PARISH COUNCIL NOTES

A meeting of the Parish Council took place at 7.30pm on 6th November in Barford Village Hall and was attended by Cllrs Turner, Hobbs, Eden, Cox, Charman, District Councillor Williams, County Cllr Fatemian, Mr Best, (Parish Clerk and Responsible Financial Officer)

Minutes of the last meeting: It was **RESOLVED** that the minutes of the meeting held on 2nd October 2019 were a true and accurate record (unanimous).

Public Participation: None

Report from County Councillor Arash Fatemian:
Horton Hospital – This has been referred to The Secretary of State

OCC Prepared for Brexit – OCC believes that it has made all necessary plans in the event of Brexit

OALC Guidance on grants - The Oxfordshire Association of Local Councils has issued guidance on Parish Councils giving money to the Church.

Report from District Councillor Bryn Williams:
Joint Working between CDC & OCC - The partnership continues to thrive and develop. It is worth noting that since the inception of the joint working partnership between the County Council and Cherwell District Council we have begun to develop a strong collaborative approach to seeking efficiencies through activities such as the sharing of senior posts, joint procurement, and shared services in areas such as human resources and ICT. These efficiencies are important as they help us reduce our running costs and overheads, getting the best value for money. But the partnership is also focused on effectiveness. And whilst reducing our running costs is clearly important, improving the effectiveness of our service delivery also offers a real prize as local people will experience the benefit in terms of the services they receive. We will also seek to address those issues that many Members experience when working across two local authorities.

Posts currently shared are:

- Chief Executive
- Director of Law and Governance (Monitoring Officer)
- Corporate Director: Customers and Organisational Development
- Deputy Director: HR
- Assistant Director: Social Care, Commissioning and Housing
- Assistant Director for Regulatory Services and Community Safety
- Head of Procurement and Contract Management
- Corporate Director: Communities

In addition, shared posts are offering additional support and backfill on an interim basis in services such as communities and culture to ensure there is effective capacity and support to delivery in priority areas such as growth. In the next few months we will also seek to add three further senior joint posts to the leadership of both organisations. Corporate Director: Commercial Development, Property and Assets and Directors for Strategy and Communications and Customers and Digital. In addition to these joint posts a shared approach to emergency planning and business continuity has also been implemented. This has significant benefits for local residents with a single planned response in effect for emergencies and joined up training.

Parish Matters:

Reinforcement of the Village Green – Mr R Palmer has confirmed that he is able to source the materials required to reinforce the edges of the Village Green. It was agreed that this work will be carried out in the spring.

Barford Website compliance with Regulations for Public Sector Bodies' Websites – Our website is currently not compliant and must be altered to be compliant by 23rd September 2020. The Clerk has asked the builder of the website to make the necessary changes.

ICO Data Protection Fees – All Parish Councils are required to pay an annual fee the Information Commissioner's Office. The payment of the fee was approved (unanimous).

Speeding down Murreys Lane – Cars have been observed speeding down Murreys Lane. This is dangerous for pedestrians, particularly at the two entrances to West Close. It has been suggested that a request could be made to highways to make it one way going uphill.

Parking at the bottom of Murreys Lane and outside St Michaels Church – It has been noticed that cars are sometimes parked awkwardly which makes them difficult to pass. Parishioners are asked to park as considerately as possible.

Christmas lights on The Green – These will be switched on on the 1st December.

Climate Emergency – Cherwell District Council has declared a climate emergency.

The George Car Park Sign – This has disappeared again. Cllr Charman agreed to call in to The George on his way home to ask them to put up a car parking sign again.

Moss removal in Robins Close – Herbicide was applied to the pavement in Robins Close earlier in the year, but Thomas Fox have now removed the moss from the pavement.

Grass Cutting Contract – Thomas Fox completed an additional cut to West Close, the Churchyard and verges on 25th October.

Footpath sign for The Rock – This will be fitted by the end of the week.

Overgrown Bushes & Trees on Murreys Lane – Oxfordshire County Council has cleared back all the trees bushes and undergrowth.

Tree obstructing the gateway on the hill out of Barford St John – The pruning will be carried out on 27th & 28th November.

Oak Tree on the corner of Lower Street and Bloxham Road – The pruning will be carried out on 27th & 28th November.

Fix My Street Super User – The clerk has been trained by OCC to authorise repairs to potholes in roads within the 30mph speed limit. The minimum size of the pothole must be 15cm x 4cm and at least 4cm deep.

FROM TONY COLLIER: *After several years of contributing to Barford News I have decided that the ink has run dry! I have thoroughly enjoyed my time as a contributor but farming is a repetitive business and avoiding repetition has become difficult. Time therefore for someone else to have a go!*

FROM THE EDITOR: *May I take this opportunity to thank you Tony for your contributions to BN over the past several years. Each and every beautifully-penned piece has not only been informative, and something of an eye-opener into farming, but also very witty. It's been an absolute joy to read and DOTF will be missed.*

DOWN ON THE FARM

During the late 1960's part of my remit as a farming journalist was the Soviet Bloc and a few times a year I would travel to Hungary, Czechoslovakia, Poland, Russia (once) and East Germany. This was the time before the Berlin Wall came down and visiting these once prosperous countries, now clothed in the drabness of communism was depressing.

East Germany was most frequently visited because we were importing farm machinery from that area, as well as from Poland, Hungary and Czechoslovakia. It was also the worst in terms of Russian oppression and travelling from West Berlin with its prosperity, bright lights and well stocked shops to the Eastern sector was like travelling through a time warp in which drabness, oppression and a poor standard of living combined to continue a harsh reality of the termination of the second World War.. Soviet troops were everywhere and much of the country and its ruined towns and cities appeared untouched since 1945.

Farms had been taken from their owners and grouped into vast Kombinati. Managed by committee they were less than efficient and, in order to maintain full employment, involved manual labour with limited mechanisation. One Kombinat I visited had 300 milking cows that were hand milked by 20 or so women twice a day: 'Why invest in milking machines and put people out of work', I was told in answer to my obvious question.

On one occasion I was taken (one was chaperoned everywhere by a party member) to a massive potato store not far from Leipzig and which collected potato crops from collective farms in a wide area. The striking thing about the place was a high fence topped with razor wire that surrounded it and rifle clutching guards at the entrance. When I questioned my guide about these features I was told it was to prevent people breaking in and stealing the potatoes. For me, that just about summed everything up.

I imagine that East Germany, like other former Soviet controlled areas, is now thriving as West German investment has lifted the drab cloak of communism. The experience did give me the opportunity to visit Colditz Castle and other places of wartime interest. Colditz Castle rears bleakly above its village and its worn stairways and cobbled yards bore witness to the years of incarceration of hundreds of prisoners of war.

Before the Russians cancelled my visa – which eventually happened to all journalists whose frequent visits were treated with increasing suspicion by the Soviet authorities – I took a group of farm contractors to East Germany to look at manufacturing plants and general farming. During the trip our guide took us to Dresden to show us how it had been re-built after, what he described as the dastardly English RAF bombing raids of the Second World War. It was drizzling with rain as we surveyed the unimpressive blocks of new buildings under a grey November sky.

I was standing next to a tall Yorkshireman when our guide, perhaps misinterpreting his boredom, asked him if he had been to Dresden before.

'No', was the terse reply, 'but my dad used to come over quite often, mainly at night'.

To be honest last week wasn't Angus and my first visit, it's about the 5th I think and the food, service etc has been consistently good. You can eat in or order a take-away (take-away only in person, not by phone I believe) but you can have a drink while you are waiting, the service is pretty quick.

A **Large Cod & Chips** will set you back £11.90 Eat-In or £8.90 Take-Away whilst **Scampi & Chips** is £9.90 Eat-In and £7.90 Take-Away. This is pretty average for F&C's nowadays and the portions are quite generous. You can also order the homemade mushy peas and tartar sauce, very tasty.

We spoke to the Chef a few weeks ago and he said that they are planning to introduce lighter lunches, fish finger sandwiches etc for those who do not fancy a heavy old lunch (not me I might add).

Christmas Recipe for the kids...

CHOCOLATE SNOWMAN TRUFFLES {Makes 10}

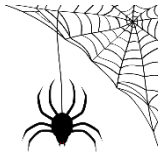
Ingredients

- 100g (4oz) plain chocolate
- 100g (4oz) butter
- 275g (10oz) icing sugar
- White chocolate for grating
- Red and green pre-bought fondant icing - for hats and noses

Method

- Place water in a small pan, bring to the boil and take off the heat
- Break chocolate into a heatproof bowl and place over the water. Gently stir until chocolate is melted. Add the butter and again gently stir until butter has melted. Remove bowl from water
- Sieve the icing sugar into chocolate mixture, fold until thoroughly mixed together. Allow to cool.
- Take small spoonful of the mixture and roll into a small ball. Grate white chocolate into a bowl and roll each truffle in the chocolate until well coated – keep your hands cool and it won't be so sticky!
- Once all the snowmen are complete, make hats and noses using the red and green icing then attach to the snowmen – you may need to use cocktail sticks or a little jam to help sticking.
- Make a little box or use cellophane to wrap your truffles and give them to teachers, friends and relations for Christmas and as thank you pressies

Jobs for December *Winter frost*

As we approach the shortest day of the year in December you will need work to keep you warm outside, such as digging and tree pruning. Check your winter protection and if you have a greenhouse make sure the heater is working. Hopefully there are not too many jobs left to do this year so you will have time for some fireside garden planning. Insulate outdoor taps and prevent ponds from freezing; Prune open-grown apples and pears (but not those trained against walls); Prune acers, birches and vines before Christmas to avoid bleeding; Harvest leeks, parsnips, winter cabbage,

sprouts and remaining root crops Reduce watering of houseplants.

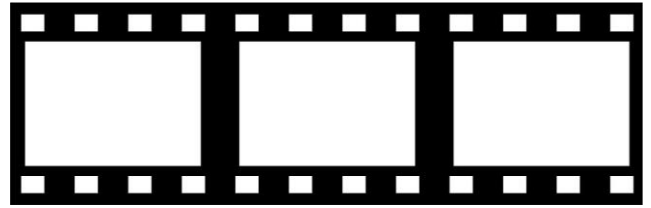

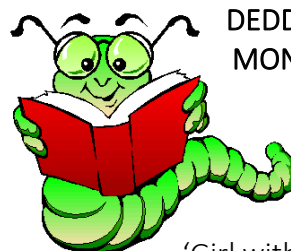
The PFSU and F1 class will be presenting their production, 'A Miracle in Town', on Monday 9th December at 2pm at Deddington Church.

DEDDINGTON BOOKWORMS MONTHLY BOOK REVIEW

In November the read was **New Boy** by **Tracy Chevalier** (of 'Girl with A Pearl Earring' fame).

This is one of a series retelling Shakespeare's plays and is a modern take on Othello.

Chevalier has chosen to set her story in the 1970s Washington DC, an appropriate time and place for the issues highlighted by the tale. Political correctness had not filtered down into the community. Racism was still rife, even in the 6th grade classroom and playground.

A new boy, Osei, faces all the usual uncertainties of finding where he fits in but is also the only black child in the school. The tensions caused by issues of jealousy, identity, race and betrayal are sensitively described. In essentials it is faithful to the original text and well worth reading. Some of the group intend reading Shakespeare's play following their enjoyment of this modern reworking. The issues raised are as relevant today as they were then.

Our next book is **Case Histories** by **Kate Atkinson**.

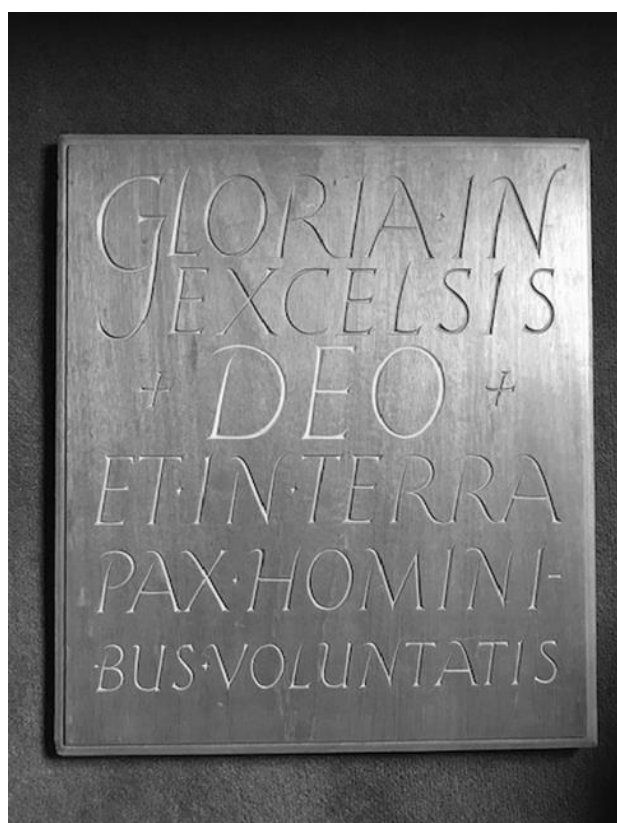
A GIFT FROM THE MADDISON FAMILY
