# A brief history of Barford News.....

You may not know just how long your Barford News has been around so we thought we would give you a brief history...and of course a photo of some of the best looking members of the team.

Barford News was published as a quarterly publication from 1978 until April 1994.

After a gap of 7 months, Bernard took up the challenge in December 1994 and began to publish monthly assisted by Bill Spence. Mariann joined the team in March 1998 and was Deputy Editor until January 2000. When Bernard retired as Editor, Mariann took over as sole Editor with Judy Mason as Treasurer. Caroline Bird took over as Treasurer in July 2004 and, along with Mariann, continued until December 2016 when Lucy Norman became Editor with Mariann as Deputy Editor and Caroline continuing as Treasurer.

#### How Green is your Money?



Where you choose to bank or invest might not be the first thing you think of when considering ways to live sustainably – but it's an area where your choices can make a big impact. According to **Ethical Consumer**, "getting your banking right is one of the most important ethical consumer choices we can make". They conduct surveys every two years, and the information here is from their latest; as well as banks, they look at savings accounts, pension schemes and mortgages. All companies are ranked on a range of factors including environmental impact, tax avoidance, ethical investment, human rights and animal cruelty.

Where does your bank sit in the rankings? Questions to consider:

- is it lending ethically? What are its lending policies?
- does it pay its fair share of tax? Many banks operate in tax havens.
- is it funding Amazon rainforest destruction? for instance by funding beef companies linked to deforestation.
- is it financing climate change? Many banks are still financing expansion into new oil and gas projects.
- is it funding the arms trade? Many of the big banks fund nuclear weapons projects and some fund arms companies exporting to countries with harsh regimes.

There's space here only to give some of the results in brief, but you can find much more information, complete rankings and breakdowns into the different areas at **Ethical Consumer**: <a href="www.ethicalconsumer.org">www.ethicalconsumer.org</a>. There will be more about ethical investment in the next issue.

BEST rankings for banks go to Triodos, Co-Op Bank (Smile), Nationwide and Cumberland Building Society

WORST rankings are given to J P Morgan Chase, Barclays, First Direct and HSBC. Green

#### READING RECOMMENDATIONS



**Berlin Noir** by Philip Kerr. For lovers of Dashiell Hammett and Raymond Chandler, Kerr takes us to the streets of 1930s Berlin and post war Vienna, and introduces an antidote to Poirot in the character of ex-cop Bernie Gunther. We are thrown at once into the evils of the Nazi regime and introduced to many of its monsters as Bernie, specialising in finding missing persons for often the shadiest of clients, explains just how easy it is for people to disappear. In **March Violets**, the first section of this omnibus edition, we meet Gunther as he solves one questionable commission before he becomes involved (in **The Pale Criminal**) in searching for a ruthless killer against a backdrop of rabid violent antisemitism. Finally in **German Requiem** he sets the scene in an intricate plot for the mystery surrounding the disappearance of a major war


criminal. Christopher Murray



**Mothering Sunday** by Graham Swift: The sub-title, *A Romance*, could in reality be *Life and Death*. The third-person narrative of Jay (Jane), young maid of a well-to-do English family, is set mainly in 1924. On Mothering Sunday, when traditionally staff are granted time off to see their mothers, Jay, an orphan, has no mother to visit. She cycles to a nearby country home to sleep with the son who's told parents and fiancée he will join their lunch party after 'mugging up' for his law studies.

We move forward through Jay's life and her journey to becoming an author. She is an observer, her experiences coloured by the wartime deaths of her employers' two sons, who she never


met. We feel the pall of their absence and see the effect on the family, intensified by the tradition of a lunch party on Mothering Sunday. Swift is known for his transparent prose which in this novella conveys the inner lives of the characters through understatement. *Trevor Arrowsmith* 



**Emergency State** by Adam Wagner starts with the stark instruction given by Boris Johnson on 23 March 2020 that "From this evening I must give the British people a very simple instruction - you must stay at home". This was not accompanied by rules; they only appeared later. Parliament became a 1400-person rubber stamp.

Adam Wagner is a well-known human rights lawyer and his book is a scathing attack on the way the Emergency State operated during Covid. And it was not particularly successful as Britain's measures were well down the international scale. Police could give fixed penalty notices for breach and they gave 118,978 of them including famously one each to Johnson (why only one?)

and Sunak. Police had only to establish that they "reasonably believed a person had committed offence under regulations". This granted them huge power without supervision by the courts. Wagner reveals that a hobby he acquired during lockdown was stopping police on the beat to ask what they thought the rules were, and often they did not know. *John Bowers* 



A Whole Life by Robert Seethaler is just that: the story of one man's life, from his arrival in a village in the Austrian Alps at the age of four to live with an abusive uncle, to his death seventy-five years later. A loner by nature, Egger briefly and tragically experiences love, lives in the mountains, works in a variety of manual labour jobs in the open air, and learns how to live his life to the best of his ability. He respects the natural world and thrives in it. Yet when progress makes its inevitable way to the region, he doesn't shrink from it but becomes a part of it. He continues to respect nature, while realising the need for progress. In old age, he looks back on his past not with nostalgia or regret or anger, but with a quiet contemplation. Simply lovely. *Ishbel Freeman*

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
