JULY PARISH COUNCIL NOTES

A meeting of the Parish Council took place at 7.30pm on 5th July 2023 at the Village Hall and was attended by ClIrs Sandi Turner (Chairman), Rodney Hobbs, Chris Charman, Maureen Appleby, Tom Lovell, Ray Cox, District Councillor Bryn Williams, Oxfordshire Councillor Arash Fatemian and David Best, (Parish Clerk and Responsible Financial Officer). No members of the public attended the meeting.

Minutes of the last meeting: It was agreed that the minutes of the meeting held on 3rd May 2023 were a true and accurate record (unanimous).

Public Participation: None

Allotments:

Rent – Almost all the rents have been collected. **Skip** – A skip will be ordered for allotment holders to get rid of rubbish.

Parish Matters:

Bridge over the Swere – Cherwell District Council Conservation has turned down several different repair scheme proposals from Oxfordshire County Council including one to build a stronger structure to take heavy vehicles but facing it with the existing stone so that it would look exactly the same. A resident has proposed applying for conservation area status for the two villages which would restrict heavy goods vehicles. Approximately 3,000 villages have this status. It was agreed to invite CDC Conservation and OCC Highways to a meeting to agree a way forward. **Complaint about dog walkers** – A resident had complained to the parish council about dog walkers with out-of-control dogs. Residents are asked to report any incidents to the Cherwell District Council Dog Warden, Chris Cundy chris.cundy@cherwell-dc.gov.uk 01295 221621 in office hours and 01295 221531 out of office hours.

US Airforce Base at Croughton – Two councillors attended to summer BBQ and met the Squadron Leader who confirmed that road improvements are going to be carried out to improve road safety.

Cherwell District Council Parish Liaison Metting -

Two Councillors attended the meeting. CDC has to make £4m savings on a budget of £28m. CDC will pick up bulk waste items from houses and Environmental Health is responsible for clearing up fly tipping. **Dog Bin for Barford St John** – This has been installed by the noticeboard.

Street Furniture – It was agreed that an inspection should be carried out of all street furniture and renovation work carried out if required.

Concrete Fence Post on the bank along Murreys Lane – Cllr Tom Lovell advised that he will remove this.

Verge between the bridge and Barford St John – This is overgrown and it was agreed that the clerk would cut this.

Weed Killing – It was agreed that Thomas Fox would be asked to weed kill the footpath from the Potteries to West Close, Robins Close and Broad Close.

PARISH COUNCIL NOTES

A meeting of the Parish Council took place at 7.30pm on 14th September 2023 at the Village Hall and was attended by ClIrs Sandi Turner (Chairman), Rodney Hobbs, Ray Cox, County Councillor Arash Fatemian and David Best, (Parish Clerk and Responsible Financial Officer). Several members of the public attended the meeting.

Minutes of the last meeting: It was agreed that the minutes of the meeting held on 5th July 2023 were a true and accurate record (unanimous).

Public Participation: None

Complaint about the Heythrop Hunt – A resident complained about horses and hounds from the Heythrop Hunt in Horn Hill on 5th January in the meeting on 12th January. The resident asked that the PC contact the hunt to request that they notify the PC if they are coming to the village in future. The initial response was that notifying of hunt locations in advance increases the risk of interference by hunt saboteurs. The PC has contacted the hunt again this week to again request advance notification so that residents can be informed via WhatsApp and Facebook.

Bridge over the Swere - Representatives from Oxfordshire County Council Highways and Cherwell District Council, Planning Conservation attended the meeting having been invited by the Parish Council to explain and discuss the delays to the bridge repair. The bridge is Listed Grade II and OCC are required to obtain listed building consent for the repairs. Five proposals for rebuilding the bridge with greater strength to allow 40-tonne vehicles have so far been rejected by CDC Conservation. OCC has discussed another two proposals with CDC Conservation who advised verbally in the meeting that they should be acceptable. OCC has to confirm that these new designs will have the structural integrity required and the bridge will be closed from 13th to 15th November to carry out 3D scans. It is hoped that OCC will be able to finalise the plans and submit the application to CDC Conservation by the end of the year. CDC Conservation advised that they will require 8 weeks to review and hopefully approve these plans. Once approved by CDC Conservation, OCC will then go out to tender and apply for the necessary permissions from the Environment Agency. It is hoped that the rebuilding will be completed at the end of the summer 2024 but this is dependant on CDC Conservation approving the plans. OCC propose to widen the pavement area on the bridge and this may require

future traffic management as it is unlikely that the road width will be sufficient for two vehicles to pass on the bridge. CDC Conservation and OCC Highways have both confirmed that they will keep the Parish Council informed of progress.

The PC is considering a 7.5 tonne weight limit to be imposed throughout or two villages to reduce the large number of heavy vehicles psssing through and a 20mph speed limit has been applied for.

Parish Matters: Street Furniture – A resident who has previously maintained street furniture will be asked to inspect the street furniture and carry out any required treatment.

Grant for Electric Vehicle Charging Points– OCC has asked PCs interested in EV Charging points in the village to complete a survey to express interest. It was agreed that the PC will express interest.

Fire Training – The Village Hall management Committee has organised for members and other users of the Village Hall to be given fire training. If there is further demand, more training opportunities will be arranged.

Grass Cutting – The clerk has contacted Thomas Fox Landscaping to clarify the contract as some areas such as Murreys Lane have not been mown recently. The area of West Close that is currently left unmown until the end of the year will be mown from July in future.

BARFORD GREEN GARDEN CLUB Notes from our Potting Shed – October 2023



Well, what a variety of weather patterns we've experienced lately! Obviously it didn't deter you as the annual Village Show was well attended with some impressive exhibits! See photos. Our thanks to Sandi Turner and her hardworking Committee for a great Show.



Annual Seed Order: Here's a note from Rodney who's kindly ordering our seeds again. Thanks Rodney!! Please note deadline: Thurs 16 Nov.

"After discussion and a vote by members, the Committee decided to use Kings again. (Please note, there's no discount on onions, shallots, potatoes, plants, sundries etc. and they can usually be purchased cheaper locally) but we'll qualify for a 50% discount on catalogue seed prices. There's a package/delivery charge of £1.65 per individual order. (People with small orders might like to combine and pay only one p&p charge).

Orders must be on the individual members order form. If you have a big order I can email you an extra copy and I have a few spares or you could copy the form before you start. **Please complete name, address, email and phone numbers so I can easily contact you in case of queries and notify you when the seeds arrive.**

I'll arrange for orders to be collected from me or I'll deliver. You might like to keep a copy or I can email you a scan if you ask nicely! The form is the same as last year and most people got it right! Calculate the costs of veg/flower seeds BEFORE AND AFTER the 50% discount and enter in the relevant boxes at the bottom of the respective order columns. In the summary boxes (Side 2 halfway down right side) enter the values of veg/flowers BEFORE discount and further down the £1.65 individual packing charge for group orders. Add the UNDISCOUNTED price of seeds to the packing charge and make a note of this figure. (Ignore other p&p charges – they don't apply to us). In the next but last box add together the 50% seed discount, any credit notes/gift vouchers (attach if you have any) and enter this figure in the box. Subtract this from the previously noted sum of the undiscounted veg/flower seeds prices plus the £1.65 p&p and enter this figure in the final box. That is the amount you pay. There's no discount on the packing charge. Association Name: Barford Green Garden Club. Account No. KA1155

If you think this is complicated, imagine trying to write down an explanation! (I'm going to do a dummy run before completing my form). Tell your friends, neighbours, the bloke down the pub, great aunt Maud and anyone who might be interested so as many as possible can benefit from the discount. Payment is required on placement of order. Please enclose a cheque to E. W. King & Co. Ltd or complete the card payment details and check your order and adding up carefully.

Catalogues/order forms are in the blue box in my porch. I'll be away 23 Sept - 18 Oct so put your completed form in an envelope with your name on it and pop it through my letterbox. I'll probably be able to pick up urgent emails while I'm away so I'll check occasionally (probably!) Let's hope for an easier gardening season in 2024 and that peat free composts improve. 
Eject! Eject! by John Nichol. The author, a survivor of the 1991 RAF Tornado aircraft shootdown in Iraq, has assembled a fascinating history of the ultimate miles-high survival tool. When the call is made to abandon a supersonic aircraft, it's only the beginning of this astonishing narrative detailing the technological race to save aircrew lives using explosive seats. There are personal accounts from ejection survivors, including those of the incredibly brave men who risked their lives testing the early, rudimentary devices; from pulling the handle to being under the parachute once took thirty seconds, whilst today that figure is remarkably down to around one second! This book gives the reader a vivid sense of what that explosive ejection experience feels like, but also features the moving accounts of what

happens once the aircrew have landed on terra firma (often in hostile enemy territory). Nichols certainly evokes my own memories of maintaining and fitting these remarkable life-saving systems. *Paul Freeman*



The Comforts of Home by Susan Hill: this crime fiction page-turner is the nineth in the Simon Serrailler series. After surviving a serious physical encounter, DCS Simon Serrailler is recuperating at his home on a distant Scottish island. Despite being off duty he has a mysterious death to solve and a cold case to re-examine at the request of his commanding officer. As I'm unfamiliar with the preceding volumes in this series, it's unclear how far the focus on family and friends is typical. This is a warm detect ive thriller, in which the criminal aspects are no more than equal to the family context. It's a case of

The Archers meets *Midsomer Murders*, within a reassuring middle-class cocoon with a higher proportion of medically qualified blood relations than is healthy. The short sixty-one chapters combined with direct prose and predictable dialogue make for what has become a popular read. *Trevor Arrowsmith*



Drive your Plow over the Bones of the Dead by Olga Tokarczuk, translated from the Polish by Antonia Lloyd-Jones. Every first-person narrator is unreliable to some extent, but Nobel prizewinner Tokarczuk uses the device to great effect here. Eccentric 60-something Janina Dusjezko, living alone in a remote hamlet on the Polish/Czech border, relates the strange deaths of several local men. What links them? The explanations she offers to the police, involving astrology and revenge motives of hunted animals, are greeted with derision, but the investigators too easily write her off as a dotty old woman. It's an engaging and often funny ecothriller, with diversions into the rights of animals, philosophy, feminism and the poetry of Blake,

from whom the title is taken. Linda Newbery



Wives and Daughters by Elizabeth Gaskell: Mrs Gaskell's warm, wise tale about the lives and loves of the inhabitants of the country town of Hollingford, set shortly before the coming of the railways and the expansion of the franchise, is her masterpiece. She died before completing it, but had tied together the loose threads, and we know how it would have ended. Young Molly Gibson is heartbroken when her father, the local doctor, marries again - unwisely - but the arrival of a selfish and manipulative stepmother is counter-balanced by the welcome acquisition of a stepsister, the flawed yet beguiling Cynthia, before whom men fall like ninepins. A deeply-felt sense of Englishness and belonging permeate the novel, personified by Squire Hamley, so humble in recognising his faults and failings, so sturdily proud of his ancient lineage. His grief and

yearning for his dead wife are among the most moving depictions of widowerhood I have ever read. *Jenny Greeves*

INGREDIENTS

- Pasta enough for 2 160g(ish)
- Boursin cheese x1
- Cherry tomatoes at least 500g
- 'Cheat's' Chopped Garlic 1-2 tsps
- Rock salt
- Parsley
- 1. boil pasta al dente
- **2.** in a baking dish, place the garlic herb boursin cheese in the middle
- **3.** toss in cherry tomatoes around the cheese
- 4. sprinkle rock salt over tomatoes
- 5. add in chopped garlic over tomatoes
- 6. lightly drizzle olive oil over everything
- sprinkle the parsley over the cheese, I use frozen
- bake uncovered in oven at 180° for 15-20min (once tomatoes start bursting it's ready)
- with a spoon, mix the Boursin with tomatoes (gently press down on any tomatoes that didn't burst)
- 10. toss in drained pasta & pasta water



GREEN THOUGHT OF THE MONTH


Notes from **Our Natural World in Words**: a celebration of Nature Writing at Deddington Library, 17th August.

Nature writing is enjoying a surge, with enticing displays in every bookshop. Perhaps lockdown had the effect of making us appreciate our natural surroundings more than ever; perhaps the alarming decline in species and habitats makes us realise how much is at risk. Great nature writing can show the wonder of new places and creatures, or give pleasure by affirming our joy in what we already know.

Several people, including two accomplished poets (one of them our own Dr Claire Cox) brought pieces to share. Joan Todd read from the work of her late neighbour, Walter Meagher, who documented the Deddington swift roost and was a keen observer of local flora and fauna. (His published book is *Portrait of a River: the River Swere in Oxfordshire.*)

Here's my selection - the main difficulty was what to leave out!

Nature Cure by Richard Mabey relates his recovery from severe depression through immersion in his new Norfolk surroundings.



Four Hedges by Clare Leighton takes us through the year in her Buckinghamshire garden in the thirties, beautifully illustrated by her own woodcuts.

Several poems: *Adlestrop* by Edward Thomas gives an evocative glimpse of a still June evening in a place known to many of us; *Thistles* by Ted Hughes brings crackling energy to something commonplace. I read from Thomas Hardy's *Afterwards*, in which he wonders if he'll be remembered for appreciating weather, stars, small creatures and their habits, and two from *Ten Poems About Birds* that celebrate birds in exuberant flight: *Skylark* by Katrina Porteous and *Swallows* by Kathleen Jamie.



Silent Earth by Dave Goulson aims to make everyone appreciate insects and be aware of the threats they face from pesticides and harmful herbicides. His title refers to *Silent Spring* by Rachel Carson, published in 1962, a seminal book in environmental awareness. *The Wild Places* by Robert Macfarlane brilliantly evokes settings, atmosphere and weather in the UK and beyond.



Say Goodbye to the Cuckoo by Michael McCarthy looks at our summer migrants, or 'springbringers' as he calls them, through literature and folklore as well as through the eyes of observers who know them well. For how much longer can we take it for granted that swifts, swallows, warblers and cuckoos will be part of our summers? "One of the penalties of an ecological education is that one lives alone in a world of wounds." Aldo Leopold, A Sand County Almanac, 1949. No longer alone – but it's crucial that we use our voices to protect the natural world and halt further catastrophic losses. Thanks to librarian Gail Cripps for organising (sadly, illness prevented her from attending) and volunteer Julia Cork who hosted and provided refreshments. From Deddington Environment Network:

Why the future of food has to be plant-based Red Lion, Deddington Monday 16th October, 7.30 pm

Join us for an illustrated presentation by publican **Gary Ward**, who's committed to serving delicious plant-based food at his pub. Afterwards **Linda Newbery** will talk briefly about her work with the **Plant-Based Councils** campaign and its impact across the country. There will be plenty of time for questions and discussion.

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
