Reading recommendations from **BARFORD BOOKCHAT**



The Lost Pianos of Siberia by Sophy Roberts is an extraordinary epic. Travel journalist Roberts is commissioned to find a suitable piano for a Mongolian virtuoso of Siberian descent, prompting a quixotic adventure to the furthest reaches of Siberia. There she encounters survivors of brutal Russian history from the Romanovs to obscure Jewish cliques, and takes a ship alongside "birders with whom I had nothing in common other than the desire to find a rarity".


The musical issues are less detailed than the struggles of bleakly impoverished citizens to survive. Roberts cites each piano's serial number as if this were sufficient summary

of the mouldering grand or upright she encounters. As extraordinary as the journey is the determination of Russia's leaders from the seventeenth century onward to civilise or distract the far-flung population by ensuring their access to live classical music, shipping instruments thousands of miles across frozen wastes via some of the least developed roads in the world. *Trevor Arrowsmith*



Endurance: SAS Soldier. Polar Adventurer. Decorated Leader, by Louis Rudd. In this gripping account, Louis reveals how a thirst for adventure saw him join the Royal Marines at sixteen and then pass the notoriously arduous SAS selection course at only twenty-two. Having served on various dangerous covert operations around the world, he goes on to describe his first gruelling polar expedition with legendary explorer Lieutenant Colonel Henry Worsley in 2011 and the leadership challenges he faced a few years later when he led a team of Army Reservists across Antarctica. Finally, in 2018, Louis then takes us with him step by painful step as he pushes himself beyond

endurance, travelling alone on his death-defying, unsupported 925 miles trek across the southern continent's treacherous ice fields and mountains. With an edge-of-the-seat narrative, *Endurance* offers the armchair reader a unique insight into what drives such an inspirational and courageous man. *Paul Freeman*



The Child that Books Built by Francis Spufford is part memoir, part scholarly exploration of genres, conventions and psychological development of children, tracing the author's love of fiction from early childhood to adulthood. I wrote about his latest novel, **Light Perpetual**, recently, and his writing is just as vivacious here – often very funny, for instance when he writes about his virtual theft of books from under booksellers' noses by the simple act of reading and ingesting. His account is tinged with sadness as he writes about the serious illness and expected death of his younger sister, and how he sought escape in fiction, seeking degrees of familiarity or strangeness

depending on his needs at various ages. As you read, you will doubtless be reminded of some of your own childhood reading passions. *Linda Newbery*



The Moon is Down: John Steinbeck wrote with incredible clarity and humanity, as can be seen in the beautiful letter he sent his lovestruck teenage son Thom. He used these rare gifts to immensely powerful effect in **The Moon Is Down**, published in 1942, and for which he was later garlanded by the King of Norway.

One unnamed country is overwhelmed and taken over by another. We are taken to a town where the mayor appears compliant and the people largely lacklustre. But all is not what it seems. Extraordinarily subtle for a piece of propaganda, its message is

utterly persuasive: ultimately, totalitarianism can never win. *Tom Greeves*

WILD FLOWERS IN THE BARFORDS

By Margaret Murdin & Janet Payne White Dead Nettle: Lamium album



This usually appears on roadsides, waste land and, possibly, as a weed in your garden. Flowering time is recorded as from April to autumn but you can in fact find it flowering at any time. It is called dead nettle because the leaves have a nettle—like look, but it doesn't sting. The leaves do smell quite strongly: dryish and pungent. Insects and children in the know find sweet nectar in the base of the flowers. Dead nettles provide abundant nectar for both early and late bumble bee. Honey bees rarely visit the flower however because its shape make it difficult for them to get into.

Flower arrangers have recently seemed to have seen the possibilities of the flowers, while stripping off the coarser leaves to display them better. There is a variegated version (lamium galeobdolon), probably escaped from a garden, with yellow flowers in spring. This has established a flourishing colony under real nettles at the bottom of Murreys Lane.

As a herb white dead nettle was used across Europe for gynaecological and obstetric problems. The flowers are still dried to make a herb tea.

Originating in Hispanic countries to celebrate the nativity story, Posada is a period of time during Advent when figures from the nativity story travel around different households in the community and stay there for a short period.

Families can sign up to take part and then become Innkeepers for the holy family for two days during Advent. Throughout this time, children have an opportunity to learn more about the Christmas story and everyone can meet others from their community as the figures are passed from one house to the next.

As Mary and Joseph travel around the parish throughout Advent, they leave a lamb at every house they stay in. The families bring the lamb to church on Christmas Eve and place them in the stable during the crib service.

The figures travel around in a box with a copy of the Christmas story, a flock of 24 lambs, contact details of the next 'innkeeper', instructions, and an invitation, which gives all the details of the Crib service. Every household taking part will receive a copy of the Christmas story.

We're Dreaming of a Green Christmas ...

Christmas can be a time of **tremendous waste** ... and this year of all years, following **COP26**, we're all keenly aware that the last thing the planet needs is food thrown away, plastics dumped into landfill and objects discarded unused. But we can still have a happy and festive Christmas without feeling guilty! Here are some ways to make your Christmas as green as possible.

Buy ethical: choose products that are organic, fair trade, sustainable and plastic-free. Buy from companies that pay their employees a living wage. Look for the **Leaping Bunny** symbol on cosmetics and toiletries to be sure they're cruelty-free.

Buy local: support local businesses and craftspeople (for instance at our village market!) – then your money benefits the local economy, not the huge chains.

Make or grow gifts: a pot planted with spring bulbs; a cake or biscuits; jam and chutneys; a freezer meal for someone who lives alone; a knitted hat, scarf or sweater.

Buy second-hand: search charity shops, E-bay and antique markets for unique gifts.

Avoid cheap novelty gifts: these so often end up in landfill!

If you have an **artificial tree**, keep using it. Make your own decorations instead of buying new. Avoid tinsel, which is made of plastic. Use natural greenery instead of plastic garlands – ivy, leylandii and bay as well as holly.

Give experiences instead of things: tickets to a film or concert, a day out, a course, membership of for instance the RSPB, National Trust or the Wildlife Trusts.

Buy less! Do Secret Santa for grown-ups in the family or for work – or agree to donate to charities instead of buying presents.

Find gifts that give twice: support organisations like **Good Gifts, Oxfam** or **Choose Love** by ordering tools, seeds, equipment or clothes for people struggling to survive.

Be inventive with gift-wrap! Avoid glittery or foil wrap which can't be recycled. Reuse what you already have – gift-bags, tins and boxes, plain paper from deliveries, odd bits of fabric, old newspapers and maps. Plain paper can be decorated with stamped or freehand designs, and tied with coloured string or ribbon. Or make the wrap part of the gift: a tea-towel or scarf – this is the Japanese tradition of Furoshiki.

Eat kindly: Instead of the traditional turkey or goose and pigs in blankets, try a festive plant-based Christmas dinner - cruelty-free as well as reducing carbon emissions. Great recipes can be found at **bbcgoodfood.com**, at **jamieoliver.com** and in many other places online.

Eat without waste: there's a limit to how much we can eat, even at Christmas! Make a plan and a list, and don't be tempted to buy more. Plan to use leftovers promptly or freeze them for future meals.

Make a promise as a gift: to help someone with gardening or walking their dog. Re-use Christmas cards by cutting them up to use as gift tags next year.

EVENTS. Our first 'live' event for a while was a talk by Andrew Howard of Heritage Fruit Trees, on Monday 8th November at 7.30, entitled "Apples /fruit through the year". Andrew is a very animated speaker and he gave us so much information about apples.... types, skin thickness, smell, storing, pruning and choosing varieties. He has advised Prue Leith on her new fruit orchard, near Chipping Norton (on Channel 5) and is shortly going to FarmEd, outside Chipping Norton on the Shipton-under-Wychwood road, to give some talks about planting orchards. Unfortunately due to Covid restrictions there was no tasting but lots of different apples to look at. We had lovely apple cakes and hot drinks.
