#### **PARISH COUNCIL NOTES**

A meeting of the Parish Council took place at 7.30pm on 2<sup>nd</sup> January in Barford Village Hall and was attended by Cllrs Turner, Eden, Charman, Cox, Best, District Cllr Williams, County Cllr Fatemian and Mr Best (Parish Clerk and Responsible Financial Officer). Apologies were received from and Cllr Hobbs.

**Minutes of the last meeting:** The minutes of the Parish Council meeting on 5<sup>th</sup> December were unanimously resolved as an accurate record of the meeting and signed by the Chairman.

#### **Parish Matters:**

2019-20 Budget – Minor amendments had been made to the budget which were agreed when it was reviewed in the December meeting. The final budget was agreed (unanimous). The Precept was agreed (unanimous). The Clerk will send the Precept Demand to Cherwell District Council before the deadline of 18<sup>th</sup> January.

Allotment Water Bill — Thames Water had rejected the Leakage Allowance claim from 2017. This has been challenged again as the justification for rejection was incorrect. Castle Water had issued an amendment which still contained a high bill for 2017 when there was a leak but the 2018 water usage is correct and based on the monthly meter readings submitted by the Parish Council. It was agreed to pay the Castle Water for water usage in 2018 but withhold payment for 2017 when there was a leak from the water meter and abnormally high water recorded.

Footbridge along footpath 121/1 running east from Horn Hill – The damaged footbridge has been replaced.

Road Safety on Barford Road/ South Newington Road — The report from Mr Mike Wasley from OCC Highways has not yet been received following the meeting to discuss road safety improvements.

**Brambles in West Close** – Mariann Young reported that brambles had been cut down at the edge of West Close but left. Sarah & David have collected them and sent them to recycling.

Emergency Salt Bags – A pallet of salt bags has been delivered. It was agreed that some will be taken to both Churches in case of icy weather. There is a salt bin at the Village Hall and this will be kept topped up from the bags.

Repairs to play equipment at Village Hall – The Playsafety ROSPA report recommended some repairs. The report indicated that the gate next to the village hall had some decayed timber but this has been checked and it is very minor and the gate is strong. There are some wooden slats on the play equipment which are decayed and they will be replaced. There are folding seats on one of the picnic tables which will be secured to prevent entrapment. The bark under the play equipment will be topped up to 300mm.

**Lottery Grant for West Close** – A grant of £10,000 has been approved by the National Lottery

Broadband in Barford St John — Better Broadband Oxfordshire advised last month that the projected completion date for more rural villages has been delayed from December 2018 to June 2019. A reply was sent pointing out that the fibre cable was installed in Barford St John in May 2018. The response was that Barford St John should be completed by the end of March 2019. Gardens Along Netherworton Road — Residents have contacted the Parish Council observing that there seems to be a pattern of encroachment of gardens onto the verge along Netherworton Road from some houses in Broad Close. The Parish Council will raise this query with Cherwell District Council Planning.

#### **DOWN ON THE FARM**

As lambing time approaches, I often wonder if



we 'coddle' our sheep too much. Indoor lambing has its attractions, of course – easier management, shelter from the elements,

day and night inspection, and so on.

But it also has its costs. Aside from the building there is the straw bedding, the need for careful hygiene, additional feed, electric lighting and extra help with night work. There is also the cost of cleaning out the shed and spreading the muck.

When lambing outside, the sheep spread their own muck; no straw, no electricity, and no night work.

One of my first jobs was as shepherd on the Wiltshire Downs running 800 breeding ewes. The only buildings were a hay shed and a traditional clap board barn.



As sheep lambed, they were moved to an adjacent field. Any problems such as triplets, ewes without enough milk or with sickly lambs were left in straw bale pens at

the gateway between the two fields for later attention. Pre-lambing the ewes were fed hay, post-lambing they also got a small ration of concentrates. It was a cheap system. I don't think that lamb mortality was any higher than with an indoor system and ewes got enough exercise to keep fit so the cases of difficult lambing were few and far between

I will always remember the interview for that job. I met the owner's son on a Sunday morning and turned up in shirt, collar and tie, flannel trousers and my old college blazer – as one did in those days. It was mild for early March, so I didn't bother with a coat.

After some preliminary chat he took me in his Landover to see the sheep, by which time it had started to rain.

Half way around the field, we found a ewe lying on its side. "What's the matter with that sheep?" asked my prospective employer. Sliding open the window, I peered through the now cascading rain. "She's got a problem lambing", I replied.

"What would you do about it?" he asked. I told him I would give her some help or she probably wouldn't survive. At that he switched off the engine and we stared at the drops of rain the size of marbles exploding against the windscreen until, after a few seconds, I got the message.

Shrugging off my blazer I stepped out into the monsoon. It took several minutes to extract the lambs, check the ewe for milk and get her on her feet – by which time I was soaked to the skin. Hauling myself back into the cab, I told him she had twins, plenty of milk, and the lambs were OK. He reversed the Land Rover so that he could see for himself – the ewe was standing licking one lamb and the other was trying to get to its feet.

As we drove away he said: "You haven't got a job at the moment, have you?" I admitted I hadn't, having just returned from working overseas. "Right", he said, "you can start tomorrow, I'll see you in the yard at 7 am."

## BARFORD GREEN GARDEN CLUB NOTES FROM OUR POTTING SHED

#### **FEBRUARY 2019**

"There is always in February some one day, at least, when one smells the yet distant, but surely coming, summer.

Geretrude Jekyll

Spring is in sight. This month there are signs of the approaching spring, with bulbs appearing and wildlife waking up as light levels and temperatures increase. There's plenty to do indoors this month to prepare for the season ahead. Outdoors, as the garden comes to life again.

#### **GARDEN JOBS FOR THIS MONTH**

Prepare vegetable seed beds, and sow some vegetables under cover; Chit potato tubers; Protect blossom on apricots, nectarines and peaches; Net fruit and vegetable crops to keep the birds off; Prune winter-flowering shrubs that have finished flowering; Divide bulbs such as snowdrops, and plant those that need planting 'in the green'; Prune Wisteria; Prune hardy evergreen hedges and renovate overgrown deciduous hedges; Prune conservatory climbers such as bougainvillea; Cut back deciduous grasses left uncut over the winter, remove dead grass from evergreen grasses; Clear mole hills from lawns and put the fine soil on veg beds.

Our **AGM** will be held on **February 25th, 2019**, when new membership subscriptions will be collected and cards issued. Committee members will all be up for election. Any others who would like to join us please contact Linda or Gunilla. It is not a very onerous task.

We have not forgotten **NOSY GARDENS** but the next ones will be next year. **THIS YEAR** we are

hoping to have some talks and visits as usual. Any suggestions will be welcome.

**Tyler**. The story covers several generations of the Whitshank family and centres on the home they live in and their relationships.

Unfortunately, what promised to be a good read failed to live up to expectations. We were disappointed in the style and skill of the text, especially after reading the hype on the book cover. As some members failed to finish the book it is not one we would recommend.

At our January meeting the book discussed was **The Outrun by Amy Liptrot** and there were mixed feelings both amongst the group and individually. The book opens tantalisingly with a brief description of Amy's entry into the world and where she grew up (the Orkneys). Then how she ended up in Hackney and vividly portrayed her descent into alcoholism and the depths of despair she reached.

Most of the group found the descriptions of Amy's struggle with alcoholism, the details of the AA 12 step programme and how it supports people to reach sobriety very interesting. However, we mostly found Amy's introspection somewhat rambling and sometimes the book became disjointed. Whilst the stories from Hackney weren't popular, in the end, the group agreed it was necessary for Amy to share an account of that very difficult and painful decade.

In contrast, her writing about living on Mainland (the main island of the Orkneys) and Papay (one of the smaller islands) was engaging. One can feel the excitement of seeing the 'Merry Dancers' as she has 'swapped disco lights for celestial lights' and coldwater swimming to shock her senses away from her addictive and obsessive nature. She does not cut herself off from the outside world, using the Internet to enhance her understanding of the natural world. By developing routines, she finds it possible to avoid slipping back into alcoholism although the reader is left in no doubt of the daily challenges she faces and continual struggle to avoid doing so, be warned - this could be a 'marmite' book; one of our group really disliked it, they said they definitely would not recommend it and would rather watch paint dry!

We have had a number of new Bookworms join our group recently, which is wonderful, welcome to you all.



#### **HEDGEHOG MATTERS**

Due to bad time management this was written in about ten minutes this month to meet the deadline for the BN editor so hopefully it's all accurate!

If any hogs are still out and about they will be looking for every bit of food that they can find so if you have access to your garden, keep an eye under your bird feeders at night where there may be bits of left-over seed. Remember that other wildlife, like birds also need water in winter so change a bowl of water regularly. Leaving a small ball in the bowl will help to stop it from freezing. With the weather forecast to become colder soon, any that haven't yet hibernated will no doubt be heading that way soon.

It seems to have been the fashion for the last few years to have wildlife on everything from clothing to bags, mugs, cards and



notebooks. It struck me before Christmas though that sadly, our native European hedgehog (*above photo*) that we are all so familiar with is declining even more rapidly on all these things than it is in reality. That's fast, because in reality it's declining rapidly too (though I can't remind you of that rate of decline now as I'm writing at breakneck speed) In fact our native hog is almost extinct on all the things mentioned above and has been replaced by the smaller, paler, squatter and depending on your viewpoint, cuter hedgehog, the African pygmy hedgehog.

It would be easy not to notice this unless you are very familiar with our native hog and unless you have a picture of them both side by side to compare. I have put them both together here and you can see the difference in size and body length. Sadly, even google hedgehog images are dominated by Pygmy's and there are few pictures of our native hogs. Pygmy pictures are usually of baby or young hogs too, no doubt tempting more people to consider them as pets because they look cute.

African pygmy's (*photo below*) are a hybrid of two other types of hedgehog and became popular as pets in the United State since the 80s, being bred in captivity for pets. I do wonder how 'tame' these really are. They have increased in popularity in this country in recent years but as they are solitary, smelly, nocturnal, and need special heated care, some irresponsible pet owners release them into the wild once they realise that they do not make ideal pets.



Most are unlikely to survive in the wild because they are tropical

creatures not suited to our cold climate. The lucky ones get seen and handed in to wildlife rescues centres. They are also more likely to be predated in the wild because they are easier to see.

This month includes Valentine's Day with all its connections with romantic love! Little is known of its origins but many think it relates to this story.

In the third century, the Roman Emperor Claudius II Gothicus was having a hard time recruiting enough soldiers. He thought this was because Roman men did not want to leave their loves or families behind, so he cancelled all marriages and engagements in Rome. Thousands of couples saw their hopes of love dashed and no one seemed interested in standing up to the emperor. Step forward a simple Christian priest named Valentine. He began to secretly marry soldiers before they went off to war. Emperor Claudius found out about the secret ceremonies and had Valentine thrown into prison and ordered him to be put to death.

As Valentine was awaiting execution, he fell in love with a blind girl, the jailer's daughter. It was a brief romance because the next day Valentine was clubbed to death by Roman executioners.

Chris Fenemore, Watch Manager, 16 Years at Deddington:

Between managing our farms in Clifton and North Aston, I also manage the crew at Deddington Fire Station. Twenty years ago, we suffered a serious fire on the farm which was my first introduction to the fire station. Shortly afterwards I read in the Deddington News that the station might close due to a lack of crew and I knew this was my chance to make a difference. As an incident commander I get to direct my firefighters to resolve challenging operational incidents which is hugely rewarding.

George Williamson, Crew Manager, 6 years at Deddington: I joined Deddington Fire Station to start a flexible career that allows me to give something back to the community. I work as a maintenance manager at Featherton house. The staff there are really supportive which allows me to give lots of cover during week days. The best part of the job is the excitement you get when the pager goes off – you know you're going out to help people when they need it the most.

**Nicky Isted, Crew Manager**, 6 years at Deddington: Joining the Fire Service was a dream of mine from when I was a kid. Now, years later, I get to drive the fire engine to real emergencies and help get fire engines to where they are really needed as soon as is safely possible. Working in Adderbury gives me the chance to go on lots of callouts, and the extra money at the end of the month is very useful too.

Adam Franklin, Firefighter, 12 years at Deddington: When I moved to the area I thought the local fire station would be a great place to meet people in the village. Since then I have made many close friends through the Service. I'm lucky to have a flexible job as a gardener and a caring partner who supports what I do. My advice to anyone thinking of joining would be, if I can do it, you can too.

Emma Flint, Firefighter, 6 years at Deddington: The excitement of not knowing what we're going to when we get called out is amazing. Every job we go to is different and there are lots of situations where we get to help people. The training we do every week is fun and it helps that we usually manage to fit a cake in too. When I changed my career, I thought this would be something rewarding to do.

Now I fit it around my childminding job and being a mum to my two children.

I work in different places doing carpentry so I had to limit my hours with the Fire Service to evenings and some weekends. I have since had the opportunity to transfer into the whole-time duty system and have adapted my cover around my new shift pattern.

Andy Hayward, Firefighter, 1991–2011, 2017 onwards: I followed in my uncles' footsteps when I first became a firefighter at Deddington. I had to move to Banbury in 2002, where I served with the Banbury retained station until 2011. I'm lucky to be able to have re-joined Deddington last year with the support from my partner. I work as a firefighter at London Oxford Airport and can adapt my cover at Deddington around my shift pattern and my young family.

Adrian Spilsbury, Firefighter, 5 years at Watlington and Deddington: When I moved to the area I already knew I wanted to be a part of Deddington fire station as I had already served two-and-a-half years with Watlington. As a farrier I usually work alone so getting called in to work with a tight team with the fire service is fantastic.

Unfortunately, there was another burglary in the village over the Christmas period so below are some recommendation from the Thames Valley Police website.

#### **BECOME A CREATURE OF HABIT**

Try to get into the habit of following your own course of action when you lock up your home. This will ensure that you don't forget anything. Here's what we recommend you do before you go out:

- close and lock all your doors and windows, even if you're only going out for a few minutes
- double-lock any door
- make sure that any valuables are out of sight
- keep handbags away from the letterbox or cat flap and hide all keys including car keys, as a thief could hook keys or valuables through even a small opening
- never leave car documents or ID in obvious places such as kitchens or hallways
- in the evening, shut the curtains and leave lights on
- if you're out all day, then it's advisable to use a timer device to automatically turn lights and a radio on at night
- set your burglar alarm
- make sure the side gate is locked
- lock your shed or garage
- lock your bike inside a secure shed or garage, to a robust fitting bolted to the ground or wall, like a ground anchor


