## WHY I SUPPORT LAWRENCE HOME NURSING BY DAVID BEST

Lawrence Home Nursing Team (LHNT) provided compassionate end of life support for my wife Sarah, enabling her to spend her last days at home surrounded by her family when the hospital said that there was nothing more they could do for her. Their wonderful support should be available to anyone who sadly needs it.

The NHS provided superb care for Sarah during the day with a team of District Nurses, but they do not provide support during the night if for example extra pain relief is required.

Guided by a patient's needs and wishes, the LHNT nurses work closely with GPs and community nurses to help manage symptoms and give each person the care that is right for them. And by helping people to relax and feel like themselves, the nurses make sure patients, and their families, get the most out of their last few moments together. The care is completely free and given whenever it's needed, whether for a few hours in the day or through the night.

LHNT look after anyone, 18 and over, who is in their last weeks of life. Patients are referred by GPs, community and specialist nurses, hospitals, hospices and sometimes family members.

LHNT receives less than 10% of its income from the government. The rest comes from donations which is why I have become a volunteer and fundraiser. I am competing in the 10-mile Great South Run in October to raise money for this fantastic charity.

I am a rower not a runner, but I have received advice on how to prepare for the event

from Chris Hall and Becky Hodgson at Hall Personal Training where I go for weights and cardio work. As well as providing expert and comprehensive training and nutritional advice, Hall Personal Training hold regular events through the year and has been described as "part gym part social club" – people join for the coaching but stay for the community. You meet regular faces during training and make friends. It helped to keep me sane when adjusting to life without Sarah.



Not so relaxed nearing the finish!






#### **READING RECOMMENDATIONS**



**The Lost Continent** by Bill Bryson: published as long ago as 1989, it is Bill Bryson's first and funniest book. Its opening line sets the scene - 'I come from Des Moines. Somebody had to.' Once old enough, he leaves and moves to England, staying away for 10 years until he returns for a road trip of 14,000 miles, reliving the family holiday trips of his youth, seeking a make-believe, Truman Story small town of Amalgam. In an often hilarious travelogue, he finds instead one horrific small identical town after another, each a main strip comprising gas station, hamburger joint and motel - which he renames Fartville, Dead Squaw, Coma, Doldrum, inhabited by overfed and ignorant "slow witted hicks with a partiality for synthetic fibres". His characters are sad but superb, an eye opener to those who find it difficult to understand American politics today, 30 years later. His continent is lost both to the myth of motherhood and apple pie - through greed, poverty, pollution, trailer trash and television - and to

Bryson himself as a foreigner in his own country. *Christopher Murray*

**Orphan Train** by Christina Baker Kline highlights the real-life story of the orphan trains that, between 1854 and 1929, carried thousands of orphaned, abandoned and destitute children from the East Coast to the Midwest. This story weaves between the present day and 1929 to 1943 as we hear the story of Molly and Vivian. 17 year old Molly arrives at Vivian's house to help sort through her attic, full of boxes that reveal different parts of her life. A friendship develops between the two and they find themselves bonding over the shared experience of losing parents and being forced into other families. The book mostly focuses on Vivian's tragic story, being forced onto the 'orphan train' to be viewed, judged and potentially picked by a new family. Her story is easy to lose yourself in and you quickly become very attached to the young Vivian. *Ishbel Freeman* 

**Code of Conduct: why we need to fix Parliament-and how to do it,** by Sir Chris Bryant. Few people (if any) are better qualified to review Parliament than one who has been ensconced in it since 2001, when Chris Bryant was first elected in the Rhondda. He recently stepped down from chairing the Commons Committees on Standards and Privileges to become a Shadow Minister in the Labour Culture Team. He generously handed over the chairmanship of the committee which found Boris Johnson responsible for misleading Parliament to Harriet Harman. In this wide-ranging book, he covers the turmoil of recent years in clinical detail, including the fastest churn of ministers in history and the large number of MPs suspended. He makes a strong case that politicians are more involved than ever before in cronyism, nepotism and conflicts of interest. The chapter headings, including "Something Rotten", "The Worst Lies in London" and "Conflict of Interest", tell their own story. He

looks at proposals for reform. This book concentrates on Parliament whilst a complementary book, written largely in Barford St Michael by yours truly, examines declining standards in government. It is called **Downward Spiral** and will be published in April. *John Bowers* 



**Maigret and the Dead Girl (Maigret et la jeune morte),** Georges Simenon. This late Maigret novel was released as a film in September, starring Gérard Depardieu as Chief Inspector Maigret. Despite its brevity, just 172 pages, this detective procedural is crafted with the lifetime skill and acerbic intellect which made Simenon a superstar in his day.

There is a Hemingway conciseness and simplicity to the prose, complemented by a minimum of description. This restraint adds weight to the physical details we are occasionally shown. Maigret is supported by his usual Paris detective intimates, but a new presence in the shuffling, depressed form of Inspector Logon adds interest and intrigue to the unravelling plot. Maigret remains his old, understated laconic self: a man who continually ruminates and obsesses over the smallest details of

the crime and the perpetrator's motivation. An elegant, classic murder mystery by a great Belgian writer. **Trevor Arrowsmith**


## ∧ DEDDINGTON BOOKWORMS



Published in 1957, our latest read has been **The Midwich Cuckoos** by **John Wyndham**.

The action begins when all the inhabitants of the small English village of Midwich suddenly fall unconscious. As they start to come round several hours later, they appear to be unaffected but gradually all women of child-bearing age in the village discover they are pregnant. They all give birth on the same day and their children all share the same appearance. The children develop unnaturally quickly, and they soon begin to exert a form of control over the villagers making it impossible for them to leave Midwich. But this is only the first signs of the controlling power they have, and between them their influence over Midwich slowly reveals itself to be a very definite threat.

We all enjoyed the book and found it to be quite thought-provoking in terms of humanity's place in the grand scheme of things.

## The Posada is coming to The Barfords!



Originating in Hispanic countries to celebrate the nativity story, Posada is a period during Advent when figures from the nativity story travel around different households in the community and stay there for a short period.

Families can sign up to take part and then become Innkeepers for the holy family for two days during Advent. Throughout this time, children have an opportunity to learn more about the Christmas story and everyone can meet others from their community as the figures are passed from one house to the next.

As Mary and Joseph travel around the parish throughout Advent, they leave a lamb at every house they stay in. The families bring the lamb to church on Christmas Eve and place them in the stable during the crib service.

The figures travel around in a box with a copy of the Christmas story, a flock of 24 lambs, contact details of the next 'innkeeper', instructions, and an invitation, which gives all the details of the Crib service. Every household taking part will receive a copy of the Christmas story.

It is up to the person or family who are collecting the figures to contact the family who had it before you –a full schedule of Mary and Joseph's journey will be sent out to participants.





with our festive fleet, raising over £97,000 so far for Katharine House Hospice. We are very excited to be holding the tractor run for the 8<sup>th</sup> time in 2023, with the convoy once again including Banbury Cross in their tour.

**The Route** Depart from Spring Hill Farm, Barford St. Michael at 5pm. Travel through South Newington, Milcombe and Bloxham, then A361 to Banbury, around Banbury Cross, then retracing their steps up South Bar on the A4260 to Adderbury. Turn left at traffic lights onto the B4100 {Aynho Road) passing KHH and on into Aynho, from here turning right to Clifton and Deddington (via marketplace) then on to Hempton and back through Barford St. Michael, returning to Spring Hill Farm. Approximate timings are shown on our website.

**Our Autumn Talk and Plant Swap** We had a great turnout for our latest event in October. 22 members and one guest enjoyed a thoroughly interesting evening listening to our speaker, Stuart Lowen, who has been with Ball Colegrave for decades and truly knows his stuff. His Talk, entitled 'Colour for the coming season' certainly did not disappoint and our thanks go to member Janet Payne for her summary, as follows:

"Stuart gave an inspiring talk on their new plants, particularly annuals, in the pipeline for 2024. He outlined the exacting work the company does developing and growing plants to very high and innovative standards across six continents, in Costa Rica and Portugal for example. Their sales go to wholesale buyers, then to us, identifiable as named cultivars.

New plants are improved to be more floriferous, stronger, more varied in colour palette and more disease resistant. A new lavender, Blue Spear, for example, has a stronger scent and more flowers per cm. than Hidcote. A new coloured agave, Mangrave, shows architecturally well indoors and outdoors. Impatiens (Busy Lizzie) have recently been almost wiped out by disease. Beacon Lipstick is disease resistant, so can reappear in our containers. A new dahlia (Maxi Starburst Pink) is extra large and early flowering. I liked the look of alstroemeria Indian Summer with bronze foliage and sunset coloured flowers. Growing and planting tips were included – I shall now feed my rudbeckias before the summer next year.

We were thoughtfully provided with catalogues containing colour matching planting plans and notebooks to note possibilities as we plan our pots and border displays for the coming year."

Members enjoyed swapping not just lots of interesting cuttings which will thrive in our gardens,

(especially with the amount of rain we've had recently) but also some interesting garden tools too. Our outgoing Chairman Trevor Stevens hosted the event and the Committee would like to thank Trevor for being a great Chairman over the past 18 months or so. We wish him well for his impending move to Sheffield. We still don't have a replacement and we don't want our Club to close, so if you would like to take over, we would LOVE to hear from you! #### Jobs for November

Autumn has arrived and winter's on its way. Leaves are falling and wind and rain are on the increase. Tender plants will need protection from frost, gales and freezing rains.

- Move plants into the greenhouse or into a sheltered spot, but if you can't, it's worth wrapping plants or pots.
- Winter can be a tough time for birds in terms of water and food, so keep supplies well topped up. This will encourage winter birds into the garden.
- Plant out winter bedding.
- Insulate outdoor containers from frost bubble wrap works well.
- Use a seasonal bonfire where this is allowed, to dispose of excess debris unfit for composting. Check for hedgehogs first.

## RAISING AWARENESS IS VITAL - NOT ALL DISABILITIES ARE VISIBLE by Lucy Norman, Editor

Not usually being the sort of person to moan and, with the aim of raising awareness of my condition, can I just share something with you. As many of you know, in December 2010 I was diagnosed with Early Onset Parkinson's Disease. The first 6-7 years were ok(ish) and then, with what seemed literally overnight, my symptoms worsened. I was fortunate enough to have Deep Brain Stimulation surgery back in April 2021, which, thanks to the amazing team at the John Radcliffe in Oxford, gave me my life back and I could travel again.

Now, to get to my point. My husband, Angus, and I travel a lot to Spain, about 6 times a year. Even though my symptoms have improved beyond anything I could have wished for I still like to use my Parkinson's stick because of the crowds at the airport. I don't necessarily need it for walking, it's for when I stop and feel a bit wobbly. Now, you would think that somebody using a stick with 'I have Parkinson's, please give me time' emblazed across it would be shown a tad more compassion but no, every time I travel out from Birmingham or back in from Malaga I am met with hostility and nastiness. I have had comments such as "how come she gets to go through first", "I wish I'd brought a stick to get me to the front of the queue, Genius", and not forgetting the dirty looks and the looking me up and down and tutting. It sounds ridiculous but I actually found myself walking with an exaggerated limp so I could justify my place in the Assistance Lane.

So, one day, instead of sitting there getting angry, I came up with the idea of getting a t-shirt printed. I wore it for the first time back in August and what a difference. I could feel people behind me at the airport 'reading my back', then giving me a smile as they sped past me. People actually opened doors for me, let me go first and 3 people came up to me saying "I love your t-shirt" and then telling me their story, one about a grandchild who suffers from terrible anxiety. They all use the Disabled Lane and got the same negative reaction as me. Travelling with my t-shirt on felt like a totally different experience. My stomach doesn't go over anymore waiting for someone to say something. I used to get the most remarks while waiting at the Gate to board. On our last flight home, I could see people getting agitated in the Priority Queue, staring at me sitting in the Disabled Area, so I just turned my back on them and let then read away.

Friends have said that I shouldn't have to do this but, sadly, I do. The posters say "not all disabilities are visible", mine is but this doesn't stop people. Their need to 'say their bit' or the thought that someone else is getting



something they are not, (I actually board the plane a whole 2 minutes before they do...!!), any empathy, patience or understanding goes out of the window.

AND MY T-SHIRT READS...."I am not queue jumping or avoiding waiting my turn. I have Parkinson's, a progressive brain disease that affects my balance and mobility. Believe me, I'd rather be in your queue."


We are pleased to report that we have found a route to having the Blister Packs recycled!

## FROM THE FIRE STATION

The Scenario 2 training day at Moreton in Marsh proved interesting and worthwhile as the Deddington crew were able to put out fires and search for casualties in controlled situations whilst under the watchful eyes of instructors. 3 scenarios were presented during the course of the day: a domestic dwelling with a ground floor fire, a light industrial unit with a first- floor internal fire and a shopping

centre with a fire adjacent to the loading bay. As colleagues from other stations were also attending, 2 crews with 2 separate appliances were operating. In each case, crews had to locate both the trapped casualties and control / extinguish the fire. Each scenario was completed successfully with crews working very well together and tackling the situations correctly.

Each appliance ran an Incident Commander, Pump Operator, 2 Breathing Apparatus crew and one BA commander and a 6<sup>th</sup> fire fighter. Crews alternated between the domestic and light industrial fires before lunch time, and combined together to attend the supermarket fire as a 2 pump incident. After each scenario was completed, an immediate "on site" debrief occurred, with a more detailed round up and discussion in the class room at the end of the day.

Well done to Garin Wilby and Corrie King in passing their development and now being fully competent, and congratulations to Steve Baker and Cee Jay Harber for passing their BA course. We are approaching winter, so before lighting those fires please get your chimneys swept.

## 5 Jaw-droppingly, fascinating facts about Guy Fawkes

- Fawkes is a controversial figure.
   Guy Fawkes was first a face of betrayal because of his role in the plot to blow up the British parliament in 1605, then a popular symbol of protest.
- Fawkes was actually born in York!
   Fawkes was a representative of a flagrant Yorkshire family and a convert to Roman Catholicism.

His parents were loyal followers of the Church of England. The family on his mother's side were recusant Catholics, while his cousin became a Jesuit priest.

- He was a loyal compadre. Oswald Tesimond, Guy Fawkes' school friend described him as "pleasant of approach and cheerful of manner, opposed to quarrels and strife ... loyal to his friends".
- He had grand dreams. His adventurous spirit, and religious passion, led him to leave Protestant England (1593) and enlist in the Spanish army in the Netherlands. While in the Spanish army he gained repute for great bravery and cool determination.
- Fawkes wasn't actually the original leader of the plot. The Gunpowder Plot conspirators, led by Robert Catesby, were keen Roman Catholics enraged at King James I for refusing to grant greater religious tolerance to Catholics.

The conspirators planned to blow up the Houses of Parliament during the state opening to kill the king and members of Parliament. Their goal was to clear the way to re-establishing Catholic rule in England.







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
