#### PARISH COUNCIL NOTES

A meeting of the Parish Council took place at 7.30pm on 2<sup>nd</sup> October in Barford Village Hall and was attended by Cllrs Turner, Hobbs, Eden, Cox, Charman, Best, District Councillor Williams, County Cllr Fatemian, Mr Best, (Parish Clerk and Responsible Financial Officer) and two member of the public.

**Minutes of the last meeting:** It was **RESOLVED** that the minutes of the meeting held on 4<sup>th</sup> September 2019 were a true and accurate record (unanimous).

#### **Public Participation:**

Location of the spare Dog waste bin – Two parishioners attended the meeting to question whether an additional dog bin is required in Barford St Michael as there are already 4 bins. It was agreed to ask the owners of Mead Farm if they would like the spare bin to be installed at the end of Mead Road as the footpath between Mead Road and Mill Lane is used a lot by dog walkers. It will be stored for possible future use if it is not considered necessary at that location.

#### Report from County Councillor Arash Fatemian:

Blue Badges for Motorists – OCC has adopted the new criteria for badges

**Permits for road works** – OCC has introduced a new scheme for contractors carrying out road works. This will provide greater control.

**Climate Emergency** – OCC has acknowledged that there is a climate emergency and is developing a response.

#### Report from District Councillor Bryn Williams:

**Horton General Hospital -** The Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG) has published its papers concerning the review of obstetric maternity services at the Horton General Hospital. This does not affect A&E or other services at the Horton.

Sadly, the recommendation to the board is that the current situation – a Midwife Led Unit (MLU) and obstetric provision only at the John Radcliffe site – should become permanent. The board are meeting to consider this recommendation on Thursday 26 September, and it is feared they are likely to accept it. The Horton HOSC will be meeting on Thursday evening (19 September) at 6.15pm in Banbury Town Hall. This will be well attended.

Our MP, Victoria Prentis has spoken to Matt Hancock, the Health Minister to convey the district's disappointment and frustration at their decision, she is proposing to apply for a proportion of the Health Infrastructure Plan funds to enable the Horton to develop a plan for a new and/or improved facility, which could, in future possibly be used for maternity.

Joint Working with OCC - The continuation of our separation with SNDC and the transition to joint working with OCC continues on schedule with a full separation from SNDC still scheduled for the summer of 2020 and 'Joint Working' with OCC in place by the same stage.

**Duns Tew Conservation Area –** Re Appraisal - The Duns Tew Conservation Area re-Appraisal consultation was launched on 09/09/19. The document is available on the CDC website, CDC offices in Bodicote and at the Banbury Library, there is a public exhibition on Monday 16th September at CDC's Bodicote House which the public are most welcome to attend.

**Planning Overview** - Each month as part of the joint performance, risk and finance Executive report there is a 'spotlight on' section which focuses on a theme or service provided by the Council, highlighting how this contributes to the delivery of the strategic priorities and the key achievements delivered to date. A quarterly pack of the service in focus section for both district and parish council's perusal will be produced. This month focuses on the Planning Service provided by CDC, always a popular if not controversial topic within the district.

#### Parish Matters:

**Woodland Trust tree planting campaign** – The Woodland Trust is urging volunteers to support the campaign to stop the climate emergency. Local groups are being encouraged to run tree planting events, businesses are being urged to plant trees on their own premises and people without gardens or the means to plant their own trees are being encouraged to spot potential sites and ask the landowner for permission to plant. The Parish Council will be planting trees.

According to the Committee on Climate Change, the UK should have 1.5bn new trees by 2050 to meet the net zero carbon target. The Department for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs has said "Working with the Woodland Trust and other organisations, we want to encourage everyone to play a part and help us plant more trees. The creation of a Northern Forest with 50m trees has commenced and two funds worth £60m have been set up. A new English Tree Strategy consultation will focus on how to accelerate woodland creation across the country." **Reinforcement of the Village Green** – Cllr Charman confirmed that he can borrow a digger to carry out this work and the clerk will contact the parishioner who has offered to source the material required.

**Moss removal in Robins Close** – Herbicide was applied to the kerbs in Robins Close, Broad Close, Bishops Close, the paths from Lower Street and Horn Hill to West Close, the steps to West Close and vehicle access to West close on 2<sup>nd</sup> September and to the pavement in Robins Close on 2<sup>nd</sup> October..

**Fibre To The Premise (FTTP) Broadband in Barford St John** – The infrastructure was completed on 19<sup>th</sup> September and the clerk has delivered a letter to all the residents confirming this together with details of how to order FTTP.

**Grass Cutting Contract** – Thomas Fox has completed all the contractual cut but has asked if we would like any additional cuts which they could provisionally complete on 11<sup>th</sup> October and 25<sup>th</sup> October. It was agreed to decide in mid-October if the grass requires another cut **Footpath sign for The Rock** – This has been ordered but has not arrived yet.

**Footpath clearing** –Beth Rutterford, OCC Footpaths Officer, has confirmed that OCC will clear the path through the woods on the footpath between Barford St John and Mill Lane. She has also confirmed that the two farmers who did not clear the crops on footpaths will receive letters reminding them of their obligation to clear them.

**Overgrown Bushes & Trees on Murreys Lane** – Oxfordshire County Council has confirmed that they have scheduled the work to clear Murreys Lane.

**Tree obstructing the gateway on the hill out of Barford St John** – A quote has been accepted from a tree surgeon to trim the lower branches. This work should be completed within 4 weeks.

**Oak Tree on the corner of Lower Street and Bloxham Road** – A quote has been accepted from a tree surgeon to cut the lower branches which are overhanging and obstructing Lower Street

**Recycling Leaflets** – These were distributed with the last edition of the Barford News.

Hedge encroaching the footpath between Horn Hill and West Close – This has been pruned by the owners of the land running along the path. Hedge overhanging Bloxham Road from Lower Street to the bridge – This has been reported to OCC Highways.

**Lower Street sign** - a replacement sign has been ordered from CDC.

**CDC Community Grant for West Close Playing-field** – CDC has requested completion of a form with details and photographs of the playground to confirm completion of the project. This is in process of completion.

Pavement between Barford St John and Barford St Michael – There are some raised parts of the concrete blocks making it difficult to walk at night when there is little light. This will be reported to OCC Highways.

Stream along road between Barford St John and Barford St Michael – The stream and ditch is becoming overgrown. District Cllr Williams will report this to the Environment Agency.

Allotment rents – These have been collected by Jeff Elliot and total £310.00.

**Untended allotments** – It was agreed that the overgrown allotments will be trimmed with a flail topper.

#### Planning:

19/01900/TCA – The Nook, The Green, Barford St Michael – Fell two trees – On circulation.

#### Finance:

**Payments** - The Clerk sought approval for payments totalling £1,383.75. This was proposed by Cllr Turner and seconded by Cllr Eden. The  $2^{nd}$  Precept instalment of £4,500 was received on  $13^{th}$  September and £5,000 was transferred from the current account to the deposit account. The total cash in the bank after the October payments is be £9,935.56.

**External Auditor's Report** – This was received on 24<sup>th</sup> September and confirmed that "Sections 1 and 2 of the Annual Governance and Accountability Return is in accordance with the Proper Practices and no other matters have come to our attention giving cause that relevant legislation and regulatory requirements have not been met"

#### Next Meeting:

The next Parish Council Meeting will be held on Wednesday 6<sup>th</sup> November at 7.30pm in the Village Hall.

Joyce worked wherever they went, most recently working at Bibbys of Twyford Seeds, where she became great friends with Dot Hardy and then at Karchers in Banbury.

Joyce was a real sun-worshipper and nude sunbathing in her garden continued into later life. - Calling in on a sunny day would often find her leaping from the sunbed in search of cover! Joyce was a party girl and loved dancing. Often 'jiving and jumping about', with



her old friend Dot Hardy which covered everything from ballroom to Line Dancing, not always with great success!

#### BARFORD GREEN GARDEN CLUB NOTES FROM OUR POTTING SHED NOVEMBER 2019

REMEMBER....Monday November 4th at 7.0pm AUTUMN PLANT and TOOL SWAP organised by Trevor . "I am planning a new event for the Garden Club on the lines of the Spring Plant Swap. This time we will include plants, cuttings, tools and equipment, gardening books and magazines. Everyone must have something at the back of the shed that we don't use but do not want to throw away. Newcomers to gardening might be looking for something to use. I would also like to see a fresh lot of seeds for swapping. This evening will be another chance for a social evening and please everyone is welcome, members can bring friends who might like to join the Garden Club. We look forward to seeing you there."

VISITS... Janet Morris organised this visit and this is her report...'On Wednesday September 18th, eleven members visited Avondale Nursery near Coventry. Although it was near the end of the season and there were not so many plants as usual for sale, we were assured that the polytunnels were full of young plants growing ready for next year. We had a most informative introduction from Brian who showed us an amazing display of Asters and also Sanguisorbas, really interesting tall plants which don't need staking; he has the National collection of both these. Brian was so enthusiastic and answered lots of questions as we walked around the trial gardens. Most of us came away with some purchases, very reasonably priced! There are two other nurseries on the same site and it would have been nice to go earlier in the day to spend time in them as well. Worth another visit in the Spring, I feel.'

Jobs for November Winter is on its way. Leaves are falling rapidly, and wind and rain are on the increase. Tender plants will need protecting from frost, gales and freezing rains. Move plants into the greenhouse, or into a sheltered spot, but if you can't, it is worth wrapping plants or pots. Remember winter can be a tough time for birds in terms of water and food, so keep supplies well topped up: Clear up fallen leaves - especially from lawns, ponds and beds: Raise containers onto pot feet to prevent waterlogging: Plant tulip bulbs for a spring display next year: Prune roses to prevent wind-rock: Plant out winter bedding: Cover brassicas with netting if pigeons are a problem: Insulate outdoor containers from frost - bubblewrap works well: Stop winter moth damage to fruit trees using grease bands around the trunks: Put out bird food to encourage winter birds into the garden: Use a seasonal bonfire - where this is allowed - to dispose of excess debris unfit for composting: Help the wildlife in your garden: Lawn maintenance.....Grass will continue to grow in temperatures above 5°C (41°F), so if the weather remains mild it may be necessary to trim the lawn with a mower. Ensure the cut is 3-5mm higher than in summer to prevent turf stress. On average, this means a cutting height of around 4cm (1.5in). Mowing will help to deal with any annual weeds that have sprung up in new lawns sown earlier in the autumn. More can be found each month on the RHS website. KEEP WARM, Happy Gardening!

#### **DOWN ON THE FARM**

At the time of writing persistent rain has held up all field work. Some hedge cutting has been done but the rest may have to wait for another autumn.

Hedge cutting is an autumn routine on most farms; it leaves no profit in the monetary sense but it preserves the scenic look of our landscape and provides vital wildlife shelter, food and corridors to adjacent copses and woodland for wildlife.

According to 'Hedgelink', a facility funded by Natural England and designed to encourage good hedge management, there are some 250,000 miles of managed hedgerows in England which act as host to over 21 species of birds. Many, however, according to Hedgelink are either over managed or neglected.

Over management usually means that the hedge has been cut at the same height for so long that gaps have appeared and stems have become gnarled and twisted. The remedy is to trim them at a greater height to encourage fresh growth and remove stress. Neglected hedges on the other hand will have grown so tall that their shrub layer is lost and they are in danger of collapse.

Traditionally hedges formed the boundary to enclosures and also, before the days of barbed wire and stock netting provided a stock proof field boundary and shelter for livestock. Nowadays these attributes count for little, especially on arable farms where hedge cutting is simply a routine job to keep the growth in check.

A few years ago we hired an excavator fitted with an attachment that grips a sapling and then snips it off. The 'hedge' in question had become nothing more than a line of trees and the effect in reducing these to hedge height was quite remarkable. Three years later it has bushed out and looks respectable once again. An alternative with badly overgrown hedges is to coppice them (cut them down to ground level), replant any gaps and then wait for regrowth. In three years or so the hedge will be rejuvenated and due for annual maintenance.

The popular belief is that hedgerows are a comparatively recent addition to our countryside following the Enclosure Acts of the early 19<sup>th</sup> century. But in fact half our hedges are a lot older than this. Some hedges in Devon, for instance, are thought to be more than 800 year old – older than many parish churches!

There is no doubting that our hedges are a part of our cultural and landscape heritage and, as such, well worth preserving. Without them we would be faced with a featureless landscape such as one sees in some areas of East Anglia. They also have a role to play in preserving wildlife, reducing pollution, preventing soil loss and reducing flooding. They may also play a part in absorbing greenhouse gasses through carbon storage.

So, while hedge management may be a seemingly profitless annual chore for the farmer its value is, for many reasons, beyond dispute.

I would like to make the following clear concerning the above:

In December 2018 the Parish Council again asked for comments, none were received. In May 2019 the stage was removed almost a year after the initial notification and no further comments were received. The cost of hiring the stage for music night (£10) was simply what it cost VHMC to hire it from Deddington. No charge was made for collection, installation and return of the equipment, all carried out by volunteers.



#### DEDDINGTON BOOKWORMS MONTHLY BOOK REVIEW

This month the read was a Costa Award winner but the group, overall, were less than impressed. Reservoir 13 by Jon McGregor revolves around a missing teenage girl and the passage of time in a small rural village. The initial effect of the disappearance on the community is described well and over the 13 years of the book the descriptions of life continuing goes on using the seasons and the minutiae of village life. The style of writing is very different and adds to repetitiveness of life and how mundane detail can be. If you enjoy an exciting page turner this book isn't for you but if you look for interesting prose, then give it a go. It might frustrate to the end, but it does remain with you as a text to make you think about life.

Santa will be in his grotto for the children from 11-1pm and 2-4pm.



## VILLAGE 200+ CLUB

The 200+ club is a fundraising scheme which supports the village hall.

Tickets are bought annually and members may hold as many tickets as they wish. For the last 20 years tickets have been £6 each. Because of the rising costs of hall maintenance we need to raise more funds and so we have decided to raise the cost of a ticket to £8. Half of the total value of subscriptions is retained for hall maintenance; the remaining 50% is paid out in monthly prizes. Increasing the subscription price means we collect more money for the hall but also means we will be paying out more in prizes.

In future, assuming we sell at least 200 tickets, there will be 12 monthly draws with prizes of £5,  $\pm 10$  and  $\pm 15$ . In addition there will be a  $\pm 25$  prize every other month and a  $\pm 50$  prize every quarter. At Christmas there will be a bonus prize of  $\pm 100$ . More members mean increased prize money and more money to keep the hall running;  $\pm 8$  for each annual subscription is such a small price to pay towards supporting our lovely hall. So if you are not already a member of the 200+ club then please join. For just under 70p a month you can make a difference.

## WW2 VETERANS' PORTRAITS ON DISPLAY AT SOLDIERS OF OXFORDSHIRE MUSEUM

A new exhibition of photographic portraits of WW2 veterans is set to go on display at the Soldiers of Oxfordshire Museum, Woodstock, from 19<sup>th</sup> October 2019 to 5<sup>th</sup> January 2020. The exhibition, titled *3945 Portraits,* is the work of award-winning photographer Glyn Dewis. He is leading an ongoing project to photograph Second World War veterans from all branches of the armed forces, and from a wide range of different regiments and corps, including the Oxfordshire and Buckinghamshire Light Infantry.

The portraits will go on display alongside recorded interviews with the featured veterans, recounting their wartime experiences, as well as a number of drawings produced by children as a 'thank you' to them.

The project, and the exhibition itself, is designed to 'remember, honour and educate'. Glyn Dewis explains that he intends to 'honour and remember our surviving World War 2 veterans by photographing as many of them as possible in order to provide both them and their families with classic, timeless portraits they treasure and can remain in their families for generations to come' and 'to sensitively educate the current and future younger generations about the events of World War 2 and of those who served, survived and were lost'. The exhibition's opening event on 19<sup>th</sup> October 2019 will see a number of the featured veterans visit the museum, and a surprise medal presentation for one of them. Two members of the Glider Pilot Regiment who were good friends during their service but have not seen each other since the end of the war, are also set to reunite during the launch, having both had their portraits taken by Glyn. Glyn will also be running two 3945 Portraits project workshops on the 9<sup>th</sup> November and 7<sup>th</sup> December between 11am and 2pm. These will focus on demonstrating how the portraits were taken using minimal kit and often in very limited space, showing how we can all create classic portraits without the need for all the latest and greatest equipment. Spaces can be booked on the SOFO Museum website.

The Soldiers of Oxfordshire Museum is open from Tuesday-Friday 10am-5pm, Saturday 11am-5pm and Sunday 2pm-5pm. The county's only military history museum is located in the grounds of the Oxfordshire Museum, Park Street, Woodstock.

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


