nests, watching work being carried out on the farm and generally 'messing about'.

An exception was my Aunt Phyllis. A tall, stern, gaunt woman she had been a school teacher before she married. She didn't do 'messing about', indeed she considered it necessary to instil some learning into my little used brain.

Even the Italian and German prisoners of war sent to help on the farm seemed scared of her; a Regiment of Aunt Phyllis's may well have shortened the war by a couple of years.

The day I arrived I was told that I must learn a new word every day. A new word a day will give you a useful vocabulary of 100 words in a year, she

stated (hopefully her teaching had not included mathematics). Otherwise, she added dismissively, you will grow up to be an ignoramus like everyone else around here; an unflattering aspersion presumably aimed at her immediate family, friends and neighbours.

Some days later I was standing by the garden gate trying to digest the latest 'new word' when a local youth appeared on his bicycle. Hello, I called out. He turned in his saddle as he cycled past and, seeing my diminutive figure shouted out: Bugger off. Well. Imaging my excitement. This was entirely a 'new word'.

A minute later I burst into the kitchen where Aunt Phyllis glanced up, knife poised over a partly peeled potato. Well Tony, what have you been up to? Keeping out of trouble I hope, she added severely. Drawing myself up to my full height of three feet something and sticking out my puny chest I grinned at her.

Bugger off, I said.

Lying on my bed behind a locked door, nether regions smarting from the beating they had endured I listened, stomach rumbling, to the murmur of adult voices and the sound of cutlery scraping almost empty plates downstairs. Learning new words, I reflected, was a risky business. I should employ my brain in a different direction.

That may well have been the day I decided to become a farmer

#### **HEDGEHOG MATTERS**

All quiet on the local hedgehog front, unless you know otherwise? I last saw a hedgehog on 21st October which is about the same time that last year, the largest healthiest looking of three hogs disappeared off the scene for the winter. It had plenty of fat reserves to see it through. It was hard to tell the size of the recent one because it scuttled off into the undergrowth when it heard me and headed to the deluxe hedgehog house where I'd also seen it heading a week before. That is filled with hay and dry leaves, deep in the undisturbed undergrowth with an overhead ivy canopy for an extra roof. Though not small, it wasn't an enormous hedgehog either so hopefully it's an adequate weight to survive the winter with the added help of its great location. I didn't want to stress it out by pursuing it through the undergrowth to weigh it. It was still mild then, but insects and other natural food had become scarcer so through October I'd started putting cat food out to help it put on a bit of weight. Every bit will help if it's a cold winter. To avoid local moggies finding this in the same place, I randomly catapulted it spoon by spoon into the undergrowth no longer worrying that the neighbours think I'm mad - they just know now! The fact that it had headed twice for that house in the last few weeks is a pretty good sign that it was claiming it for its long winter "sleep". It would be nice to think that it was the same one that arrived last December from the Wildlife Hospital, spent the winter in that house, then went through the mating rigmarole several times in spring before disappearing off in early summer for a few weeks hopefully to nest. Perhaps it's come back "home "to the same box and safe hedge line. Who knows. In spring two females were seen doing the mating thing here behind High St (not together you understand) and one then the other, as well as the male disappeared off our patch where they usually hung around all evening. There were hedgehog sightings all over the village including parts where they hadn't been seen for years. There was one nest definitely suspected on Townsend with the female displaying typical new mum or soon to be mum behaviour. Then all went quiet and no young were seen anywhere apart from one possible large juvenile found dead on Robins Close in September after being run over late one Saturday night.

Two hedgehogs were found dead in separate Broad Close gardens in July, both shelled out and looking like the work of badgers. One of these was last year's male juvenile who had just reached maturity. Perhaps the other was a pregnant or new mum and if it was, then any babies in the nest wouldn't have survived. We entered last winter with three hedgehogs that we knew of in the village because



that many had been seen together in one go. There may have been any number of others that no one knew about. It's really hard to tell without marking them all and that's difficult. We enter this winter with one known of or seen recently. With three deaths this year that means that there may have been at least four around last spring (unless the dead one on Robins Close was definitely this year's young. It was hard to tell) As a lot of hedgehogs seem to head for this hedge line in the winter and now there's one, and with no recent sightings in other locations I 'm inclined to think that the local village population has dropped. As stated in the first Hedgehog Matters in last January's Barford news, recent surveys show that there are now less than a million hedgehogs in the UK compared to over 30 million in the 1950s. Numbers are declining by a few percent each year. It's estimated that by 2025 although we will still have hedgehogs their numbers won't be sufficient for a viable breeding population. It's easy to see how this can be if the hedgehog likely to be now hibernating out the back of us can't find a mate any closer than Deddington, or maybe as far in the opposite direction. Surveys show that hedgehog populations are greater around the edges of villages than in the countryside or towns.

Although there are far more hedgehogs that tigers in the world they are declining at the same rate. With their habitats being carved up by roads and new developments all the time this is not a trend that's likely to reverse without a concerted effort from all sides and unless new developers incorporate mitigation plans into their developments. This is the reason why I wanted to raise awareness of them and their plight in our villages.

In the spring I plan to contact the wildlife hospital because we are a good release site for rehabilitated or overwintered hedgehogs. Despite badgers being reasonably close by we have a great habitat for them and not too busy roads. For now, that seems to be the Barford St M hedgehog soap opera played out for another year with the known survivor having a well-earned hibernate. Hmm – sounds like a good idea. If you see one now it would be good to know. Please give it some cat food too.

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
