
Anne Hangs Up Her Pinny

Reading recommendations from BARFORD BOOKCHAT



In his new book **Among the Mosques** Ed Husain takes a journey across Muslim Britain in all its variety. This book takes further Ed's personal journey as revealed in his excellent book *The Islamist*.

He journeys to Dewsbury, Manchester, Blackburn, Bradford, Birmingham, Cardiff, Belfast, Edinburgh, Glasgow and London. He speaks mainly to members of the Muslim communities but also to the white communities who in some cases resent and in others support the Muslim communities in their midst. Some of what he reports is deeply troubling, for example the extreme literature available in Northern towns which is not even sold in Saudi Arabia. He paints a picture of some communities more involved in Middle East politics than

in their local communities. He covers in detail Sharia courts and unregulated marriages. Clearly multiculturalism is to be welcomed but there are certain trends which should worry us. *John Bowers*



The Fortnight in September by R. C. Sherriff: Every year, faithfully, Mr and Mrs Stevens, their (grown-up) children Mary and Dick, and little Ernie, take their meticulously orchestrated holiday by the sea at Bognor, staying in the same increasingly shabby boarding house, reprising the same simple pleasures and rituals. It is 1931, and already there is a growing sense that this much-anticipated idyll is inexorably coming to an end, the shadows lengthening. The family's very ordinariness, the modesty of their aspirations, their hopes and fears, could have been made to seem faintly comic and pitiable. Instead, every passing day is a revelation of kindness, family love, loyalty, decency, and the richness of small joys - as warm and gentle as the late-summer sun. Jenny Greeves





The Mission House, by Carys Davies: Hilary Byrd, a disillusioned middle-aged librarian from Petts Wood, travels to India searching for meaning and perhaps to reinvent himself. He ends up in Ooty, a South Indian hill station, lodging with the local padre and his adopted daughter Priscilla. But nothing is quite what it seems and the novel covers so much, but in a wonderfully understated and spare style. Simmering post-colonial tension and religious divisions combine with agonies of misunderstood and differing versions of unrequited love. I particularly liked the observations of the locals on the continuing parade of western 'dogooders' who pitch up to briefly save the world, cuddle the orphans and then disappear forever. There are echoes of E. M. Forster and **A Passage to India** in both subject and style

but with a very modern twist. Carys Davies deservedly won plaudits for this work which is a real gem. **Suzanne Franks**

It's a lovely community event which raises



JOBS TO DO IN AND AROUND THE GARDEN.

Autumn has arrived and Winter is on its way. Leaves are falling rapidly, and wind and rain are on the increase. Tender plants will need protecting from frost, gales and freezing rains. Move plants into the greenhouse, or into a sheltered spot, but if you can't, it is worth wrapping plants or pots. Remember winter can be a tough time for birds in terms of water and food, so keep supplies well topped up. Plant out winter bedding: Insulate outdoor containers from frost - bubble wrap works well: Put out bird food to encourage winter birds into the garden: Use a seasonal bonfire - where this is allowed to dispose of excess debris unfit for composting, check for hedgehogs first! If anyone wishes to join the Garden Club, to get many discounts and when permitted, talks and visits, please get in touch. £5 per household per year is an amazing investment.

Reflections on Remembrance

If November has increasingly come to be seen as a month of remembrance, this year it is going to be especially poignant. The ongoing and seemingly relentless effects of the coronavirus pandemic casts a pall over all we do.



This year's All Saints and All Souls Days, let alone Remembrance Sunday, will hold in their midst an unquenched and unresolved grief that holds together both individual and communal stories. The nation grieves the loss of tens of thousands of lives, as well as – arguably – a set of assumptions about how to live well and safely. The 'new normal', as it is sometimes called, is yet to be established.

A feast like All Souls — which can entail simple rituals of candle lighting and a 'roll call' of names — has gained traction, perhaps precisely at a time when many people have struggled to find an authentic language for death. When we remember, we 'remember'. We bring back together. In a world where touch and social relations have been so carefully regulated, how we need All Souls this year.

However, we should not dismiss the transporting power of All Saints Day. Perhaps, this year some will be cautious about it for, in so many ways, it is a 'triumphal' day, when we, the Church, hold in praise and adoration all of our forebears who have been great witnesses to God's abiding love. I do understand that caution, joy, even in the midst of loss, matters, though. I shall still seek joy in the vision of the great cloud of witnesses who worship God in his very presence, interceding on our behalf.

WILD FLOWERS IN THE BARFORD - By Janet Payne Yarrow - Achillea Millefolium (milfoil, soldier wort)

This whitish greyish plant has many tiny flower heads on a stem with feathery, hairy leaflets. It grows in hot sunny spots around the village and many of us have cultivated versions in bright colours from yellow through pinks and rusts to purple. Its many flowers attract solitary bees particularly the wood carder bee. This bee lines its nest with the hairs gathered from the stems and leaves. The females gather these in the form of little wool like balls before flying off to nest build. Honey and bumblebees do visit yarrow flowers for the nectar which is high in glucose but it is mostly pollinated by hoverflies which mimic bees and wasps.

The name achillea comes from Achilles, the Greek hero of the Trojan War who supposedly used it to stop the bleeding of the wounds of his soldiers at the siege of Troy. Presumably it didn't work on his own wounded heel, which caused his death. It has been globally popular in folk medicine and myth for many centuries, as a healing herb and for divination. The Chinese used dried yarrow stalks to consult the I Ching, the Book of Changes, to foresee the future and choose the right actions to take. The Anglo Saxons also used it in their magic and for healing. More recently 'The Family Botanic Guide of 1907' suggests this:

'I have got a cold; I feel starved to death: I take a strong tea of yarrow and have a hot brick wrapped up in a vinegar cloth applied to the feet. A sweat is the result and the cold disappears."

How times have changed! Yarrow tea is still popular for various ailments but its benefits are most seen in the manufacture of cosmetics and shampoos today.

The story of Eva and Jim is told in triplicate, so the reader gets three different versions of their future - together and apart - from 1958 when they meet, up to the present day. With various twists and turns to the conclusion, the narrative is really all about the choices that are made and the different paths that their lives then follow. A very similar story line to the 1998 romantic comedy-drama Sliding Doors written and directed by Peter Howitt.

FRIENDS OF DAEDA'S WOOD A brief report from our AGM

Sadly, since the last AGM in 2019, Sylvie Nickels

who championed the planting of the Wood, has passed away. The Woodland Trust will be placing a plaque on the



gate near the Cosy Lane entrance very near to the silver birch tree planted to her memory by the Friends.

The Friends will stay convened as a group with a "watching brief" that's to say we will monitor the Wood and liaise with the Woodland Trust when necessary. Funds in the account will be used for necessary expenditure and possible purchase of a bench in the future.

There will no longer be a need for paying a subscription .

The present committee is happy to continue to serve. Occasional reports will be sent to the Deddington News and Barford News.

It was noted that much use of the Wood was made during the Lockdown periods last year and this year too. The Woodland Trust have ensured that the rides are kept free from encroaching undergrowth, the wildflower meadow has been strimmed and the wheelchair accessible path improved. The bat boxes had been in use last year although no monitoring was possible until this month when Reg Tipping's group recorded 16 natterers and adjusted the fastenings of some boxes where tree growth had caused fixings to cut into the bark. Their next visit will be in May 2022.

The Friends were pleased to note that visitors to the Wood have been respectful and considerate in clearing up dog litter and picnicking litter. It's a valuable community asset and this shows how much it's prized. The preparation by Alison Day of the digital updated Diary of the Wood continues and will be made available in due course.
