It is this time of the year that we are heading towards the celebration of Easter.



Rev. Nick Fielden has been appointed to become our next Vicar



GREEN THOUGHT OF THE MONTH

BARFORD ENVIRONMENT NETWORK is a friendly, informal group that looks for ways of greener living in our villages. Have you walked the footpaths across Mead Farm? There are several, whether for a circular village walk or a longer one towards Milcombe, and with so much wildlife around it's worth taking binoculars or a camera with you.

Managed now by Lindsay Woolgrove and her daughter and son-in-law Lucy and Richard Warner, it's been in family ownership for five generations since 1890. Reaching from the river Swere on the south to the former wartime airfield of Barford St John to the north, and partly within the Barford St John conservation area, it encompasses 350 acres and a variety of habitats. 140 acres are arable land; the rest is pasture for horses and sheep and for making organic hay, as well as woodland, scrubland and natural ponds, with 50 acres devoted to an environmental scheme.

Conserving biodiversity isn't a new idea at Mead Farm, where natural ponds were established and woodland trees planted back in the 1980s, with the support of the local Wildlife Trust. A current project you'll probably notice on your walks is the setting aside of whole fields for birds, insects and invertebrates, sown with special seed mixes such as Bumblebird. Plants grown from these mixes encourage pollinating insects in summer and provide winter food for a range of birds. Species recorded include siskins, bramblings, whitethroats and blackcaps, while foxes, hares and deer are frequently seen in these areas. On another part of the farm, local ornithologist Jan Guilbride is monitoring curlew populations, hoping to see their numbers increase as their habitat is protected, which is part of the Wild Oxfordshire Upper Thames Curlew Recovery Project. This year will see the installation of more swift, owl and bat boxes, too.

Soil health is another priority, as on all farms looking to minimise impact on the land. Organic manure boosts soil nutrients, while direct drilling and restricted use of farm machinery helps avoid soil compaction. Cover crops, such as turnips, are grown for overwintering sheep and also to protect the soil between periods of regular wheat and barley sowings.



With so much biodiversity loss across the country, it's heartening to know of these effective measures to restore nature in our own area. Following their village hall presentation in the autumn, Lucy, Richard and Lindsay are keen to share their experiences and knowledge by welcoming visitors to Mead Farm. This summer, they'll host a farm walk for our environment

group as well as offering a workshop to demonstrate ways of welcoming wildlife to our gardens by making bug hotels. Look for a date announcement soon!

Here are some jobs for March:

- Cut back Cornus (dogwood) and Salix (willow) – grown for colourful winter stems
- Hoe and mulch weeds to keep them under control.

DEDDINGTON Bookworms

Last summer our group read the Elif Shafak book, 'The Island of

Missing Trees'. Our latest read was another Shafak novel, '10 minutes and 38 seconds in this Strange World'.

Shafak uses her novels to highlight social issues and this story in particular challenges traditional gender roles and explores the complexities of women's experiences whilst also giving valuable insight into Turkish and Middle Eastern cultures.

Tequila Leila is a female sex worker in Istanbul who is brutally murdered. She's definitely dead, but for 10 minutes and 38 seconds her brain continues to function. In those final minutes she recalls her troubled childhood, marriage, relationships and her eclectic friends. A deeply touching story of friendship and marginalization unfolds.

An interesting and well written book but not enjoyed by all Bookworms. One criticism was that the final part of the story becomes almost comical in places (not sure this was intentional!). Some Bookworms also found the subject matter slightly disturbing.

COMMENTS: Angus and I actually went out for a Valentine's lunch, the first time in about 17 years. We had a voucher for Christmas so I booked it up...and it was amazing. Our STARTERS were....Gin Curred Salmon, Tonic and Pickled Lemon, Dill And Cucmber AND Confit Chicken Wings, Mushroom Tortellini, Roscofff Onion, Maitake Mushrroom....for MAINS we had Roasted Cod, Kohlrabi, Burrnt Apple, Bbq Octopus, Apple Dashi AND Lamb Rump, Belly and Slow Cooked Neck, Cauliflower Puree, Black Garlic AND for dessert we had Caramalised White Chocolate custard, Pistachio Cake, Blood Orange AND Toasted Lemon Chiboust Vanilla Ice Cream, Hilary's Honey.

The food, the restaurant were incredible and the staff were so professional and friendly. The bit I really liked was that they had a snug where you had a drink before going through to your table. We were booked in for 1:30 but didn't go through till 2pm, so relaxed. And regarding price, 2-Courses £37 or 3-Courses £42. I would happily have paid more. There are numerous pub/restaurnats in this area that say they are Fine Dining and charge you accordingly but this really was the real deal, really special.

READING RECOMMENDATIONS




George Harrison: the Reluctant Beatle by Philip Norman shows George in second place to Lennon and McCartney with relatively few songs included on albums. After the group's dissolution his several solo albums met with a mixed reception, with the exception of the hugely successful *All Things Must Pass*. His affairs were deceptively managed by his accountant and he was involved in copyright infringement for unconsciously using the melody of *He's So Fine* for his hit *My Sweet Lord*.

He established Handmade Films to support UK projects including the *Monty Python* movies, while his interest in Indian mysticism influenced his songwriting as well as becoming a focus for charitable work, supported by second wife Olivia. He spent much time restoring Friar Park, a Gothic Victorian manor house in Oxfordshire; his love for this house never wavered, despite being stabbed forty times there by a psychotic intruder, two years before his death from cancer. *Trevor Arrowsmith*



The Right to Rule by Ben Riley-Smith: the subtitle of this excellent book is "thirteen Years, Five Prime Ministers and the Implosion of the Tories" and that sums up the extraordinary few years we have been living through. Ben Riley-Smith has held a ringside seat for much of that period as the Daily Telegraph's Political Editor. The period has been punctuated by the Brexit rifts, the problems of Theresa May (tinged I always felt by misogyny towards her) the chaos of the pandemic, the bizarre "leadership" of Johnson and Truss competing with the lettuce for longevity. Sunak has restored some stability but gives the impression that he knows he is a stop-gap. The book


chronicles the constant changes of Ministers which cannot be good for consistent policy making. This is a must read for political aficionados and is recommended for normal people too. *John Bowers*



The Lamberts: George, Constant and Kit, by Sir Andrew Motion.

Names that probably mean little now, but in their respective eras they were cultural shooting stars of their generation - gifted, controversial and self destructive. Grandfather George (1873-1930) became the most famous Australian painter of his day, a War Artist and a leader of the belle époque. Father Constant (1901-51) one of England's most important 20th century composers and conductors, commissioned by Diaghilev to write a ballet for the Ballets Russes, a pioneering exponent of jazz techniques, lover of Margot Fonteyn, a founder of Sadler's Wells, friend of Anthony

Powell and the model for Hugh Moreland in *A Dance to the Music of Time*. Son Kit (1935-81), a flamboyant self-publicist and rock and roll genius, discoverer and manager of The Who, founder of the record label Track and heroin addict. For a century, separately, they defined artistic achievement, outshone all around and then self destructed into oblivion. *Christopher Murray*



Roots, by Alex Haley, tells the story of seven generations. In The Gambia in 1767, seventeen-year-old Kunta Kinte is abducted by slave traders. After a harrowing voyage he arrives in America. He is sold to a 'Massa' and after many attempts at escape he is mutilated so that he cannot run. The story follows the generations that followed. He taught his daughter Kizzy his history and some words from his homeland. She passed this knowledge on to her son, George, who passed it to his children and so on; each retelling adding a little of the life stories of subsequent generations until they reached the author.

The book includes powerful imagery about the horrors of the slave trade, and shows how one man's name and story was passed through his family for 200 years until his great-great-great-great-grandson, the author, visited Kunte Kinte's home village and was embraced as someone precious. *Ishbel Freeman*

FROM DEDDINGTON FIRE STATION

We are very well behaved and safe in North Oxfordshire – night crew has been quiet crew on the whole! Just when I thought that January would prove challenging to write about, an evening shout roused me from the sofa. With blues emanating from the station, a local RTC saw us out on an emergency shout.

Upon arrival at the scene, with the police already in attendance, we were able to fully close the road to allow a safe environment for us to work in.

We were then able to make the stricken vehicle safe by engaging the handbrake and disconnecting the battery. Smoke had been seen soon after the accident but was out on arrival, so no BA provision was required. A live electrical cable had been exposed by the demolition of a lamp post, but there was no arcing evident, and the electricity board was on its way. After a quick clear up of the debris, we left the incident to the police to fully discuss with the driver.

Back to station and a full soap down and clean of the truck before reversing back into the bay, job done.


