#### **PARISH COUNCIL NOTES**

A meeting of the Parish Council took place at 7.30pm on 3<sup>rd</sup> April in Barford Village Hall and was attended by Cllrs Turner, Hobbs Eden, Charman Cox, Best, District Cllr Williams and Mr Best, (Parish Clerk and Responsible Financial Officer). Five members of the public attended the meeting. Apologies were received from County Councillor Estemian

**Minutes of the last meeting:** It was **RESOLVED** that the minutes of the meeting held on 6<sup>th</sup> March 2019 were a true and accurate record. Proposed by Cllr Cox, seconded Cllr Best.

#### **Public Participation:**

Parish Council Grants – Representative from the Parochial Church Council and Barford News attended the meeting to present their applications for grants. The Village Hall Committee have also submitted a grant application. The Parish Council will decide on what grants to pay at the May meeting.

## Report from County Councillor Arash Fatemian: None Report from District Councillor Bryn Williams:

Mid-Cherwell Neighbourhood Plan - The Mid-Cherwell Neighbourhood Plan has been recommended for approval at the next council meeting of Cherwell District Council. Executive Committee decision. That the referendum result of 21 March 2019 where 90.2% of those who voted were in favour of the Mid-Cherwell Neighbourhood Plan which is above the required 50% be noted. (2) That it be recommended to Council that it 'makes' the Mid-Cherwell Neighbourhood Plan so that it continues to have effect as part of the statutory Development Plan for the District. (3) That Council be recommended to approve the issuing and publication of a decision statement.

Joint Working between CDC and OCC - The report sets out the progress of the partnership since its inception in October 2018 and a series of recommendations to develop and enhance joint working. Positive progress has been shown alongside opportunities for further development. It is the view of the Partnership Working Group that the joint working model demonstrates a good opportunity for Cherwell and Oxfordshire to generate savings, deliver efficiencies and improve two tier working. The recommendations set out how this can be further developed, work continues apace with identifying opportunities.

The OVO Energy Women's Tour - Oxfordshire has secured an agreement with the event organisers of the OVO Energy Women's Tour. The OVO Energy Women's Tour is the UK's biggest and most prestigious bike race for women. A founder member of the UCI Women's World Tour, the race attracts the world's top cyclists – including Olympic and World Champions to complete on British roads over five days each June. All councils across Oxfordshire have agreed, in principle, at an Oxfordshire Leaders meeting on 4 March for Oxfordshire to be a host venue over the next three years. This will include hosting the overall start and finish in 2020 and 2021 and hosting

Stage 3 of the event on 12 June 2019. This is being led by Oxfordshire County Council who will contract with SweetSpot, the event organiser. The OVO Energy Women's Tour presents an exciting opportunity to showcase the county, and to maximise the potential economic value. SweetSpot estimate the economic benefits of the 2018 OVO Energy Women's' Cycle Tour to be £7.7 million.

#### Parish Matters:

Play area in West Close – Councillors met on West Close before the meeting to agree the new location of the goal post. The build is due to commence on 23<sup>rd</sup> April and will take about 2 weeks. Regular deliveries of materials will be made during the build period. It is hoped that disruption to local residents will be minimal. The official opening of the play area is planned for 11<sup>th</sup> May.

**Reinforcement of Village Green** – The proposed date for this is the 1<sup>st</sup> weekend in May.

Online Banking — Barclays Business Banking department has confirmed that the application must be initiated by two Councillors visiting the Banbury branch despite the Banbury branch advising that it should be initiated by contacting the Business Banking department.

**Leak Allowance Claim** – Castle Water emailed to say that they have had no response from Thames Water to the Leak Allowance Claim. A bill of £3.37 has been received for fixed water charges for the period 1st January to 28th February. It was agreed to pay this but not the balance brought forward of £426.65 for the period when the water meter was leaking.

**New Dog Bin** – The new larger capacity dog bin which will replace the existing bin opposite Barford St Michael Church has arrived and will replace the dog bin opposite the church, which will be moved to Horne Hill. The clerk will consult with CDC to determine the location.

Fence on Netherworton Road – CDC planning confirmed that they have contacted the owner of the house that erected a new fence which appears to be outside their boundary but no response has been received. CDC have also contacted Oxfordshire County Council to report the new fence and request if they wish to take any action.

**Footpath sign at The Rock** – It was agreed that the clerk would contact CDC to request signs for the footpath as people are walling on the road through The Rock which is dangerous.

#### Finance:

**Payments** - The Clerk sought approval to pay cheques totalling £213.79. This was proposed by Cllr Eden and seconded by Cllr Cox.

#### DOWN ON THE FARM

Last month I mentioned being left to manage my employer's farm in Devon while he and his wife went on holiday. The ten days did pass quickly enough but not without a few mishaps.

On the first morning after their departure while attempting to start the elderly Ford tractor the starting handle spun round when the engine fired and smacked me on the jaw. Struggling back to consciousness I woke up to lots of tiny white stars and a blood stained shirt and staggered into the farmhouse to seek some help. In those days most rural telephones were on a 'party line', in other words they were shared with another property. I lifted the receiver to hear our neighbour's wife talking to a friend about organising a tea party and asked if she could possibly hang up while I called a doctor.

No she could not, was the tart reply, and I had no right to interrupt an important private conversation. She continued to moan and wail like a ruptured bagpipe until I cradled the receiver and went in search of the local doctor who patched me up, gave me some pills and suggested the impossibility of taking a few days off.

Most of the jobs on the farm I could manage myself but some needed two pairs of hands. So I was pleased when Worlington Ray paid a visit. He was a friend of my employer and called Worlington Ray for no other reason than his name was Ray and he came from the village of Worlington. It would have been more entertaining if he had come from Hoe near Plymouth. Anyway, he helped me get the sheep in to check on fat lambs and drag a platform I had made to bridge a ditch that ran through the farm; a long awaited job that would make a short cut from the garden to the orchard.

Unfortunately, during this exercise Worlington Ray slipped into the ditch which was fairly deep, wet and steep sided. I managed to haul him out but the exertion had been too much for him and, muttering something about being

late for another appointment, he squelched off back down the lane.

Having sorted the lambs I was wondering how to get them back to the field when the postman arrived. He kindly agreed to a cup of tea in return for some help. I also treated him to a large slice of chocolate cake which, earlier in the week, I had found in a tin next to the bread bin. Most thoughtful of my employer's wife, I had thought at the time, but I noticed there wasn't much of it left.

Later that evening I glanced though the post and found a card from my employer's wife. It pictured a deserted beach lapped by white tipped waves and fringed with palm trees. On the reverse it said they were having a great time and hoped all was well. There was a PS at the bottom which read: 'Worlington Ray will call in sometime this week. Could you give him the cake I left in a tin by the bread bin. I made it for his wife's birthday'.

#### BARFORD GREEN GARDEN CLUB NOTES FROM OUR POTTING SHED MAY 2019

Spring Is Just Okay by Phil Cornish
Spring has sprung, the time has come, for the
greening of the trees
A time of change, renewal and growth for my
allergies

Like everything else in this great world, Spring has its pluses and minuses

But its features are quite singular when it comes to my poor sinuses

A beautiful time of blossoms and buds, new branches and blue skies

But I can't enjoy them one little bit through my oozing, watery eyes

A neti pot, a nasal rinse, I'll try them, yes I will I'll even take a 24-hour non-drowsy worthless pill So listen cheerleaders of flowers and sun, to you I must disclose

Spring is not great for all of us, especially my nose

On **Sunday APRIL** 7<sup>th</sup> around 12 people came to **Evenley Wood Garden** and one of the **RARE PLANT FAIRS.** It was a great visit, crowded and many plants for sale. Most of us wandered around the acres of garden looking at azaleas and camellias among other special woodland plantings. Some of us decided that we would visit later in the year.

**FUTURE VISITS and EVENTS......** Thursday MAY 23<sup>rd</sup> **PLANT SWAP for Members......** this year a change of venue. Sue Lane at Westfield, Lower Street has kindly offered to host. 7.0 for 7.30pm. Bring any plants you want to get rid of and pick up some others. Bring something to drink.

A visit Broughton Grange on JULY 28<sup>th.</sup> Avondale Nursery near Coventry, with a guided visit. To be arranged, look at emails for final dates and costs.

THINGS TO DO IN THE GARDEN IN MAY..... watch out for late frosts. protect tender plants, earth up potatoes, and promptly plant any still remaining, plant out summer bedding at the end of the month - except in cold areas.

Water early and late to get the most out of your water, recycle water when possible: Regularly hoe off weeds, open greenhouse vents and doors on warm days, mow lawns weekly, check for nesting birds before clipping hedges, lift and divide overcrowded clumps of daffodils and other springflowering bulbs....watch out for viburnum beetle and lily beetle grubs.

Tie in climbing and rambling roses as near to horizontal as possible. This will restrict sap flow causing more side-shoots to grow along the length of stem. Tubs can be planted up with summer bedding in milder areas.. If you want to grow your own spring bedding for next year, many common choices (including wallflowers, pansies, and daisies, Bellis perennis) need to be sown between now and July in order to flower next spring, as they are biennials. Winter bedding plants can also be sown from now until July. Harden off plants raised from seed and cuttings by leaving them outside for gradually increasing periods of time. Start with only the warmest part of the day, and build up to overnight exposure. Doing this for 10-14 days before planting them outdoors permanently (whenever the risk of frost has passed), will reduce any check to their growth while establishing in their final position.

Thin out direct sowings of hardy annuals and vegetables such as radishes. This is best done in two or three stages at fortnightly intervals. Final spacing should be between 10-20cm (4-8in), using the upper limit for tall or spreading plants, and the lower limit for smaller plants. Prick out indoor sowings when they are large enough to handle without damage. Sweet peas need training and tying in to their supports to encourage them to climb and make a good display



## CHURCH MATTERS



Over Easter there was a wide range of services in the Barfords, Hempton and Deddington recalling the death and Resurrection of Jesus.

I'm afraid I didn't make it to the 5:00am service in Hempton to watch the dawn come up on Easter Day and celebrate the bringing of the light into the church. I did however go to the Poetry Mass in Deddington on the Tuesday evening before Easter. A very moving version of the Holy Communion using a range of poems rather than the standard words.

St George, the patron saint of England, normally celebrated on 23<sup>rd</sup> April is famous for slaying a dragon (Spoiler Alert - Dragons don't really exist!). The dragon myth was added hundreds of years after his death as a martyr in 303 AD. St George was put to death because he refused to pay homage to pagan gods. He was certainly not English and thought to have been born in what is now Turkey and died in modern day Israel. He was probably an officer in the Roman army.

The list of saints is very long. One of my favourites is my namesake, St Anthony, who is the patron saint of swineherds! He was an early Christian monk in Egypt who had a domestic pig that reminded him to pray regularly.

Ascension Day, forty days after Easter Sunday, will be Thursday 30<sup>th</sup> of May this year. For forty days after his resurrection Jesus travelled and preached with his disciples around Jerusalem. He encouraged them to carry on his work here on earth. Jesus then took them to Mount Olivet, The Mount of Olives, near Bethany (probably the current city al-Eizariya in the West Bank) where he blessed the disciples, told them to wait for the power of the Holy Spirit and was then taken to Heaven. We celebrate the arrival of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost, also known as Whit Sunday, but more on this next month.

On Sunday 28th April we had our Annual General Meeting (known as the Annual Parochial Church Meeting) where we discussed the progress we

had made during 2018 and talked about our plans for the future.

Our aim in all we do is to make our churches more appropriate for 21st Century worship whilst maintaining their historic beauty. We try to make the churches more welcoming for families with children, more accessible to old, young and everyone in between (abled, and disabled), and where we can be generally more hospitable to people who come to worship and/or visit.

We try to always remember that our mission is to 'Bring and show the love of God in the Barfords and beyond'.

#### **HEDGEHOG MATTERS**

Everyone has their own markers for heralding the end of winter and the real arrival of spring. For me it's the sound or sight of the first hedgehog and it's always great to know that they've survived the winter, especially when there's a chance that they may be the ones that we released from the Wildlife Hospital last year. So it's great that at least two people have seen hedgehogs at different ends of the village so far this year.

The first one was spotted on 1st or 2nd April early in the morning at the end of Summer Ley. This was just a day or two after the clocks changed, but I don't expect anyone told the hedgehog that, so as the children who saw it were just getting ready to go out to school, the hog was probably getting ready to shelter and sleep for the day, having made optimal use of the dawn hours for foraging. Food isn't yet as abundant as it will be in a few weeks so every minute counts after winter weight loss in hibernation and leaner food times.

Another hedgehog, reported as "smallish", was seen in the evening on 9<sup>th</sup> or 10<sup>th</sup> April in gardens behind Church Street, so quite a distance from the other one. It's possible that this could be the same hedgehog, as of course we know that they can travel up to a mile at night, thought that is often a bit later in the season when they're looking for mates. Given the earliness in the season and the fact that both the households that spotted these hogs leave food out for them (thus perhaps avoiding the need to travel quite as far in search of food), I like to think that this may have been two different hedgehogs. If it was two different hogs in different parts of the village then those holes in fences or hedges or under gates (13cm) become even more important to connect our gardens and green spaces and provide shortcuts.



As the longest serving female MP Harriet charts her career from the 70's to present day. Her feminism and fight for equality are evident throughout the book; she has worked for equal pay, employment rights for women and better representation of women in Parliament.

She is critical of the early Labour movement she became a part of highlighting misogyny and sexism in the Westminster of the late 70's but goes on to chart the changes experienced during the Blair/Brown years of government. There are some interesting descriptions of the machinations of a party in government and she doesn't hold back being critical of Peter Mandelson, David Miliband, John Prescott or the current Labour leadership.

We felt this was very interesting, but long read about politics from a woman's point of view; it certainly wasn't a party-political broadcast on behalf of the Labour party. We would recommend reading the book but beware she was a lawyer first, so there are lots of facts.

Whilst wordy with perhaps too many acronyms she does portray the tenacity and strength required to exist in Westminster and reminds everyone that equality, on many levels, is still work in progress.
