



GREEN THOUGHT OF THE MONTH

The new report from the **IPCC (International Panel on Climate Change)** is certainly alarming: described as a 'red alert' for humanity, it states that we have a closing window of opportunity to limit rising temperatures and sea levels, and that governments haven't acted effectively enough to keep warming in check.

What can individuals do? It may seem overwhelming – but one thing we can all do is **cut down our personal carbon emissions**. Our checklist for **21 for 21 sustainability pledges** came with July's Barford

News – suggesting a range of simple and more challenging ways to reduce your environmental impact. Hand in your pledges at the BEN stall at the December market (or on any market day before that) for a chance to win a hamper of eco-goodies.

Can you write to our MP, Victoria Prentis, to state that the UK must set and commit to effective targets at the COP26 Conference in Glasgow in November? If emissions aren't reined in, the 1.5 degree increase (the safe global limit declared in the Paris agreement) will be breached within the next decade. Many councils, including Cherwell and Oxfordshire, have declared a Climate Emergency, but a recent report suggests that councils continue to approve projects that will raise carbon emissions. Can you write to our councillors to demand that sustainability is a priority in all council decisions, especially those relating to planning applications, housing

developments, road-building and investment?

Divide Herbaceous perennials: Pick Autumn raspberries: Collect and sow seed from perennials and hardy annuals: Dig up remaining potatoes before slug damage spoils them: Net ponds before leaf fall gets underway: Keep up with watering using rain water or grey water: Reduce the frequency of houseplant watering: Clean out cold frames and greenhouses ready for use in the autumn: Cover leafy vegetable crops with bird proof netting: Plant spring flowering bulbs. 


Reading recommendations from **BARFORD BOOKCHAT**



Agent Sonya: Lover, Mother, Soldier, Spy, by Ben Macintyre, is a biography that reads like the raciest of novels. Ursula Kuczynski known to her Soviet handlers as Sonya rose to become a Red Army colonel. Over decades she maintained her cover as a


homely mother of three, living first in Shanghai and later in Poland and Switzerland before ending up in the Cotswold village of Great Rollright, where her parents lie buried in the churchyard. From a rambling village house she betrayed Britain's nuclear secrets to the Russians and although she came close she was never caught. Just in time she escaped with her family to East Berlin. For years the sexism of MI5 prevented their spy catchers from grasping what was in their midst and understanding that a woman and a mother could also be a dangerous undercover operative. Macintyre's research is formidable and he tells a gripping

tale. Suzanne Franks



Light Perpetual, by Francis Spufford, is longlisted for the Booker Prize, and deservedly so. It opens with five south London children being killed in a 1944 bombing – but then goes on to explore the lives

they would have lived, revisiting them at 15-year intervals. (This is reminiscent of the 7Up documentary which some of you may remember.) With these time leaps we see major changes in the lives of Ben, Vernon, Jo, Val and Alec – shifts from prosperity to downfall, or tragedy to redemption. It's necessarily fragmented, but the writing is simply dazzling, ranging from the affectionate description of young children in a singing lesson at school and the terrifying inner world of schizophrenic Ben to the technicalities and potential of sound recording. I listened to it unabridged on Audible, in a virtuoso narration by Imogen Church. *Linda Newbery*



Re-educated by Lucy
Kellaway. You may have
known Kellaway from her
columns in the Financial
Times, especially on the
peculiarities of corporate
culture, and wondered why her
columns stopped. This book
will give you a lot (and I mean

a lot) of detail. She "began to realise that the life she had built for herself no longer suited her". Many of us will think she was very brave retraining as a teacher after life as a journalist but after some initial difficulties she learnt to really love the classroom (a career followed by her mother). The book is a celebration of the power of education to transform lives. She also established Now Teach as a vehicle to get people into teaching as second careers, which is helping to transform London schools. The book is full of hilarious stories, beautifully written as only a journalist and teacher could. *John Bowers*

THE PRINCE STOCK OF SHARES SHARES

The Persephone Book of Short Stories: Women writers have a particular genius for portraying character and motive, the complex interplay of emotions between human beings, on the small canvas of the short story. In Dorothy

Whipple's "Wednesday" a divorced wife, guilty at bringing about her own downfall and losing her children, realises she has been caught helplessly in a web of her husband's spinning. Edith Wharton's "Roman Fever" recounts a day in which two wealthy American widows, drowsy in the Italian sun, suddenly spring on each other a confession of devastating betrayal. In Malachi Whitaker's "The Music Box" a small boy and his mother painfully acquire - and are made to renounce - the humble object which was to feed their souls; a tale as subtle and nuanced as any in this satisfying collection. *Jenny Greeves*

The weather was perfect — not too hot and no rain. The overnight stay at a local inn was meant to give us an idea of the stamina it



would take to walk on consecutive days, but we got more than we bargained for! So, despite lack of sleep due to half-hourly church bells, a van-load of people deposited outside the pub at 4 a.m., a bottle bank lorry collection at 6 a.m., no hot water in the morning, and sore feet, we soldiered on valiantly. For those of you who like stats, here are some figures:

WILDFLOWERS IN THE BARFORDS


by Janet Payne and Margaret Murdin White and Red Clover Trifolium (three leaves)



How many of us have spent hours as children looking for a 'lucky' four leaved clover? I once found one at my feet in the middle of an enormous meadow. We didn't find any more, just the usual three leaved ones. However, these have their own significance. They used to be pressed and used as bookmarks in prayer books as the three leaves symbolised the Trinity.

We have recently realised the value of clover as forage for insects as well as for much larger mammals, including children, who like to suck the heads of white clover for their honey flavoured nectar. Margaret says that the white and red clover flower is actually composed of individual florets. each needing pollination. The nectar is the insects' reward. After this the floret will hang down and turn brown. Most bees can't however reach with their tongues into the deeper red clover florets until the clover is mown and a weaker second growth comes with a shallower floret.

Red clover has been used for centuries by herbalists as having sweet, cooling and relaxant properties. It was thought to help, for example, with skin diseases in combination with other herbs.



It is allegorical novel about Santiago, a humble young shepherd boy from Andalucía and on the surface appears very simple, but it is really rather deep and philosophical. The story follows Santiago as he follows his dreams across continents; it offers life insights for the reader such as courage, trust, faith, resilient, spirituality and using heart and mind together as explored through Santiago's experience on his trek.

There are many underlying messages in this quite short book and we commented on how it can easily be read in short bursts and revisited time and again. It is one for the bookshelf and we recommend it.







