



LOCAL END-OF-LIFE CARE SERVICES AT RISK DUE TO FUNDING SHORTFALL, WARNS BANBURY'S HOSPICE

Banbury's local hospice, Katharine House, has warned that local end-of-life care services are at risk amid increased need for its services and a broken national funding model.

Figures from national end-of-life care charity Hospice UK suggest that eight in ten hospices are running at a deficit this year. Katharine House is one of those, and is facing a budgeted shortfall of £435,000 as government funding continues to fall as a percentage of the hospice's costs.

Katharine House has launched an appeal to the local community to help close the funding gap, and whilst more than £58,000 has already been raised, there's an urgent need for more funding with at least £400,000 still urgently needed. The charity's Chief Executive, Angharad Orchard, warns that the deficit puts services at risk for more than 900 local families living with cancer, motor neurone disease, heart failure and around 20 other life-limiting illnesses:

"The community has really got behind us and we are extremely grateful to everyone who has already supported us since we announced our funding shortfall. However, there is a long way to go and we urgently need more support.

If we cannot close the gap we will have to make some very difficult decisions about the services we can offer. This will have a serious impact on the lives of local families, now and well into the future, and it's likely that fewer people will be able to receive the support they so desperately need. For the patients who rely on specialist support to be there when it is needed, this would be unthinkable. We are a local independent charity funded by the community, for the community, and without your continuing long-term support, people will not get the specialist help they need to ensure they and their families can make every moment matter in the time they have left together.



ANN BARBARA BEESLEY (ANNIE B, GRANNY ANNIE) 6TH MAY 1934 – 19TH DECEMBER 2019

Annie was born and brought up in Bristol where she attended Redland High School and then went to

work in the Pathology lab at Southmead Hospital,



She met Dennis Beesley in 1954 and they married 2 years later in Port Harcourt, Nigeria. Annie knew nobody at her wedding other than the groom, her parents didn't travel to Africa as it was both way too far and much too foreign...

Dennis's job took them to several countries in West Africa, from Nigeria they moved to Kumasi in Ghana where Sarah was born in 1958. Then, back to northern Nigeria where Patrick was born in 1960 in Kaduna. On to Sierra Leone in 1964 until 1970 when they returned to Ghana. Throughout this time in Africa Annie was the consummate hostess. She liked to party and loved meeting new people. When the 'top brass' from London Head Office visited she delighted in serving home reared guinea pig or rabbit at dinner to emphasize the food shortages in Ghana.

During the Africa years summers were spent in Barford hosting many get-togethers of friends and family. The visitor book was a major part of these visits, where every visitor had to write about their stay, alongside a photo of the event. This tradition has continued throughout Annie's life. Annie moved back to the UK permanently in the early 80s while Dennis stayed working in Accra, until his death in 1990.

While in Africa Annie supported local orphanages and mission hospitals. This charitable work continued when she returned to live in Barford, with her favourite charities being Air Ambulances and Katharine House Hospice. This, in part, was because she had been rescued twice by air ambulance services — once while swimming with seals off the Isles of Scilly — and then more recently when she fell off a five-bar gate near Barford and broke her neck. She was airlifted to the John Radcliffe Hospital in Oxford and thankfully, fully recovered from that injury. Annie loved animals,

and while living in Barford had two Rhodesian Ridgeback dogs including her beloved Poppy. Latterly she did a lot of dog sitting and had a succession of dogs living with her in Barford Cottage – who all learnt quickly that they had to behave when with Annie!

Annie was a keen gardener and managed a productive veg patch behind the cottage. She was fiercely competitive and was very successful at village shows, winning the Victrix Ludorum on 2 occasions and taking home the W.I. Cup 6 times in the past ten years! She was involved in many aspects of village life, she was a member of the WI, and Garden Club, rarely missed Thursday coffee mornings and served as our 'Tea Lady' at monthly village markets for many years. She was also a keen member of a charity supper group which has raised over £15k for Katharine House Hospice. She would help



anything or anybody in Barford, and while at home operated an open-door policy – literally! Annie lived her life to the full. She was adventurous, energetic and enthusiastic. She was very well known in the Barfords and beyond and will be fondly remembered by the village community (as well as her many friends worldwide). She leaves a gap in our lives and will be greatly missed.

FUTURE PLANS ... So far there are two confirmed events. Our AGM will be held on 17th February. All members will receive details , copy of Accounts, previous year's Minutes and Agenda. The AGM will be followed by a short talk about flowers to grow to encourage bees, and will alert us to the menace of the Asian Hornet which we must all look out for. We will be handing out new Membership cards so please bring your £5. These cards entitle you to many discounts at various garden centres. Please invite anyone else who would like to be a member. The meeting will begin at 7.30 and there will be refreshments.

On March 16th we have arranged a talk by Stuart Lowen of Colegrave seeds entitled "What's new in Seasonal Colour". The talk will begin at 7.30. We are currently looking to organise a Panel Discussion on "Greener Gardening" with topics to include composting, peat-free gardening and permaculture. We can maybe discuss this at the AGM and anyone with more ideas and knowledge, please let us know. We would also like to pursue a visit to London to visit The Garden Museum.

JOBS FOR FEBRUARY......Spring is in sight This month there are signs of the approaching spring, with bulbs appearing and wildlife waking up as light levels and temperatures increase. There's plenty to do indoors this month to prepare for the season ahead. Outdoors, as the garden comes to life again, it's time to prune shrubs and climbers, such as *Wisteria* as well as evergreen hedges.

Prepare vegetable seed beds, and sow some vegetables under cover;: Chit potato tubers: Protect blossom on apricots, nectarines and peaches: Net fruit and vegetable crops to keep the birds off: Prune winter-flowering shrubs that have finished flowering: Divide bulbs such as snowdrops, and plant those that need planting 'in the green': Prune *Wisteria*:

Prune hardy evergreen hedges and renovate overgrown deciduous hedges: Prune conservatory climbers such as bougainvillea: Cut back deciduous grasses left

uncut over the winter, remove dead grass from evergreen grasses. Continue to plant hedging plants, shrubs, trees and climbers. Stakes and rabbit guards should be put in place at the time of planting trees, to prevent damage to the rootball or bark.

Continue to plant roses. Avoid planting roses in areas where roses were previously growing otherwise new introductions may suffer from replant diseases. More can be found each month on the RHS website.

The Committee, consisting of Lavinia (Crowther), Janet (Morris), Linda (Newbery), Trevor (Stevens) and Gunilla are arranging talks and visits for the months ahead. All these have agreed to remain on the Committee and will be voted for at the AGM. Please let us know if you have any good ideas for talks, events or visits.

Finally: we remember, with great fondness, Ann Beesley who died peacefully just before Christmas. She was a very active member of the Garden Club, loving flowers and growing many interesting things in her garden and entering the Village Show with gusto. May she remain in our thoughts as we continue to garden.

PROGRESS REPORT ON THE VILLAGE HALL PLANS

The proposed improvements at the village hall are ticking along nicely.

The planning application for new doors to the garden has been submitted and can be viewed on the Cherwell website. We hope to create an opening 4 metres wide and install doors that will open up the hall to the garden.

Ideas about altering the ceiling met a mixed response so we will let well alone in that regard at present.

Three decorators have visited the hall and will be tendering for the total redecoration of the hall, kitchen, and toilets.

A Structural Engineer visited on 14th January and once we have his guidelines regarding the type of girders needed and so on we can ask builders to quote for the job of creating the opening, supplying and installing the doors. We will be applying for grants from several sources and would love to be able to start work in the summer – fingers crossed!

One potential funder is Viridor (Landfill Communities Fund), and they are particularly interested to see letters from people in the local community giving their views on the project proposal so if you have any opinions you would like to share please send them to carole.coppin@hotmail.co.uk





Hello everyone

We are nearly into February, and if you were in any doubt that Christmas is passed, it is officially over from 2^{nd} February, a festival day we call Candlemas in the

Church. So, if any of you have left decorations up, then this is the last (official) time to bring them down! At Candlemas we remember Jesus being presented in the temple and being recognised as the light to all people. Traditionally candles for the year ahead used to be blessed for church use, and for the people of the parish, probably electricity has seen that tradition out.

Candlemas is also recognised in folklore tradition as a good day to foretell the weather, possibly because it falls halfway between the winter and spring equinox. An old English rhyme goes, 'If Candlemas Day be fair and bright, Winter will have another flight; But if it be dark with clouds and rain, Winter is gone, and will not come again.' I shall see if this old rhyme has any value this year!

And of course, we have St Valentine's day on February 14th. There are many tales to tell of St Valentine, which makes it hard to substantiate any of them, but the theme of him encouraging Godly love between people runs through them all. One story tells that the priest Valentine, was martyred for continuing to marry soldiers to their sweethearts against the emperor's wishes; the emperor thought married men made poor soldiers. The evening before he was martyred Valentine sent a note to the jailer's daughter, who he had fallen in love with, signed 'your Valentine'.

So February may still be in the winter months but we have much to keep us occupied, with blessing our candles, recognising Jesus as the light for all people; watching out for the weather turning (either way!) and to be aware of the great blessing of love we have from God and sharing it with others.

The type of help that can be provided are services such as new boilers, repairs to boilers, loft or cavity wall insulation, access to a local and trustworthy repairs service and general advice on how to stay safe, well and affordably warm in your home.

HAPPY VALENTINES DAY.....

 The earliest surviving Valentine was written by a prisoner in the Tower of London



In 1415 the French Duke of Orleans was imprisoned in the Tower of London having been captured at the Battle of Agincourt. In a letter to his wife he wrote, "Je suis desja d'amour tanné, Ma tres doulce Valentinée..." This translates as "I am already sick of love, my very gentle Valentine..."

- 2. Victorians used to send each other 'Vinegar Valentines'
 Sending Valentine's Day cards anonymously became popular in the Victorian era, but there was a dark side to the tradition. Just as people used to send romantic (and often racy) messages to their loved ones, they would send rude or insulting cards to anyone they didn't like.
- 3. In Japan, only women buy gifts on Valentine's Day
 This is because of a translation error made by a chocolate company in 1936, when Valentine's Day was
 first introduced to Japan. Only women give gifts on Valentine's Day.
 It's traditional for single women to reveal who they fancy on Valentine's Day by giving them a small
 chocolate gift.
- 4. The saying 'wear your heart on your sleeve' comes from an old Valentine's Day tradition
 In the Middle Ages schoolboys would draw the names of girls out of a hat, to find out who would be their Valentine. They'd wear the name pinned on their sleeve for the rest of the week.
- 5. In the UK, people celebrating Valentine's Day spend on average £28.45 each.
 In the USA it's significantly higher, with the average person spending \$221.34 (around £172) for the occasion.

DEDDINGTON BOOKWORMS MONTHLY BOOK REVIEW

The latest books read by Bookworms have been quite different but both enjoyable their own ways.

Kate Atkinson's 'Case Histories' is set in Cambridge; it opens with three separate case histories. Olivia, three years old, disappears from the tent in the garden where she is sleeping with one of her sisters, in the early hours of a hot, summer's morning. Laura, an eighteen year old student is murdered at her solicitor father's office and a struggling mother loses her temper with her husband and reaches for an axe.

Some years later, Jackson Brodie, an ex-policeman turned private detective, becomes involved with the three cases and gradually begins to work out what happened. He is not without his own family tragedies which adds a poignancy to the cases being investigated. There is sadness and grief but also moments of humour as the book progresses through twists and turns as well as sub-plots to its ending. The group found this a compelling read and those who had not read Kate Atkinson before certainly felt they would like to read more of her work.

'Move Along, Please' takes us on a journey with Mark Mason from Land's End to John O'Groats by local bus. Taking 11 days to travel through the middle of England and Scotland, covering 1100 miles and travelling on forty-six *buses* the author tells us the facts and myths of the countryside he travels through. Although generally accepted as an entertaining read some Bookworms found the multitude of facts (both in the text and footnotes) a bit too much. Spending most of his journey time listening to, rather than taking part in, conversations the author picks up on the differences, not only between England and Scotland but between counties and even towns, in a humorous way. Worth a read if you like travel and buses!

QUICK WINTER VEGETABLE AND LENTIL SOUP



Ingredients:

- 85g dried red lentils
- 2 carrots, diced
- 3 sticks celery, sliced
- 2 small leeks, sliced
- 2 tbsp tomato puree
- 1 tbsp fresh thyme leaves
- 3 large garlic cloves, chopped
- 1 tbsp vegetable bouillon powder
- 1 heaped tsp ground coriander
- 1. Put red lentils, carrots, celery and leeks into a large pan. Add tomato puree, thyme, garlic, bouillon power and coriander
- 2. Pour over 1½ litres boiling water and stir well. Cover and leave to simmer for 30 mins until vegetables and lentils are tender
- 3. Blitz approximately 1/3 of the soup to thicken slightly, bring back to heat then serve with crusty bread

FROM DEDDINGTON FIRE STATION

For December, the station was relatively quiet,

receiving only 10 call outs divisible as follows: 5 fires, 2 road traffic collisions (RTC) and 3 standbys at other stations.

A variety of fires were dealt with including 2 car fires, a caravan fire, a retail unit in Banbury; and our second chimney fire of the year – quick thinking by the owner saw him douse the fire grate with water allowing a cloud of steam to rise up the chimney and cool the burning soot. Upon arrival, firefighters were able to remove the hot embers and place them outside, utilise the thermal imaging camera to check the chimney breast and flue for any hot spots and then rod the chimney to remove the burning / smouldering soot. All home owners will be pleased to know that the first thing that is done before any soot comes down the chimney, is protective runners are placed from the front door to the fire and blankets are put down to protect carpets from dirty boots and black soot! 30 minutes later the chimney was safe and the fire out, with a promise from the owners to get their chimney swept ASAP.

Over the Christmas holiday period it is always difficult to balance giving as much cover as possible and spending time with your family – especially if a large chunk of them travel half - way round the world to see you! All give up extra time over the festive period, one result being the Boxing day call out to a RTC just outside of Brackley.

The call was 3 cars with a person trapped. Upon arrival, Brackley whole time were in attendance, together with both the Ambulance and Police services at the scene. The weather wasn't helping as it was tipping it down with rain. Unfortunately, of the 3 cars, the

convertible classic had come off worse (a lack of crumple zones and less regulations in the early 70s). The passenger was trapped inside with noticeable back and upper leg pain. As firefighters, passenger extraction was top priority. The Ambulance personnel were striving to make the passenger comfortable and stable to allow them to be extracted from the car. As it was a convertible, the roof was immediately folded down, rear seat squab removed and a spinal board was placed between the passenger and seat. The seats were non- adjustable buckets, so the rear of the seat trim was removed, the seat back cut with a mini hydraulic cutter whilst the passenger's back was being supported and the board gently lowered from vertical to nearly horizontal.

At this point, the passenger's care was handed over to the fire service to allow extraction from the vehicle. With a senior firefighter at the head end and directing the procedure, 4 other firefighters all worked together to gradually pull the passenger up onto the board, gently strap them to the board and remove them from the vehicle, out and over the boot and onto the waiting gurney. The spinal board was then removed and the casualty's care handed back to the Ambulance service.

It is always a priority for all rescues to be casualty -centred and for the casualty to be within the Ambulance and on the way to hospital as quickly as possible, the "golden hour" being key and achieved comfortably on this occasion. As soon as the casualty was being treated in the Ambulance, clear-up began; tools and debris away, recovery trucks in and road opened again.

Not the best Christmas for drivers and passengers involved, but every job a firefighter does truly makes a difference.
