Some jobs for November:

Autumn has arrived and winter is on its way. Leaves are falling rapidly and wind and rain are on the increase. Tender plants will need protection from frost, gales and freezing rains. Move plants into the greenhouse or into a sheltered spot, but if you can't, it is worth wrapping plants or pots.

Winter can be a tough time for birds in terms of water and food, so keep supplies well topped up. This will encourage winter birds into the garden.

Plant out winter bedding.

Insulate outdoor containers from frost - bubble wrap works well.

Use a seasonal bonfire, where this is allowed, to dispose of excess debris unfit for composting. Check for hedgehogs first!


BYGONE BARFORD BABIES - Last month's baby picture was...wait for it.....



Attack on Nature? "Make no mistake, we are angry. The new UK Government has launched an unprecedented attack on nature and the laws that protect it. We need to defend our vulnerable and vital wild places, now. Don't let this happen in your name." The **RSPB**, responding to government proposals for environmental deregulation. It's among the 79 organisations that have signed an open letter to the Prime Minister, warning that the weakening of planning and habitat

protection could hasten the decline of the natural world.

From the letter: "Laws that protect the bedrock of our environment—air and water quality, soil health, heritage, and wildlife—must not be weakened. Doing so could hasten the torrent of pollution that blights our rivers and streams and increase the damaging presence of pesticides across a range of habitats ... Of course, the consequences for wildlife could mean that species and habitats are lost from our shores. Animal welfare regulations that ensure better quality of life for millions of farm and companion animals are also at risk, and with them the UK's reputation as a welfare world leader ... The Retained EU Law (Revocation and Reform) Bill and Planning and Infrastructure Bill proposals to weaken planning protection could put paid to the chances of meeting legally-binding climate and nature targets."

This letter was signed by the RSPB, National Trust, The Wildlife Trusts, Woodland Trust, World Wide Fund for Nature UK, Wildfowl & Wetlands Trust (WWT), Campaign for the Protection of Rural England, Client Earth, Marine Conservation Society, Greenpeace UK and many others.

If you're a supporter of one or more of these organisations, you'll already be aware of this and will have been invited to email our MP and sign petitions. If you'd like to learn more and be involved, follow #AttackonNature on Twitter. You can also sign up to #PeoplesPlanForNature (www.peoplesplanfornature.org) – "the UK's biggest conversation about the future of nature". Submit your views (if you get this in time – closes on October 31st) and find out about the People's Assembly for Nature which will bring ideas together and make recommendations.

Grow a tree! The **Deddington biodiversity group** is setting up a micro tree nursery. The idea is to collect seed from native trees around the parish and grow them on until they're ready to be used in local planting schemes. The group is working with an expert gardener who can advise.

There will be a need for initiatives like this, because the demand for native trees in the many large-scale tree-



planting schemes on the horizon will exceed the number available for sale. This means that others will be imported - but trees we grown and nurture ourselves will be better suited to local conditions. Would you like to take part? Hawthorn, field maple, ash and others readily self-sow around our gardens and can be dug up and potted as an alternative to growing from seed. If you're interested, let me know and I'll put you in touch with Tammy and the Deddington group.



DEDDINGTON FIRE STATION

A week ago our call out total was stuck in single figures – very low when you compare that to the last 3 months

of over 100 shouts. However, this last week has resulted in a number of serious fires and incidents boosting our total to 19 call outs.

However, the start of the month saw us respond to a rare incident, although one we are constantly asked about – have you ever rescued a cat up a tree!! So we can now all say yes we have (some of our crew have been waiting 15 years for this one!).

The cat, Clyde, had been a fair way up a lovely



mature oak for most of the day. Access was limited in the owner's garden meaning we had to approach from a neighbouring property and erect the 13.5m ladder to allow access to Clyde. The form of the tree and branch positioning

meant that a standard ladder pitch couldn't be achieved allowing some creative firecraft amongst the crew.


After several aborted goes, the ladder was extended to the branch below Clyde, only for him to climb up further. Eventually he came back down and 2 firefighters in working at heights gear scaled the ladder equipped with treats and a large net. After 10 minutes of cajoling, FF Louis Martin's Dolittle skills paid off and Clyde was brought down to great relief of the owners and was placed in a line bag and passed over the fence.

Whilst the rescue was occurring, the children watching were given a tour of the fire truck to take their minds off events.

With autumn now officially here, please remember to sweep your chimneys before lighting your fires and do take extra care with low sun during those commuting runs.



Seasonal flu is a highly infectious illness caused by a flu virus. The virus infects your lungs and upper airways, causing a sudden high temperature and





Reading recommendations from **BARFORD BOOKCHAT**



Derek Jarman's Garden, by Derek Jarman and Howard Sooley. After seeing photographs and reading about Prospect Cottage, I at last visited this summer and was captivated both by this iconic garden and by the unique atmosphere and landscape of Dungeness, with the nuclear power station looming in the background. On my return I read this, Jarman's notes, reflections and poems, the last book he wrote before his death in 1994. Weakened by illness he finds inspiration in the garden he's shaped, collecting stones, driftwood and rusted metal to make sculptures and pebble necklaces. "A cold, grey day. I write the poems, and while the poems form the rain blows in. Slowly the puddles gather at the roadside. Then, as the day draws to a close, sunlight floods the




A Drink at the Bar by Graham Boal QC. This is a very courageous book. It is written by a friend and professional colleague of 50 years, our paths progressing on parallel courses until Graham's personal demons forced him to retire prematurely from a glittering career.

After starting as a young pupil barrister in swinging sixties London, Graham describes his involvement in many of the most famous cases of the next four decades - junior counsel for Jeremy Thorpe, Crown counsel in the Birmingham Six appeal, the Calvi inquest and many more. His contemporaries- of whom he writes with candour and wit - included George Carman QC, Sir John Mortimer QC and others more talented but less well known. He rose from the most senior prosecutor to become an Old Bailey Judge. Yet, in 1993 he was diagnosed as an alcoholic depressive. His unflinching account of his fight to conquer this - its near disastrous effect on his

marriage and his career- is both soul destroying and spiritually enhancing, aimed at encouraging others to seek the support he was ultimately to find. *Christopher Murray*



Piranesi by Susanna Clarke appeared sixteen years after her first novel, **Jonathan Strange & Mr Norrell**, which was dramatised by the BBC. I feel like an observer in *The Emperor's New Clothes*, hampered by a lack of interest in fantasy fiction and at odds with the admiring literary elite. Piranesi lives, mainly alone, in a House of multiple, far-reaching halls containing sea water, crashing waves, sea birds and many imposing human statues. The action mainly involves a character called The Other. What unites them is The Other's pursuit of ultimate wisdom, though Piranesi gradually loses interest while assisting with research. Time is measured from the day of the arrival of an albatross, recorded in journals. The prose is uncluttered, if unremarkable, and the book is mercifully brief at around 250 pages. What's it all about? Who knows, but it's an excuse for endless philosophising and hypothesising. *Trevor Arrowsmith*



Cutting for Stone by Abraham Verghese is an epic saga that unfolds across five decades in India, Ethiopia and America. Marion and Shiva Stone are born one dramatic afternoon in 1954 in Addis Ababa, the same day their mother, a nun, dies of complications from her hidden pregnancy and they are forsaken by their father. 


