#### **PARISH COUNCIL NOTES**

A meeting of the Parish Council took place at 7.30pm on 3<sup>rd</sup> March 2021 using Zoom Video Conferencing and was attended by Cllrs Turner, Hobbs, Eden, Cox, Charman, Best, Cosgrove, District Cllr B Williams and Mr Best, (Parish Clerk and Responsible Financial Officer). Two members of the public attended the meeting.

Minutes of the last meeting: It was agreed that the minutes of the meeting held on 3rd March 2021 were a true and accurate record (unanimous).

#### **Report from District Councillor Bryn Williams:**

The District Councillor update is displayed in the Parish Council noticeboard by the Village Hall for Parishioners to read.

#### **Public Participation:**

**S137 Grants** – Grant application had been received from Barford News, West Close Playground Management Committee and the Parochial Church Council and had been circulated prior to the meeting. Representative attended from the Barford News and Parochial Church Council to present their applications. The decision on grant awards will be made in the May meeting.

#### **Parish Matters:**

Fence & Hedge along Murreys Lane boundary of West Close — The rope and signs appear to have stopped children sliding down the bank and into Murreys Lane. Children have been seen running straight across the road at the top of Murreys Lane without checking for traffic so it was agreed to reinstate the kissing gate. Parents are requested to ask their children to be careful. A dead tree leaning across the road will be investigated. A resident has kindly cleared the refuges along Murreys Lane but

Village Hall Broadband – Broadband is required in the Village Hall for full Post Office services to be provided. This will also facilitate renting out the Village Hall. It was agreed that the Parish Council will pay for the installation charge, but the Village Hall Management Committee will pay the monthly charge.

Village Hall Noticeboard – The Village Hall Management Committee has asked the Parish Council to pay for a new noticeboard. Prices have been obtained from the same supplier as the Parish Council noticeboards. These will be circulated to the Management Committee but no decision was taken on whether the Parish Council will contribute to the cost.

**Footpath Gatepost** – Oxfordshire County Council has delivered the replacement gate post for the footpath from the churchyard. This will be fitted to replace the temporary repair.

**Grass Cutting Contract** – Although this starts in April, Thomas Fox had completed the first cut in March before the areas where mowing will be delayed to encourage wild flowers had been marked. These have now been marked.

**20's Plenty Signs** – These have arrived and will be placed on the Hempton Rd coming into the village and before The Rock at the Lower Street junction.

**Unity Trust Bank** – The Clerk attended a video conference presentation from the Unity Trust Bank. A lot of Councils are moving over to this bank, but it was decided to remain with Barclays as The Unity Trust Bank charge a monthly fee.

**Seats around the villages** – It was agreed that Cllr Ray Cox would inspect them and check if any treatment is required.

**Trustee Meeting with the Village Hall** – It was agreed that a meeting was required.

**Bottle Bank** – It was reported that no suitable sites have been located around the village. Cherwell District Council have provided 2 further bins in the layby at Deddington.

#### **Next Meeting:**



#### **PEAT FREE**

What seed and potting compost have you bought this year? Do you have any idea about the importance of

buying 'Peat-free' compost? Campaigners are lobbying the government to stop the use of peat in the horticultural industry and our gardens. But what is peat and why is it bad news in compost mixes? Peat bogs are wetland areas found across the UK and beyond, formed over millennia as organic matter breaks down and decays. They are thriving ecosystems that support diverse and often rare wildlife. They also store carbon which prevents it from being released into the atmosphere as Co2 and adding to climate change. To dig this up and use in compost is therefore crazy. Unfortunately the industry has always used peat for its capacity to hold water and nutrients. Please remember this and act accordingly. The Wildlife Trust has a 'peat free pledge' for signing up to. There are so many peat free composts on the market, such a Sylvagrow (from Applegarth nurseries, Chipping Norton), Dalefoot composts and Fertile Fibre.

#### JOBS TO DO IN AND AROUND THE GARDEN

Sunshine and showers, some of snow? Spring is finally in evidence as daffodils and flowering trees start to bloom. It is an exciting month, with indoorsown seeds well into growth, and it's also time to start sowing outdoors. Just watch out for frosts...Keep weeds under control: Tie in climbing and rambling roses: Sow hardy annuals, herbs and wild flower seed outdoors: Start to feed citrus plants: Increase the water given to houseplants: Feed hungry shrubs and roses: Sow new lawns or repair bare patches: Divide bamboos and waterlilies: Earth up potatoes, and promptly plant any still remaining: Plant out summer bedding at the end of the month (except in cold areas): Water early and late to get the most out of your water, recycle water when possible. Open greenhouse vents and doors on warm days: Mow lawns weekly: Check for nesting birds before clipping hedge:. Lift and divide overcrowded clumps of daffodils, snowdrops and other spring-flowering bulbs:

#### WILDFLOWERS IN THE BARFORDS

Slowed down by lock downs we are looking at the wild flowers we see each month on our walks. This month is:

Lesser Celandine: in Latin, ranunculus ficaria. (Why use a Latin name? Because everyone around the world understands the same name.)

There is a big patch of these little flowers (colour=YELLOW) on Murreys Lane, but they can be found anywhere in damp shady places like hedge bottoms any time between March and May. They aren't buttercups but are related to them (ranunculus family). Herbalists used to call them pilewort - I leave you to imagine why!

Eye catching garden varieties have bronze leaves (ranunculus ficaria 'Brazen Hussy') or double flowers (ranunculus ficaria flore pleno). Bees love them for their pollen, Margaret says.

The Rotary Club of Banbury Cherwell run an annual charity fund raising cycling event - the *Broughton Castle Sportive*. #### 70TH ANNIVERSARY COUNTRYSIDE CODE

The first Countryside Code booklet was published in 1951. The 2021 update by Natural England - the first in more than a decade - has been shaped by nearly 4,000 responses to an online survey, which sought views on best practices for visiting the countryside and protecting the natural environment.

We are in the privileged position of living in a beautiful part of the world and with that comes responsibility - this new code comes

as more people are using green spaces, and aims to help the public be safe, look after the natural environment and protect the livelihoods of people who live in the countryside.

We often read people's concerns about our community - for those of us who care it's important to stay informed - the changes include advice on creating a welcoming environment, clearer rules to underline the importance of clearing away dog mess, taking litter home, staying on footpaths and not feeding livestock.

Natural England chairman Tony Juniper said: "The Countryside Code has been providing an excellent guide for people on how to get out and enjoy the outdoors safely for more than 70 years. "We want everyone to be aware of the code, so people of all ages and backgrounds can enjoy the invaluable health and wellbeing benefits that nature offers, while giving it the respect it deserves."



#### Reading recommendations from BARFORD BOOKCHAT



*Girl, Woman, Other* by Bernardine Evaristo deservedly won the Booker Prize, making her the first black woman and first black British winner. Bold, assured and innovative, it's sometimes tragic, often funny, ultimately uplifting, interweaving the stories of twelve women, nearly all black British, spanning generations and cultures and revealing a range of attitudes towards race, sexuality, feminism and opportunity. Evaristo uses a distinctive style, writing not in formal sentences but in a kind of loose prose poem that unfurls seductively down the pages. *Linda Newbery* 




**Hungry,** by Grace Dent, takes us from her working-class childhood in Cumbria to the metropolis and life on the edge, afloat much of the time on free alcohol from parties. She describes her fascination with writing and her hunger to see her reviews in print; clawing her way into low-level jobs, extending her journalism and TV contacts, she never loses her emotional link to her increasingly frail parents. Becoming a wine connoisseur — at least a convincing bluffer - and enjoying expense-account dining develop her palate beyond the fast-food tastes of her youth. We sense her continuing disbelief at her career success and her insecurity about not only what is good about food but how one is supposed to express an opinion. This fragility makes her humorous columns all the more

attractive, and the sombre conclusion here leaves us hungry for more. Trevor Arrowsmith



An Awfully Big Adventure by Beryl Bainbridge: Set in post-war Liverpool, this sharply-observed novel follows the intrigues of a down-at-heel repertory theatre company in the lead up to their Christmas production of Peter Pan. Through the eyes of the teenage assistant stage manager, Bainbridge cleverly counterpoints Stella's feisty lack of worldly wisdom with the seedy sexual misconduct that's rife within the troupe, and which plays out with tragic consequences. Stella, brought up in a boarding house by her concerned Uncle Vernon and Aunt Lily, is finally confronted by her own troubled childhood in unexpected and devastating ways. It's Bainbridge's unrivalled ability to conjure this period

of history, the scarred city of Liverpool, its attitudes, its deeply traumatized, impoverished citizens, with unflinching detail and humour that makes this novel such a lively and memorable read. *Claire Cox* 



**The Hustler** by Walter Tevis: Before he was portrayed by Paul Newman on the silver screen, Fast Eddie Felson was invented by Walter Tevis. Fast Eddie heads to Chicago to take on the great Minnesota Fats. Is Eddie a two-bit hustler or a real pool player? The story is bleak. Fast Eddie is an alcoholic, brutalised by the sociopathic Burt, and in a dysfunctional relationship with Sarah. Yet the writing is impossibly elegant, describing the action on the table, the characters, and even the very meaning of life in a way that excites and touches genius. The novel is actually far superior to the famous film it inspired. A footnote: Tevis invented Minnesota Fats, too. Rudolf Walderone may have adopted the

name and claimed that the film character was based on him, but that - perhaps appropriately - was a hustle. *Tom Greeves*

# Foodbank Collection point at St Michael's church

Deddington Church has been operating as a collection point for food for the Banbury Food Bank for some time. SS Peter & Paul have now been accredited as referral agency for the Banbury Food Bank. This means that if anyone here, or in the surrounding villages needs access to the Food Bank, you can get in touch with the administrator at Deddington church by calling 01869 220720 between the hours of 12 noon and 4pm every Wednesday, or alternatively email them at foodbank@deddingtonchurch.org Your request will be dealt with promptly and we will be able to provide vouchers accordingly. If you are urgently in need of food, please use the same contact details and we can supply you with emergency food parcels (and can deliver if necessary).

The plan is that a Food Bank will eventually operate from the Deddington church directly to save those who need it from having to travel to Banbury – but more on this when it happens!

To support this initiative, there will be a container placed in St Michael's church for people to donate non-perishable food items for the Food Bank. It will be available from the beginning of May.

A gentle reminder that we can only take dried or tinned food that is unopened and within the 'sell by' date, otherwise we have to dispose of it. Also please don't leave any fresh produce or food that should be kept in a fridge, because again, the Food Bank won't take it and we have to dispose of it.

The maypole has something of a tangled and uncertain history. Some evidence suggests that it started in Roman Britain some 2000 years ago as a spring ritual where soldiers danced around a decorated tree to thank the goddess Flora (the goddess of flowers). However the maypole is also associated with Beltane, Pagen rituals and fertility rites.

What we do know is that these early maypoles didn't have ribbons and were ostensibly a tall, stripped decorated tree which provided a focal point to village dancing – most likely circular dances performed by the adults of the villages. The first time that we see the ribbons appear is in a painting of the Ranelagh Gardens in Chelsea, London in 1759 which shows people plaiting ribbons around a pole in the manner which is generally thought of as a maypole dance today.

The maypole dancing we visualise now stems very much from the mind of a man called John Ruskin who was a Victorian writer and philanthropist. John Ruskin was among those who looked to the old customs which had held rural village societies together as something desirable to be continued in the emerging age. Ruskin was a patron of a teacher-training college in Roehampton and it was here that he established a May Day ceremony in 1881.

Then Slade Professor of Art at Oxford, Ruskin believed that industrialisation had robbed workers of individuality, joy and beauty. His answer was to encourage the student teachers at Whitelands to develop "natural and uncontending worth". Dancing around a maypole formed part of an elaborate ceremony, which included the crowning of a May Queen. From Whitelands, women teachers took the new tradition wherever they went, and it quickly became standard in schools.



#### **GREEN THOUGHT OF THE MONTH**

Ways to be Clean and Green!

Spring is traditionally the time to binge on household cleaning – but it would be a pity to have a sparkling clean house at the expense of the environment. Here are some ideas for avoiding harmful products and finding better ways to be clean and green.

Supermarkets display an armoury of cleaning products, most of them contained in plastic. Many have been tested on animals. Some, like bleach and powerful sink unblockers, carry hazard warnings – so should we be using them, and releasing them into the water system?

Going back to traditional ways solves several problems in one go. It's more sustainable to use baking powder, vinegar and possibly lemon as a general cleaning solution – you won't have to keep



buying plastic, and you can be sure that your home-made product hasn't been tested on animals. Soda crystals, vinegar and hot water will usually unblock a sink. Supermarkets sell window-cleaning sprays which are basically just water and vinegar — why pay more for something in throwaway plastic when you can easily fill your own spray bottle and clean your glass just as effectively?

Those little sponge pads may be convenient, but they contain microplastics which are released into water. Shops sell wipes for every conceivable purpose - kitchen wipes, bathroom wipes, shower wipes, etc; most contain plastic, so they end up in landfill where they'll never biodegrade, and can clog watercourses if flushed away. Rather than buying these wipes (again, wrapped in plastic) it's better to go back to the old way, using cloths that can be washed and used repeatedly or coir scrubs you can compost when they wear out.

Another way of avoiding plastic in the home is to choose compostable bags for your bins, cat litter, food storage etc. Try online sellers such as **Ecovibe** to find household products that don't harm the environment – for instance they sell compostable dog-poo bags. And if you haven't discovered Banbury's excellent zerowaste shop, **Nothing But Footprints** in Castle Quay, do go and have a look. There you can buy organic, cruelty-free washing-up liquid, hand-wash, toilet cleaner, washing powder and more – take your own containers to fill, or they'll give you one if you forget. You can also buy plastic-free scourers, washing-up brushes and sponges (as well as a range of grains, cereals, herbs, spices, tea and coffee). The shop offers online ordering and delivery.

And: great news! We hope to bring some of these sustainable, organic, cruelty-free products to **Barford Market.** Bring your own containers or we'll have spares available – and experience the great feeling of cleaning your house and yourself in a green, sustainable way. Live kindly, tread lightly!


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
